

Quiet Behavior Of Legionnaires At Meeting Surprises

TACOMA, Aug. 28.—(P)—No one has come up with an official explanation yet but the 30th annual encampment of the American Legion is a quiet, almost sedate and markedly serious affair lacking the customary horse-play of such gatherings.

Hotel managers, who prepared in advance for the anticipated boisterousness of the usually playful patriotic group, have been surprised by the quiet in their halls, the absence of water filled bags dropping from upper floors.

Women thread their way easily through groups of sidewalk-filling Legionnaires with nary an electric buzzer to harass them. "They're too old," one Legionnaire said of his comrades and

their apparent dignity, but he admitted he couldn't say that about the World War II vets who constitute a sizable part of the delegation. "Maybe they are just too darn concerned with what they saw and what they fear," the sidewalk philosopher said.

Schulte Boatshop At Gardiner Sold To Californians

The Fred Schulte Boatshop at Gardiner has been sold by Mrs. Schulte, widow of the late boat builder, to Joe P. Monte, Donald McPherson and Ernest Stirnaman, all of Jackson, Calif. Monte, a brother of Mrs. Mae Simpson of Reedsport, is superintendent of the Pacific Gas and Electric Co. at Jackson.

Price of the transaction was given as in excess of \$10,000. The Schulte Boatshop, operated by Fred Schulte, veteran boat-builder, until his death a few months ago, is known all along the coast for its construction of deep-sea fishing boats, purse seiners, etc. Most of these boats were built for the Van Camp Seafood Co. and are now in operation along the Oregon and California coasts.

The new owners plan to continue the building and repair of fishing craft, and will also enter the pleasure boat field. Monte and Stirnaman plan to move here some time between now and Sept. 15 to take over active management and operation of the shop.

When this and other business arrangements are completed, Mrs. Schulte plans to return to her former home in Kansas to visit for a few months, but will retain her home in Gardiner and continue to make her home there.

Flying Disk Reported By Sutherlin Observers

Again the flying saucer! Six carpenters working at the Sutherlin school are reported to have seen a large, round disk at an extremely high altitude traveling very fast yesterday afternoon, said Lon Hunt, chairman of the Sutherlin school board and KRNR staff member.

Charles Hodson, carpenter at the school, telephoned Hunt this morning that he had sighted the disk at 3:58 p. m. He and fellow carpenters held it in view seven minutes. It was apparently metal and reflected in the sun. They

were able to compare it with an airplane, which they observed at altitude, Hunt said.
