A seeker of omens might have seen the handwriting on the wall in the Cheney Studs-Umpqua Chiefs game at Finlay Field Sunday afternoon, when the Studs first man up connected with a nice double off pitcher Bruce Hamilton. The final score, 6-1, is an indication of who played better ball. Studs' man Fawcett wielded the big stick Sunday afternoon, getting two doubles, a single and a homer in four times at bat. Three hits, good for as many runs, were piled up in the first inning by the Central Point boys, and after it was merely a matter of waiting for the final inning, to make the Chiefs' last league game legal. The Roseburg team certainly didn't have everything in their favor to start with, what with Bruce Hamilton's pitching arm sorely in need of rest, but there were no relief pitchers to put in the game, so it was Hamilton or nobody. The Central Pointers managed to get at least one hit in each inning except the seventh. On the other hand, the local team managed to do almost the reverse. It was probably Fawcett who broke the back of the Umpqua Chiefs, when he connected for a home run in the first of the fourth inning, putting Cox across the platter and the Indian sign on the Chiefs for a score of 6-0. After that, the starch went out of the home team, and Hamilton's pitches came across the plate so casually the opposition could hardly connect. Montgomery scored the only run for the Chiefs in the latter half of the ninth, thanks to two errors by the right fielder and shortstop. Paul Gehman, Stud pitcher, was top-flight material as far as this game was concerned. He's an ex-Cincinnati clubber, and also pitched with the Los Angeles team of the Pacific Coast League, before coming to the Studs' fold. Registration Begun For National Draft

(Continued from Page One) be drafted. Actually, it is a sort of official census of draft-age men, the Associated Press reported. Only a fraction of the millions who register will be drafted into the armed forces for a 21-month stretch during the next two years. Maybe one out of every 42. For example, all 18-year-olds and veterans will register, but those under 19 and most of the veterans are exempt. And millions of others will be deferred for various reasons. But they must register, anyway. Most of those eventually inducted will be under 22. And almost all of them will serve in the Army. The Navy, Marines and Air Force hope to fill their ranks with volunteers. If you are in the 18 through 25 age bracket, this will brief you on registration: First, locate your nearest registration center. The nation's 4,000-odd draft boards have organized about 20,000 of them. Next, if you are a veteran, dig up your discharge papers. You need them to check on dates and service. Men must register by age group, check your birth date and find out which day you are supposed to sign up. If you were born in 1922 after August 30, you register today. There won't be many in your bracket, and draft officials have said not many 25-year-olds will be inducted—maybe around 7,000 in all. Tomorrow and Sept. 1 a larger group will register—men born in 1923. The schedule then goes on like this: Men born in 1924 register Sept. 2-3; 1925, Sept. 4 or 7; 1926, Sept. 8-9; 1927, Sept. 10-11; 1928, Sept. 13-14; 1929, Sept. 15-16; if born in 1930 before Sept. 19, sign up Sept. 17-18. If you aren't 18 by Sept. 19, you register on the day of your 18th birthday, or within five days of it. But you won't be eligible for the draft until you are 19. You're just getting your name in the "census." If you are ill, or otherwise just can't make it, notify your draft board and they will register you later. But don't delay too long, and definitely don't try to get out of registration. There's a strict penalty for avoiding this duty—five years in prison, or a fine up to \$10,000, or both.

Spy Apparatus Head Yields no Information

(Continued from Page One) with illegal entry into the United States. He was freed on \$85,000 bond. The service said at that time that Peters was a Czech and had come to this country without a valid immigration visa on Aug. 3, 1932. Peters has six aliases, the service said. The Congressional spy hunt had shifted to New York for Chambers' own story of having landed a government job while drawing pay as a Communist agent. The new development was unfolded by Chambers himself in secret testimony before the House Un-American Activities Committee. It led Rep. Nixon to claim that for the first time the committee now has a "definite, provable link" between the pre-war red underground described by Chambers and the wartime Russian spy activities related by Elizabeth T. Bentley. Both Chambers and Miss Bentley have told of serving as Communist couriers. But there was a five-year gap from the time Chambers said he quit the party in 1937 until the Vassar graduate claims she began her spy ring work. Chambers testified he obtained a \$6,000-a-year federal job in 1937 through Communist influence. Chambers said he got the government post within 24 hours after applying for it. Rep. Nixon said Peters should be cited for contempt of Congress for refusing to answer questions as to his alleged Communist affiliations.

(Continued from Page One) centers today and fill out post card sized forms. Registration doesn't mean that these men will tax. Sixty-five expressed themselves in favor of storm sewers, with 45 favoring a bond issue and 20 a tax levy. City hall expansion drew approval from 59, of whom 38 favored a bond issue and 21 a tax. Airport improvement got the O.K. of 58 members, 49 of them favoring a bond issue and 10 a direct tax. The use of two streets for through traffic on Highway 99 was approved by 36 members, while 32 favored retaining the highway at its present location. Of those favoring two separate streets, 15 recommended the use of Stephens and Pine streets, while 14 favored use of Stephens and Main streets. Persons who have not returned their questionnaires are urged to do so immediately. At least 75 per cent answers are desired to give a complete report. Other suggestions made by the members will be announced in a later report.

Crash of Airliner Kills All 36 Aboard

(Continued from Page One) storm when the plane passed over. "I was in the yard with my mother," he said. "There was a flash of lightning. It struck the plane. A part of a wing fell off and the ship started down." M. F. S. Charles Guenther, a Fountain City farm woman, told a similar story. She and her husband saw the crash from their automobile. The body of Capt. Robert Johnson, 30, St. Paul, the pilot, was still in the smashed nose of the plane. The crash was the worst in NWA's history. Thirty persons died when one of the line's Orient planes smashed into the side of an Alaskan mountain last March 30. Less than two months ago, NWA was given a National Safety Council award for having flown more than a billion miles without an accident. Northwest Airlines officials in the Twin Cities said the line's remaining 24 Martin 2-0-2's, all operating on domestic routes, would be thoroughly inspected before takeoff. Rerouting or substitution of different types of planes would be temporarily necessary in some instances, the officials said.
