registrants had seen prior military service. Many were combat veterans assured of exemption from further duty in the armed forces. Selective Service officials have indicated that the bulk of the future draftees will come from the 22 and 23-year-old groups due to register later this week.

Not until some nine and a half million men 18 through 25 have filled out the draft questionnaires by Sept. 19 will Selective Service officials be able to complete the job of classifying this vast collection of American youth.

The Army—which is getting all the November inductees—is ex-

pected to ask for another 10,000 draftees in December, later stepping up the pace to about 30,000 a month.

The local boards will make up lists of acceptable registrations and from these pick up the men to be inducted.

Training Scheduled

After induction each draftee will be shipped to the training division nearest his induction station where he will be assigned a training group.

Some of the men will be sent to combat units in United States for basic training and others will receive eight weeks of training at the training center.

Thereafter draftees will be assigned to combat units or service units in the United States, to overseas units or to schools.

After 21 months of service,

draftees must serve in inactive reserve units for five years, or can shorten this time by active service with either the armed forces or reserve units.

Draft officials previously have said that 60 days or more will be needed between the date of the call and the actual induction.

voiced a Soviet-sponsored chorus of demands for withdrawal of all occupation troops from Germany. The Russian military newspaper in Berlin renewed the Soviet demand for a voice in controlling the Ruhr, the British-zone coal and steel region upon which the recovery of Europe and the Marshall Plan depend.

As word circulated that Berlin soon might be on a single currency basis, the city's flourishing money trading slowed down abruptly. This trading has been brisk ever since the Western Powers introduced their new German mark here in competition to the Soviet-sponsored East Mark. Though the two were officially rated at parity, the West Mark always was at a premium.

McDowell said Berle included Hiss in the pro-Soviet block. He said Berle testified that former Undersecretary of State Dean Acheson "was boss of the Hiss boys."

Wallace Carries on In Spite of Egg Barrage

with Russia can we avoid another war. We (the Progressives) are fighting on the side of the Lord."

Gov. Gregg Cherry deplored the violence to which Wallace has been exposed beginning with his first public talk at Durham Sunday night and castigated those responsible.

In New York, a state convention of the American Labor party nominated Wallace and his running mate, Senator Glen H. Taylor, as its candidates.

The vote came after the convention was told by Rep. Vito Marcantonio, ALP congressman, that President Truman has "a sordid record against the people who toil."

Texas Contest Close

Former Gov. Coke Stevenson clung to a slim lead over Rep. Lyndon B. Johnson in the Texas Democratic runoff for the U.S. Senate. The latest tally gave Stevenson an edge of 119 votes, with about 400 still to be counted.

Louisiana Democrats, in a primary election watched by congressional investigators, chose senatorial and house candidates. The administration of Gov. Earl K. Long was a hot campaign issue.

Russell Long, the Governor's nephew and 29-year-old son of the late Senator Huey P. Long, bid for the senate seat left vacant by the death of Senator John Overton. Young Long, executive counsel to the governor, helped draft his uncle's controversial state program of higher taxes, bigger old age benefits and similar measures.

Cease Watch on Polls

Congressional investigators kept an eye on the polls. William E. Murray, representing the House Committee on Campaign Expenditures, said voters "in a great many places" had expressed fear of retaliation if they opposed the state administration.

Rep. Edward Hebert from New Orleans, a candidate for renomination with the blessing of the Long faction, immediately took issue with Murray. He said he planned to telegraph a protest to Washington that Murray was invading states' rights.

The Long issue also played a part in the other senatorial contest. Sen. Allen J. Ellender, for years a Long faction leader, seeks renomination for a third term over the opposition of Rep. James Domeneaux, a vigorous anti-Long campaigner, and Charles G. Gerth, New Orleans attorney.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31.—(AP) President Truman today termed the throwing of eggs at Henry A. Wallace, Progressive party presidential candidate, in North Caro-

lina a "highly un-American business." Press Secretary Ross quoted the president as saying: "The president said he thought that eggs and other missiles were certainly highly un-American business and violated the American concept of fair play. 'Mr. Wallace is entitled to say

his piece the same as any other American.' Eggs, over-ripe tomatoes and other missiles were showered on Wallace yesterday when he attempted speeches at Burlington, Greensboro and High Point.
