

Caution Enjoined In Driving During Labor Day Holiday

The approaching Labor Day holiday will be long remembered by many bereaved or permanently injured Oregonians unless all drivers use constant caution on over-crowded highways. Secretary of State Newberry warns.

The secretary points out that the last long weekend of the summer season invariably results in heavy travel, and that all available reports indicate this year's traffic will be the heaviest in history.

Two previous three-holiday weekends have exacted a toll of ten lives, compared with nine killed during last year's Labor Day weekend alone, Newberry said.

"It is possible to eliminate practically all of these tragedies by careful driving," Newberry declared. "We must be alert for

trouble at all times, particularly watching for the reckless driver whose actions put us in danger."

He suggested motorists devote thought to the principle of defensive driving. By driving at all times as if all other drivers are sure to do the wrong or unsafe thing, it is possible to be prepared for and avoid the sudden occurrences which cause most collisions, he said.

"This idea may sound like an indictment of Oregon's drivers and their habits. When your life is at stake, however, it is only common sense not to put it in the hands of a stranger," the secretary concluded.

Applicants For Air Force Will Be Interviewed

A special United States Air Force procurement team will arrive in Eugene Sept. 7 to interview young men in this area who are interested in pilot training with the Air Force, Major Uriel P. D'Acosta, USAF said today.

The team, headed by Major D'Acosta, is prepared to give all the qualifying tests required except the final physical examination and personal interview. The major said that interested young men therefore could determine at once whether they can qualify.

To be eligible for the Aviation

Cadet program an applicant must be an unmarried male citizen between the ages of 20 and 26½ years; had two or more years of college or be able to pass an educational examination to measure its equivalent. A sound physique and excellent character also are required.

The team will be in Eugene through Sept. 9, and will present its program at various meetings in this area. The recruiting station at room 10, Post Office Bldg., Eugene, is arranging the interviews.

Petersen dumped Hawkins twice for nine counts in the seventh round of a scheduled 15-rounder and a few seconds later Referee Jimmy Malone stopped the bout. The big boys slugged on fairly even terms for six rounds. Petersen won the earlier fight in nine rounds.

Petersen weighed 198, Hawkins 189.

Semifinals Reached By Four Softball Teams

BAKER, Sept. 1.—(AP)—Hyster of Portland and Steens Market of Eugene lined up today with Medford and Baker for the semifinals in the state softball tournament.

The Portland team piled in six runs in the third inning last night to defeat the Corvallis Elks, 6 to 2. In the second quarterfinal game, the Eugene entry eliminated Rosenberg Lumber of Tillamook, 8 to 2.

Hyster's Dale Leabo fanned 14 batters in winning his second tournament game. He had a no-hit, no-run game until the seventh and a shutout going into the ninth when the Elks reached him for a single and a double, combined with an error, to score two runs.

Second sacker Billy Hutchison sparked Eugene with three doubles. Tillamook had a two-run edge in the first inning, but Eugene scored three and then piled in five more in the eighth. Tonight's semifinal has Baker opening against Medford at 7:30 o'clock and Portland against Eugene in the second game.

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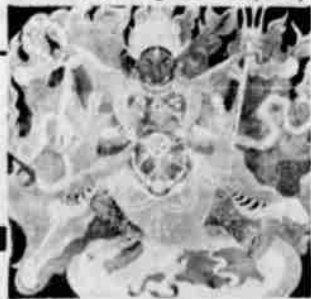
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
