

**Stolen Guns Recovered,
3 Juveniles Arrested**

Sheriff O. T. "Bud" Carter, working all day Sunday in the Camas Valley mountains, traced a stolen lot of nine guns—seven of them revolvers—50 pounds of ammunition, hunting and pocket knives, two pairs of cowboy boots, three pairs of spurs, flashlights and miscellaneous articles.

The loot, stolen from the Schults ranch on Bear Creek, were found by Carter secluded on Camas Mountain. All articles were returned to the owner in less than 24 hours from the time they were reported stolen late Saturday night.

Three juveniles, one 14 years of age and two 16 years of age, from the Tenmile and Riddle vicinities, were arrested in connection with the thefts, Carter said. Names of the youths were withheld.

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**No More Prizes by Phone,
Mutual System Decides**

NEW YORK, Sept. 1.—(AP)—Edgar Kobak, president of the Mutual Broadcasting System, said today the network will eliminate any programs that require listeners to answer a telephone to win a prize.

Kobak explained that the action is being taken in compliance with the recently adopted code of the National Association of Broadcasters. It has no connection, he said, with the Federal Communications Commission's proposed new lottery regulations for radio give-away programs.

The four major networks all have announced they will be operating in full compliance with the broadcasting code by Jan. 1. The code contains a provision saying broadcasters should avoid any program designed "to buy the audience."

**OLD AGE CATCHES TROUT
MT. SHASTA, Calif.**

—(AP)—It isn't the same around the state fish hatchery. A 24-year-old Mackinaw trout who came from Minnesota as an egg in 1923 has passed on. He was always pointed out to tourists, as he got to weigh 15 pounds and was 26 inches long.

He is survived by three other outside specimens, who also crossed the plains as fish eggs in the early twenties. The average life span of a trout is 3 to 5 years, says the State Division of Fish and Game, which adds that it stopped inviting Mackinaws into the state in 1924, when it found they ate other game fish.
