

Whale Boat Of Boy Scouts Proves O. K. on Test Run

The Roseburg Senior Boy Scouts' completed whale boat, Kelpy, sponsored by the Roseburg Kiwanis Club and made available by special agreement to Coos Bay Sea Scouts, was taken for a test cruise on the bay Sunday.

Scoutmaster, H. H. Scofield, Senior Scout, reported that the Kiwanis luncheon meeting Tuesday noon.

He said that he and two Coos Bay

men made the test run very satisfactorily.

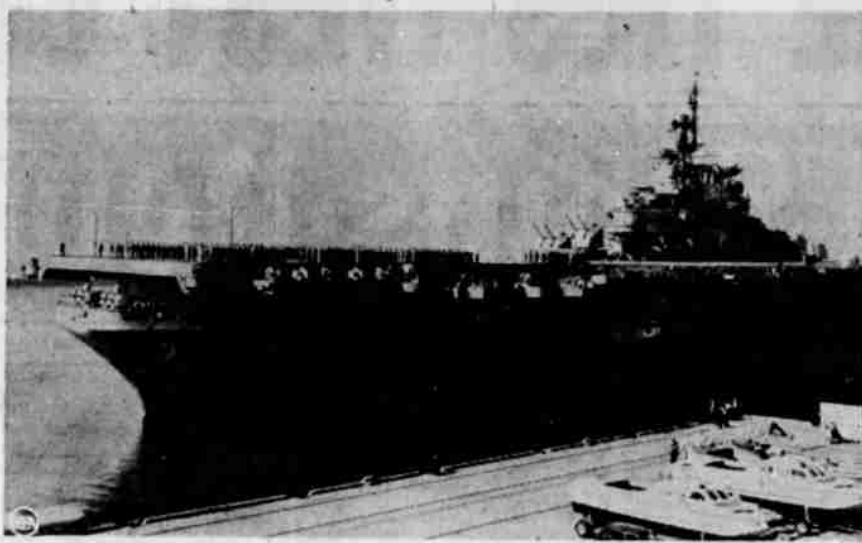
Although the motor was not opened to its capacity, the small ship cruised nicely at 8 to 10 knots, and will probably travel around 12 knots, which is better than expected, he said.

The ship, acquired from war assets surplus properties, is 30 feet long, has a nine-foot beam and draws four feet of water. It weighs two and a half tons and will hold 40 passengers.

The Roseburg and Coos Bay boys chipped off the old paint, repainted the boat and made other repairs. A cabin still is to be constructed, but material is being donated for this purpose at Coos Bay, and the boat can be used in the meantime without a cabin, Scofield said.

Living to Serve Others Theme Of Pastor at Kiwanis

Expressing the need for realizations in our every day lives, Rev. Kenneth Kinn, pastor of the First Christian Church, addressed the Kiwanis Club Tuesday noon on the subject of "Living as a Hobby."

The purpose of a hobby, he said, is to restore to a proper condition our mental outlook on life. Many people are "out of tune" with life, he declared. Doctors and lawyers see this in every day life in the people who come before them. We have only to observe as we walk along the streets, he said, to see evidence everywhere of people who are out of tune with life.

"Before we build a life, we should take an accounting of the cost," he declared. Many people, he said, are not trying to find a better way to live. They are content with their humdrum way of living.

While money is important in our economic life, it is a tragedy for business to think only of making money. Every man in business, he declared, should be there to serve others. The shoe salesman not to sell shoes, but to serve his customers; the lawyer not to make his fee, but to serve his clients. The business man at the top, he said, doesn't get happiness out of what he does, but what he gives.

We should strive to do everything for someone else, to serve the community. The banker, lawyer, doctor, or merchant, he said, should strive to help individuals to live. The hobby of life should be to serve the people, that they might find life just a little more livable.

Commies, Like Ikk to Be Screened Out of Draft

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2.—(AP)—Army commanders are under orders today to screen out any Communists and Fellow Travelers inducted in the peace-time draft.

Although registrants are not asked whether they are Communists, the Army Department revealed yesterday that all officers and enlisted personnel are subject to loyalty checks and may be discharged if found to be members of a subversive organization.

A memorandum from the top command said the Army's policy is "to permit only loyal Americans to serve in the army in any capacity." It added that "membership in or close affiliation with the Communist party is inimical to national security."

Columbia Salmon Take Cut by Flood

ASTORIA, Ore., Sept. 2.—(AP)—The summer commercial fishing catch on the Columbia River was 15 per cent below last year's, a spokesman for a major packing firm estimated from fish receipts here.

The total river run during August was "at least as good as last year's," but the few chinooks caught during July, when the river was still high from June floods, caused the drop in the actual catch.

Commercial fishing on the Columbia resumes Sept. 10 at noon and continues through the fall and winter months, but usually few fish are taken after September.

With the sports fishing season now in full swing on the lower river, weighing-in stations for the Astoria salmon derby reported that practically every boat of the thousands on the river was catching at least one fish.

High catches have ranged up to 49 pounds for a single chinook.

North China Government Proclaimed by Commies

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 2.—(AP)—The Chinese Communists yesterday proclaimed a "North China Peoples Government" as a rival to President Chiang Kai-Shek's regime.

A broadcast from the Communist radio in North China—heard here by the Associated Press—said the aim of the "government" is "the striking down of American imperialism and Kuomintang (government party) rule in China."

The radio announced the "Peoples Government" was formed Aug. 19 at the end of a 13-day session of "The North China provisional peoples representative Congress." It didn't say where the Congress met.

The "Congress" elected 27 members of a "government council" to rule in the areas of North China seized by Communist armies.

War-time Blood Plasma Supply Running Out

PORTLAND, Sept. 2.—(AP)—A Red Cross official said yesterday that the supply of blood plasma collected during the war is now running out.

Noreen Litscher, San Francisco, here to discuss restoring the wartime "blood banks," said 3,700,000 pints are needed annually for civilian use. To supply enough, one out of every 20 persons must donate a pint of blood a year.

The Red Cross plans to open a regional bank here in November. The supply will be offered free to hospitals and physicians.

Subversive Aliens Not Entering U.S., Probers Declare

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2.—(AP)—A three-man inquiry group told Secretary of State Marshall yesterday there is no basis for statements made to congress that "hundreds" of subversive aliens have entered this country under United Nations credentials.

The statements were made in testimony before a Senate committee by subordinate State Department employees.

Marshall named a committee of private citizens to look into the situation and decide whether existing rules on admitting U. S. officials are sufficient to safeguard American security.

The committee, in a report published by the State Department, said it is "shocked" by the manner in which the statements were made last July by three officials of the State Department's visa division—Robert Alexander, assistant chief; William M. Harlow, head of the diplomatic visa section, and R. Clyde Larkin, chief of the public safety and securities section.

The three-man inquiry committee told Marshall:

"The testimony produced serious repercussions of the foreign policy of the U. S. and was irresponsible in its lack of factual support."

Taft-Hartley Act Failure, AFL President Asserts

PRESSMEN'S HOME, Tenn., Sept. 2.—(AP)—AFL President William Green says the Taft-Hartley Act has failed in its "proposed objective of reducing strikes and improving labor-management relations."

"In fact," Green told the 38th quadrennial convention of the International Printing Pressmen and Assistants' Union (AFL) convention, "the act itself has been the direct cause of a large number of strikes that otherwise never would have occurred."

The AFL leader said the record since enactment of the law fails to "disclose a single instance of any benefit derived by wage earners from the operation of this act."
