All children living south of Deer Creek and east of the Umpqua River will report at Rose School.

Children living west of the Umpqua River will report at Fulton School, with the exception

of first graders who live west of Coates Addition and north to the Umpqua River. They will report at Sylvan Valley School.

Children living east of the Umpqua River and north of Deer Creek to a line extending north-easterly from the vicinity of the Snake Shack will report at Benson School.

Children living north of the Snake Shack to Brooklyn Avenue and east of Mulholland Drive will report at Riverside School.

Children living west of Mulholland Drive in the first and sixth grades only will report at Edgewater. Children in the second, third and fourth grades in this section will report at Riverside School.

Children in the Cloverdale and Alameda additions and north of this area will be transported by bus to Benson School.

Changes in this schedule, after the opening registration, will unquestionably have to be made, said Elliott.

Lifting of Berlin Blockade Impends

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financiers say one western mark is worth four Russian marks. Moreover, the Russians will have control of the printing presses.

Soviet Press Jubilant
The western powers were reported insisting on joint control with the Russians on the volume of currency, credits and discount in Berlin if, as expected, they yield to Russian demands that the Soviet mark be the sole money for Berlin.

Communist newspapers gleefully said the military governor's conference is turning into a Soviet diplomatic triumph. These papers attacked again the anti-Communist German leaders in Berlin such as Socialist Franz Neumann. He appealed to a mass meeting for the western powers to stand firm on the currency issue or be accused of "another Munich." The governors meet for the fourth time today.

Taegliche Rundschau, official Soviet organ of the Soviet military administration branded Neumann's address before a rally yesterday in the American zone as "prattle" containing only "hatred, calumny, lies and no positive proposals."

Long's Opponent Doesn't Concede Election Defeat

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 3.—(AP)—Huey P. Long's young son, Russell, has claimed victory in a U. S. Senate race for two days, backed by a 9,700-vote majority, but his opponent has yet to concede.

Judge Robert F. Venable told a radio audience that Long was nominated in Tuesday's Democratic primary "by one to two percent of the vote—and some people wonder about the validity of the vote."

In a later interview Venable refused to say whether he conceded

the election or planned to contest it.
But the 29-year-old son of the "Kingfish" was confident he would have the Senate seat.
Only three rural precincts were unreported today. The balance of the 1,883 boxes in the state on the basis of unofficial returns gave Long 262,548 votes and Kennon 252,841.

Old Testament Being Modernized by Catholics

YONKERS, N. Y., Sept. 3.—(AP)—A new modern-English translation of the Old Testament is being produced by the Roman Catholic Church to replace a text in use since 1609.

The Rev. Stephen J. Hartgreen said yesterday the project is nearly complete.

He is secretary of a committee of 30 scholars who have been working for the last five years on translations of ancient Hebrew, Aramaic and Greek manuscripts.

New versions of the Book of Genesis already have been printed, and two copies have been presented to Pope Pius. General publication will begin Tuesday. Such words as "thou" and "thee" are being eliminated from the new version, and replaced with the modern pronoun, "you." "Thy" becomes "your" in the new version, and "see" is substituted for "behold."

Registration for the first eight grades will be held the opening day, starting at 9 a. m. Classes are scheduled to begin Wednesday at the same hour.
Sister Mary Immaculata, RSM, and three other sisters will conduct the school. Enrollment last year was 140, and a similar number is expected this year. The school takes children who will be six years old by Jan. 1.

Part of the new 14-mile highway was opened to traffic last week, and the remainder is expected to be completed by the celebration date. The wide, smooth highway cuts through the mountains in this area eliminating the numerous curves and greatly reduces the distance. Four lanes are provided on uphill grades to facilitate passing of trucks.

The celebration will be aimed toward future highway development, especially in the Azalea-Canyonville section, which now is one of the worst remaining sections of Highway 99.

exporting manufacturers cut production.

The Waterfront Employers Association and Pacific American Shipowners Association declared survival of the industry was at stake.

Bridges Claims 'Spit in Eye'

The announced they no longer would deal with any union whose officers refused to file non-Communist affidavits with the National Labor Relations Board. Such affidavits are required to qualify unions for NLRB services. Bridges has refused to make such an affidavit but said he was willing to refer the question to the Union membership.

He told 6,000 cheering long-

shoremen losing their strike would put the union out of business. Discussing negotiations which collapsed Wednesday night, Bridges said:

"I crawled on my hands and knees and all I got was a spit in the eye."

We will prepare for a four to six months' strike now. There will be no more talks with the employers except on our terms.

Four other unions backed the longshoremen with pledges of "all for one, one for all."

The CIO Marine Cooks and Stewards and Independent Marine Firemen ordered picket lines today. Further meetings to discuss their participation were called by the CIO Marine Engineers and AFL Radio Officers.

The Federal Conciliation Service failed to get negotiators back into joint sessions yesterday but failed, Bridges said employer evidence of "intention to negotiate in good faith to end the strike" was a union requirement before talking further.

Court Ruling Awaited
Longshore employers withdrew a 10-cent-an-hour wage hike offer and a proposal to continue with the present union-named dispatchers at hiring halls until the Supreme Court determines whether they are legal. In any new talks employers will go back to their original offer of a five-cent wage boost and an impartial dispatcher, the announcement said.
