Baum, of Union, Ore., at a candle-light ceremony at St. George's Episcopal Church, Sunday, Aug. 22. Father William L. Blaker performed the double ring ceremony in the presence of one hundred and seventy-five relatives and friends.

Mixed white flowers were used in the altar vases with white candles in lovely candleabra on either side of the altar. Huge baskets of white gladioli completed the flower decorations. The family pews were marked with large white satin bows.

As the guests assembled Mrs. R. B. Herschle played softly on the organ, while Charles Cockle, cousin of the bride from Vancouver, Wash., lighted the altar candles.

Preceding the ceremony, R. M. Church sang the Lord's Prayer. Mrs. Herschle played the Bridal Chorus from Lohengrin for the bride party to advance to the altar. At the close of the ceremony, the couple knelt before the altar on a white satin pillow and received the benediction. Mendelssohn's Wedding Recessional was played as the bride party left the church.

The bride, given in marriage by her father, was very beautiful in a gown of white dotted marquisette over taffeta. The gown was fashioned with a close-fitting bodice; low round neckline outlined with a double row of tiny ruffles, and long pointed sleeves. She carried a small basket of yellow daisies. Her headpiece was made from tiny white blossoms.

But now it's hoots, whistles, blatant loudspeakers, bells, horns, shoot. In short, bedlam.

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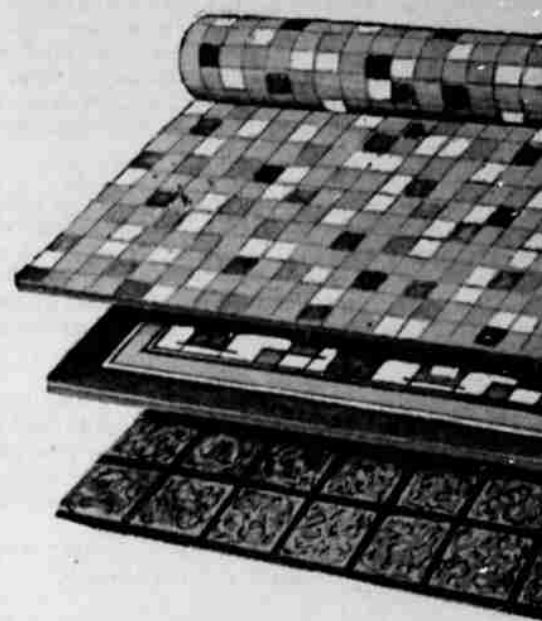
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
