Oaks Only Game And Half Behind In Coast League

Oakland's veteran first sacker, Nick Etten, has slugged his way into contention in the coast league's home run derby. The wartime New York Yankee pounded a homer in each game—his 37th and 38th—to lead the Oaks to a double Labor Day win over San Diego, 11-1 and 5-1. In a week-long spree, Etten smashed seven homers in nine games against the Padres, never more than one per contest.

Oakland pulled to within a game and a half of the leading San Franciscoans, who divided with Portland, 9-6 and 9-10.

The Oaks got tasty left-handed pitching from Lou Tost and Charley Gassaway. Lloyd Christopher, with two homers in the opener, and George Metkovich, with one in the nightcap, helped Etten power the attack. Etten drove in six runs during the day.

The Seals made 28 hits, 15 in the first game, to give the Beaver staff a few more bumps. Duane Pilleter staggered through in relief to give the Beavers the finale. John Lazor knocked in three runs.

Third-place Los Angeles woke up to two-time Seattle, 3-2 and 4-3. Dewey Adkins won the opener with a five-hitter. Cliff Abernethy's homer and single accounted for three Angel runs in the afterpiece. The double loss dropped Seattle back to fifth, a game behind Portland.

With good pitching from Pinky Woods and Joe Krakauskas, Hollywood beat Sacramento twice, 4-1 and 2-1. Gus Zernial's 35th home run decided the second game.
