

Funeral Services Set For Accident Victims

Funeral services for the Owen Troyer family, killed early Monday morning in an automobile crash near Yoncalla, will be held at 9 a.m. Friday at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Hostetler, on their ranch near Oakland. Concluding services will be held at the Mennonite Church at Harrisburg at 1:30 p.m. Friday. Interment will take place in that city.

Mrs. Troyer was the Hostetler's daughter, and she and her husband and their infant daughter resided in their own house on the Hostetler ranch. The family came to Oakland a year and a half ago from Goshen. Earlier they lived at Harrisburg, where the Hostetlers also lived for many years.

Surviving relatives include Mrs. Troyer's parents and her five brothers and six sisters; Mr. Troyer's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Dan Troyer, who reside in Ohio, and his four brothers and one sister. The Troyers' infant daughter who died was 12 weeks old.

Funeral arrangements are in charge of Stearns Mortuary, Oakland.

Trash Burner Explosion Amputates Woman's Leg

PORTLAND, Sept. 8.—(AP)—A woman lost her right leg last night when a make-shift trash burner exploded in the basement of her home while she worked nearby. She is in poor condition today.

Mrs. Elsie Henry, 35, was making jelly on a small stove when the iron jacketed burner converted from an obsolete water heater burst, nearly severing one leg and mangle the other.

Three young boys, two of them sons of Mrs. Henry, and another tenant in the house, Jack Cheney, escaped injury.

Police said they believed water had been trapped in the jacket, shattering the iron when steam pressure built up while trash was being burned.

The building to help protect the anti-Communist city assembly from Communist-led demonstrators.

Three times the demonstrators have invaded city hall, as Communists pressed their campaign to take over Berlin and impose their own rule.

To escape arrest by their Soviet-controlled rivals, the 19 western police took refuge in the

western Allied liaison offices.

The French commandant, Brig. Gen. Jean Ganeval, negotiated safe conduct for them with his Russian counterpart, Maj. Gen. Alexander Kotikov.

Soon afterward, the French convoy, including two canvas-covered trucks, started to pull away from city hall. In the party, beside the police, were 11 American, British and French liaison officers and correspondents.

Party Ambushed
A few hundred yards from the building, they were flagged down by two jeep loads of Russian tank gunners. About 20 Soviet-sector police then sprang from behind a building.

Four more jeep loads of Russian troops roared up from behind together with a truck carrying 65 more Soviet sector police.

The convoy was surrounded. The seizure had all the aspects of a carefully planned trap. "Those who have identification papers may go on," a Russian officer ordered brusquely. "Those who don't will have to come with us."

An hour-long argument and protests by the French that they had a safe conduct agreement with the Russians were fruitless. The men were hauled away presumably to Soviet sector headquarters. Six American and British newsmen who stayed in the building throughout the siege were permitted to proceed.

This was the second serious episode within three days affecting Allied relations, but the first major incident in the civil warfare between the rival east and west factions of Berlin's divided police force.

The kidnapping climaxed the fantastic Soviet blockade within a blockade which began after Communist demonstrators forced the city assembly to move from the city hall to the protection of the British sector in order to convene.

Originally, 46 western sector police were cornered in the building. After the Soviet-controlled police invaded the American liaison office Monday night and drag-

ged away 19 of them, 27 remained holed up in the French and British liaison offices to avoid arrest.

As the siege continued, eight of the western sector police were smuggled out of city hall. The Soviet-licensed press claimed, however, three of these were caught climbing over the wall behind the building.

City Council Planning For Wider Streets

serve the shade trees along the parking.

F. C. Frear and Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Taylor, property owners along Mosher, were spokesmen for the petitioners. Mayor Albert Flegel, speaking for the council, explained that the proposed widening of Mosher Street had originated with the council and had received the approval of the Planning Commission. He said the proposed widening was in line with developing the business area to provide more parking as well as to provide a safer, wider street.

After considerable discussion, the ordinance, which bore an emergency clause passed through its second and third reading, but upon motion of Councilman Percy Croft the final action was deferred until Sept. 20. An amendment proposed by Councilman Hal Aysotte that the council make further inspection of the street was included in the vote. There was no protest of the widening Military Street from the Oak

Street bridge to Corey Avenue. **Zone Changes Approved**

The council took its final action on the zone change of the area bounded by Oak Street and extension of Parrott to the South Umpqua. A petition bearing more than 20 names protesting the move was presented and read. It was found, however, that some of the persons who signed the petition actually lived in what is already an industrial zone. The principal protest was that some industry might be located on this strip which would produce a great amount of noise and keep the residents from sleeping, or that some other industry that might be a nuisance to the residents would be located there. The petition signers did not object to business or warehouses in the area. The proposal has been up for consideration for quite some time and has twice been before the planning commission, the councilmen pointed out.

The proposal to extend East Washington Street from Chadwick up the hill at a paved width of 28 feet, desired by the property owners along this street drew considerable discussion. Since the city has adopted a 40-foot minimum width for new construction or improvements, the proposed width would be contrary to policy.

Will Consider Change
Vic Micelli, spokesman for the property owners, said the contours would not make advisable a 40-foot width for this street, that the residents would not approve the extra width, and that

it would in effect stop development of this area. The street, he said, would eventually tie in with Harrison Street over the hill. The extra width, said Micelli, would cut too deeply into the hillside and take too much land off the home sites.

Some of the councilmen expressed opinions that it might be advisable to deviate from the established rule, where certain conditions govern.

After further discussion the city manager was instructed to draft plans and specifications for extension of East Washington, the width to correspond with the present terminus on Chadwick, which is 28 feet. The matter will come up for final action after this has been submitted.

The extension of South Jackson Street from Roberts to the south city limits was given final approval, with the only alteration that the sidewalk be constructed

flush with the paved street, and not set in two feet as originally proposed.

Car Purchased

After considering bids for new cars, the bid of Hansen Motor Company of \$1653, less \$76 tax or \$1577, for a new Fleetmaster Sedan was accepted. Delivery is expected within 30 days. Bids from Rose Motor Company for a Plymouth car and of Lockwood Motor Company for 1949 Fords, either six or eight cylinders were also entered. Rose Motors could offer no delivery date. The new car will be an addition to the

Police Department, in accordance with terms of the budget which provided up to \$1800 for the purchase. The other police car will be retained.

The council decided to make further inspection of the Hunter building before condemnation proceedings will be ordered.

Proposal for the widening of Terrace Avenue from East Lane to Brush Street was referred to the street department for further investigation. The matter of painting the city library was left up to the committee directing this work and the library board.

City Manager Matt Slankard was authorized to put in curbs on the south side of Hamilton Street, due north of the swimming pool at the end of Waite Street. They are to be set 18 feet from the center of the street. "Slow School" signs were authorized for Main Street in the vicinity of Rose School. It was reported cross walks had been painted in the vicinity of Rose, Benson and Fullerton Schools. The city manager was instructed to write the state highway commission relative to a stop and go light at South Stephens and West Lane.

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
