Roseburg School Bells Sounded Opening Day Tuesday



Beginner's First Day of School Pictorially Portrayed by Cameraman Typifying American Free Education

Representative of hundreds of first graders in Roseburg and vicinity and the millions in our schools throughout the United States is Janet Lee Inman, daughter of Leroy B. Inman, News-Review city editor, and Mrs. Inman of 914 S. Hamilton Street, Roseburg.

Janet, six years old last March 14, is caught here by News-Review cameraman Paul Jenkins in poses which parents will find reminiscent of their own children's first day of school.

The upper left picture shows Janet receiving last minute clothing adjustments and instructions from her mother. In her right hand she carries her birth certificate to assure school authorities of her proper age. Children are required by Oregon law to be six years of age by Nov. 15 to be admitted to school.

The upper right picture shows Janet waving goodbye, as she heads for Rose School.

A group of first graders and their teacher Mrs. Kathryn Purdy are shown in the picture, lower left, as they assembled in front of Rose School. The American flag, waving in the breeze, is significant of the privilege American children possess in receiving free education under pleasant, even if crowded, conditions.

The lower right picture shows Janet in her class room being greeted by Mrs. Purdy as other pupils look on.

Crowded conditions in the Roseburg schools this year again make it necessary for all first, second and half of the third graders at Rose School to be housed, not in the main school building,

Reedsport Water Plant May Have New Gas System

Reedsport officials will study the problem of changing the chlorinating plant on the municipal water system from a liquid to a gas system. Walter Smith, representing the company which sold the equipment to the city, advised the Reedsport City Council at its regular meeting Tuesday that operation of the plant would be more economical if such a change is made.

Before a decision is reached, the council will give additional study to the matter and will ask the recommendation of the State Board of Health.

Wilson Barnett asked the council about repairs to his sewer line, claiming that the blocking of the main sewer caused the blocking of his line. The matter will be investigated.

L. H. Peters, owner of the Reedsport Taxi Service, discussed the need of a bus service connecting Reedsport with Gardiner and Winchester Bay. Further study will be made.

City Attorney Purvis is drawing up an ordinance covering the common user clause for the new switch track on First Street, on the flood control dike. When completed to the satisfaction of the Southern Pacific Company, the ordinance will be passed on by the council.

Discussion was held regarding the failure of Judge Wimberly of Roseburg to render a decision in the city's suit against Russell J. Hubbard, over title to the old Umpqua Mill & Timber Company property. Hearings have been held and briefs filed since the suit was begun in 1941.

City Attorney Purvis advised that the matter of the city purchasing Eel Lake from the State Game Commission as an emergency water supply would be on the ballot at the fall election.

Election Explained
Mayor Skaaluren explained that the fall election would see four councilmen to be elected, and a mayor, the latter for a two-year term. Of the councilmen, three will be for the full four-year term and one for a two-year term.

Councilmen Knutsen, Richardson and Thompson will complete their terms this year. Councilman Baltazar was appointed to fill the term of Arthur Olson, when the latter moved away.

City Recorder Johnson was authorized to purchase a new typewriter and adding machine for the office.

The building committee was ordered to see about having the roof of the city building done over before winter.

The oiling of streets will be continued for a few weeks, with some of the residential streets on Wade's Flat to be oiled in the program. On these, only 20 feet in the center of the street will be oiled at this time, as many of the curbs are not yet in.

Need For More Hospital Beds Told in Report

WASHINGTON (AP)—Washington and Oregon did not have what the Federal Security Administration considers an acceptable minimum number of general hospital beds.

Oscar R. Ewing, federal security administrator, in a report to the president on a proposed ten-year program to improve the nation's health, said each state should have per thousand population a minimum of 4.5 beds in general hospitals, two beds for the chronically ill, five beds for mental patients and 2.5 beds for tuberculosis patients for each annual death from that disease.

His report said that in Washington there are only 3.9 general hospital beds per thousand population, while in Oregon only 3.3 such beds per thousand are available. He said his figures were based on 1946 statistics, with federal hospitals excluded.

In that year, the report continued, 98.2 per cent of the births in Washington were in hospitals while in Oregon 98 per cent were in hospitals. Infant deaths per thousand of live births in Oregon were 27.7 while maternal deaths per thousand live births were 1.0.

In Washington infant deaths per thousand of live births were 33.4 while maternal deaths per thousand of live births were 1.1. The report said the days of hospital care per capita in Washington were 1.1 in 1946 and in Oregon were .93.

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
