Horseplay on Water Causes Two to Drown

LAKE OF THE WOODS, Ore., Sept. 13.—(P)—Two men drowned in the lake here Saturday. The coroner's office identified the victims as Francis M. McCleod, 31 Grants Pass and Richard K. Talbot, Medford city employee.

Witnesses said the two men had rammed their boats in horseplay. McCleod's bigger boat rode up onto the craft in which Talbot was seated and the latter fell into the water, the coroner's office reported. McCleod jumped to the rescue, but the two men disappeared under the water after a struggle before men on shore could reach the spot.

The Medford city worker was one of a group of men at the lake to close the Boy Scout camp on the north edge of the lake after the summer camping season.

Hurricane Reported To Be Nearing Bermuda

MIAMI, Fla., Sept. 13.—(P)—Hurricane winds approaching 140 miles an hour velocity swept the British island of Bermuda in the Atlantic today.

The weather bureau's storm warning service at Miami said the center of the severe hurricane was only 65 miles southwest of Bermuda at 10:15 a. m. The storm was moving north-northwestward.

"Winds at Bermuda have reached hurricane force and will continue to increase until the storm passes," forecasters reported.

The center is expected to pass 40 to 60 miles west of Bermuda during the next few hours.

Children Believed Poisoned by Berries

SEATTLE, Sept. 13.—(P)—A 20-month-old Seattle girl died and three neighbor children were in the hospital today with what authorities think may be poisoning.

Sheriff Harlan S. Callahan said neighbors told him they thought

the children had eaten poisoned berries from bushes growing wild in the suburban Lake City district.

Carolyn Julia Strizek, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tom K. Strizek, died despite efforts of a fire department and deputy sheriffs to revive her.

Most seriously stricken, hospital attendants said, was Malcolm Frost, three-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Frost.

The other two children were Glenn Savacoli, 9, and Juanita Dawson, 4, both of Bothell.
