

Completion of Swim Pool Planned by City Manager

Roseburg's municipal swimming pool was completed Sept. 1 with \$10,000 cash remaining of the original funds, a financial report compiled by City Manager Matt Slankard reveals. This amount, together with contributions received in the current fund-raising campaign, sponsored by the Lions Club, will assure completion of the dressing rooms and possibly other proposed improvements, Slankard said today.

Slankard in May submitted to the mayor and city council an estimate of \$93,470 as the amount needed to build the pool. There was actually \$54,867.57 available to start the construction. It was believed at that time, the city manager said, there would not be enough money to

complete the work, unless some was obtained from other sources. Not only was the pool completed for \$50,262.03, which was more than \$13,000 less than the original estimate, but a maneuver on the part of the city manager netted the city an additional \$5,886.26 profit from the sale of surplus reinforcing steel. The total amount of money available for the work thus was \$60,754.13. Cost of the pool was \$30,262.03, leaving \$10,492.10 on hand. Less than \$500 in bills remains to be paid.

The swimming pool is completed, except for the underwater and overhead wiring and the piping in the filter room, said Slankard. The filtering equipment has not all been received. The bid of \$8,936 for the complete filtering system is listed in the report, but will not be paid for until in working order and passed by the state health department.

Of the total amount of labor used 1588 hours were of volunteer prisoner help and 564 hours donated by outsiders. There was no overtime paid. The regular wage of \$3.35 per hour was paid throughout the entire job, except that two men were paid \$1.45 for a short time during the peak construction period to act as leaders in the form work. Nothing was paid from the \$1000

The city manager estimates \$16,500 will be needed to finish the dressing rooms and landscaping. The current fund-raising campaign, while not yet completed, is expected to bring in an amount sufficient to finish the job, said Slankard. The Lions Club members are not, however, limiting their efforts to the amount necessary to bring the fund up to \$16,500, for any additional money can be put to a very useful purpose, Bruce Elliott, drive chairman stated. A full report on the funds netted will be made as soon as the returns are completed.

The dressing room plans call for a building 24x36 feet extending along the north side of the pool. The structure, according to Slankard's plans, approved Tuesday night by the city park commission, would include the boys' dressing room in the east end and the girls' dressing room in the west end. Each room would be 24x28 feet, leaving a 24x40-foot section for a lobby. The lobby would be divided with a counter, back of which would be a checking place for baskets and towels. The dressing rooms would each contain open lockers and 12 enclosed dressing booths.

The building would be constructed of pumice block and would contain metal doors, metal sash for windows and casings. Slankard is calling for estimates from contractors on plumbing, electrical work, construction of the outer walls and roof, all work to be contracted on a day basis. Quotations on this work must be received by Monday evening. Slankard said that his crew would do the cement work, walks and other jobs not requiring special skills.

Plans for improvement to the ground call for a wading pool, similar to that on East Commercial St., near the southwest corner of the swimming pool. Bleachers would eventually be built at the east and south ends. The remaining area would be

landscaped into park and playground. Entrance to the pool would be by steps downward from Hamilton street directly above the pool, by a sidewalk from Hamilton street entering the southeast corner of the park grounds, and by steps leading in from Jackson street at the west end of the pool.

American Airmen Back From Red-Held Berlin

FRANKFURT, Germany, Sept. 16.—(AP)—Two American airmen who parachuted into the Soviet zone of Germany are back safely today in the U. S. zone, the Air Force announced.

The two are Capt. Kenneth W. Slaker, Lincoln, Neb., and Lt. Clarence B. Steber, Mobile, Ala. The announcement said the two bailed out over the Russian zone early yesterday when their plane developed engine trouble.

Steber was brought to Frankfurt by U. S. liaison officers. He was pilot of a C-47 which was ferrying food from Wiesbaden to Berlin.

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State Hospital For Children Is Urged in Report

PORTLAND—(AP)—A state hospital for children was recommended in a report on Oregon's child health services, made under the American Academy of Pediatrics.

The survey directed by Dr. Carl G. Ashley and financed by the Oregon State Board of Health, said that Oregon needs a special children's hospital of at least 125 beds, and more hospital facilities for rheumatic fever.

This was one of several recommendations made after a three-year survey of facilities for child health. Surveys are being made in all the states, with the U. S. Children's Bureau and the U. S. Public Health Service cooperating with the American Academy of Pediatrics.

Oregon was slightly better than average in the total care received by its children, but below average in certain fields, the report showed.

Oregon has the lowest dental clinic services. The report recommended a law allowing dental hygienists to give children preventive treatment. "Dentist do not now have the time to perform the prophylactic service to children," explained the report.

Well-child conferences were also scarce in Oregon that the average. Nearly half Oregon's counties had no such conferences at all.

"Oregon is below average in all phases of community health services," the report added. Visits by public health nurses, mental hygiene facilities, and school medical services were all found below average.

Calling this chiefly an economic problem, the report urged an increase of salaries in the public health field.

This study did not set up a fixed standard for child care, but compared existing facilities to a cross-section average.
