'Round the World Revue' Is Slated At Vet Hospital

First appearance of the "Round the World Revue" currently in rehearsal at Los Angeles, will be at the Veterans Administration Hospital in Roseburg, Monday, Sept. 20. It was announced today by Veterans Hospital Camp Shows. The organization was established, last December at the request of the Office of Defense and Veterans Administration to continue the work of USO-Camp Shows hospital circuit.

Two shows now are in course of preparation. "Round the World Revue" will make its debut at Roseburg, and "Broadway Hillbillies" now being staged in New York, will arrive in Los Angeles Oct. 4.
