

United Nations Guard in Troubled Areas to Be Asked

PARIS, Sept. 20 (AP)—Secretary General Trygve Lie will demand urgent formation of a United Nations guard to forestall such acts as the assassination of Count Folke Bernadotte and to maintain order in disturbed areas.

As soon as possible after the 58 nations delegates assemble tomorrow, the U. N. administrative chief will ask for a United Nations constabulary of from 1,000 to 5,000 men backed by "the full authority of the United Nations."

U. S. Secretary of State Marshall and British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin have both arrived for tomorrow's opening. Problems arising out of the tense situation in Berlin and other factors in the cold war between East and West overshadow the conference.

A meeting of the three Western Foreign Ministers, Marshall, Bevin, and Robert Schuman, of France, was expected with the possibility that the Berlin crisis may be laid before the 58 nations.

In his annual report to the general assembly, Trygve Lie said a U. N. constabulary would have "greatly increased the effectiveness of the work of the security council, and have saved many lives, particularly in Indonesia and Palestine."

Dr. Jose Arce of Argentina, retiring president of the General Assembly, told the Associated Press Saturday the United Nations needed an army of 10,000 to maintain order in Palestine alone.

The assembly faces a long list of harsh political problems growing out of the cold war between East and West.

Berlin Problem Hardest
The most difficult problem before the assembly probably will be the current situation in Berlin that the United States, Britain and France had been attempting, so far in vain, to settle through secret negotiations with Russia.

The impasse in Berlin, where most Europeans profess to see the seeds of warfare, is not on the assembly program now. Most reliable information here, however, is that the United States has decided to place the problem before the assembly unless there is an unexpected, encouraging development in Moscow within the next 48 hours.

It is known that French officials are attempting to dissuade the Americans from taking this step in the hope that the four-power Moscow talks will be continued here by the foreign ministers themselves during the U. N. session. The British also were reported hesitant.

Other problems which definitely will come before the assembly are the fate of Italy's former African colonies, the Palestine situation, the government-guerrilla war in Greece and the control of atomic energy.

The money would go into a sinking fund which would be used when the construction of the home, got underway, Judge Busenbark said.

Two Sites Available
Two sites are available at present for the home. One is the location on E. Douglas St., where the former home was located before it was destroyed by fire in 1943. The other is a farm owned by the county near Winston. Any other possible sites would have to be determined later, the judge stated.

When the old county home burned down, the county was given permission to occupy, temporarily, the old State Soldiers Home, then standing vacant on the Roseburg Veterans Hospital grounds near the Melrose Road.

The government has informed the County Court that it desires to take over the old building for the use of the Veterans Hospital. The county has been given two years to vacate and find another location, the judge said.

The only alternative to maintaining a home, should the voters reject the proposal on the November ballot, would be for the County Welfare Department to pay for the care of the old people in private homes or nursing homes. No such homes are available in Douglas County now, Judge Busenbark stated.

Social Democrats Keep Control in Sweden

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, Sept. 20.—(AP)—Sweden's Social Democrats, although shorn of their absolute control of parliament, will continue to rule as a one-party government, Prime Minister Tage Erlander said today.

The party lost three seats in the lower house in yesterday's elections, according to preliminary final returns. It now has 112 of the 230 seats, to 118 for all other parties.

While the Social Democrats lost three seats, the liberals won 37, a gain of 31. The heaviest loser was the Conservative party, which dropped from 39 to 22 seats.

The Communists, who formerly held 15 seats, lost six of them, and the Agrarians won 30, compared to the 35 they gained in the 1944 elections.

Reds Raid Newsstand
The newspaper charge came shortly after Communists patrols raided newsstands in the Russian sector of Berlin yesterday, ripping and scattering anti-Red newspapers in an apparent showdown over the free dissemination of news.

The strong-arm tactics were denounced by American military government officials, who are considering a counter-embargo on Soviet-controlled publications.

The Americans said the Communist raids were a violation of four-power agreements for the free exchange of information throughout Germany.

While Communist police stood idly by, the Red squads moved swiftly from one newsstand to another in the Soviet sector, tearing up the western publications. They made dealers promise to stop selling the anti-Communist papers in the future, under threat of "other measures."

Asked what these measures would be, they pointed to gasoline cans, apparently indicating incendiary intentions.

The picket line protested the company's alleged refusal to rehire striking pilots as recommended by a presidential emergency board for the settlement earlier this year of a National Airlines strike.

Among other developments: Maritime—CIO stevedores prepared to move Army cargoes at full speed tomorrow for the first time since the CIO longshoremen's union tied up West Coast shipping with a strike Sept. 2.

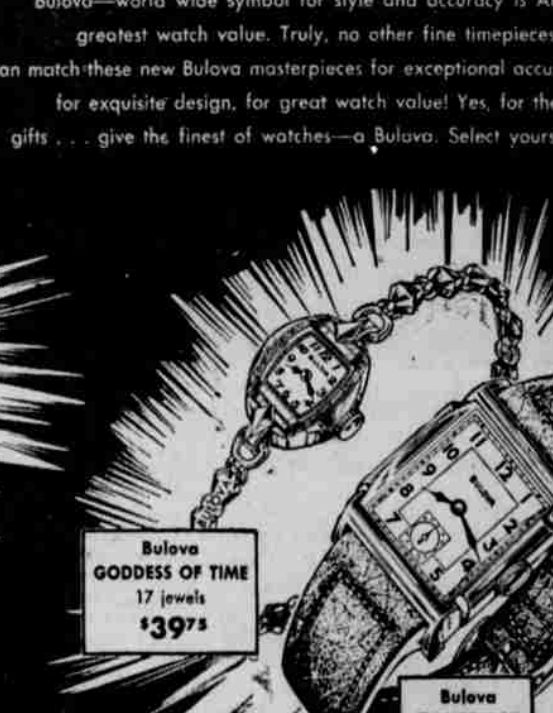
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
