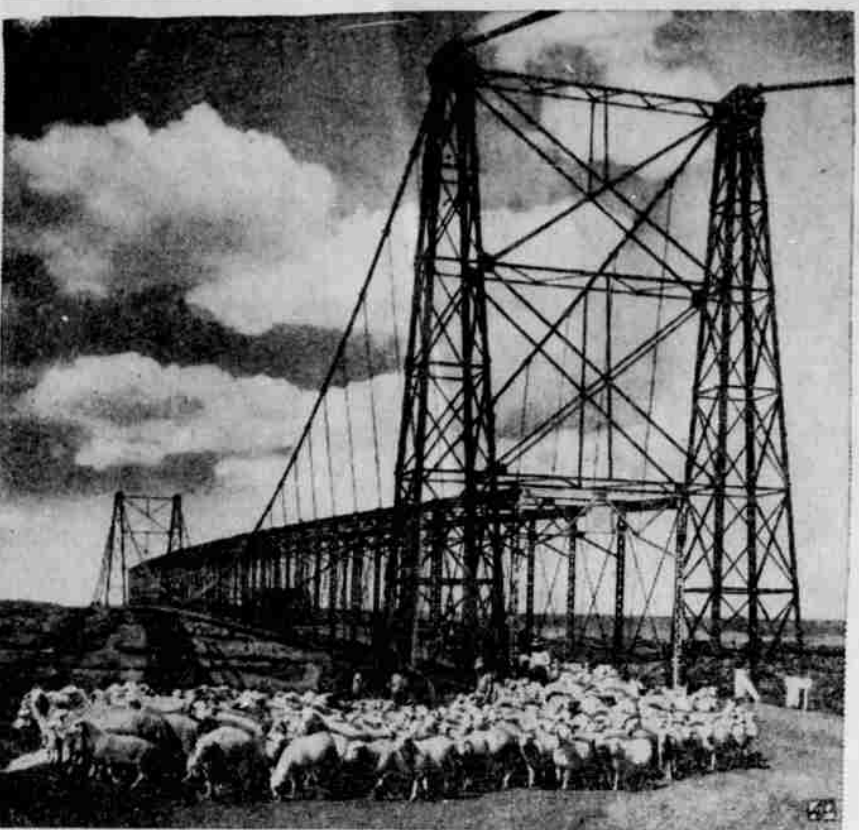

General Electric Hikes Prices on Appliances

NEW YORK, Sept. 20.—General Electric Co., has posted price increases on a number of its home appliances, the average on each line ranging from 2.5 per cent to 8.8 per cent.

C. R. Pritchard, manager of marketing of the company's appliance and merchandise department, said the action was "necessitated by and reflects only the recent increase in costs of components, materials and freight."

Covered by the advances are some refrigerator models, ranges, water heaters, the automatic washer and dryer.

Accidents Kill Two Men in Josephine County

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Sept. 20.—Avery J. Tipton, 58, of this city was killed instantly when hit by an automobile driven by Robert George Varner, 36, also of Grants Pass, while the victim was walking on the Redwood Highway near the Josephine County Fairgrounds during the closing of the 1948 county fair Sunday night.

In a second Sunday accident, Claude Burlin Potts, 41, Grants Pass, died shortly after a bulldozer he was operating overturned and crushed him in logging operations near Rogue River.

Average Incomes in U. S. Double That of 'Boom' Era

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20.—The average income of Americans is about double what it was in 1929, a "boom" year in its day.

A Commerce Department report showed today that the average income of individuals (as distinct from corporations) increased from \$680 in 1929 to \$1,323 last year, a rise of 95 per cent.

But it noted that "from 1929 to 1947 there was a pronounced relative shift of income from the New England and Middle Eastern regions to the West and South."

This was attributed mostly to industrial development in the two regions.

A table showing average incomes for individuals in 1929 and 1947, and the percentage of increase includes:

Far West (California, Nevada, Oregon and Washington)—\$865 and \$1,559, 80 per cent.

Yale's quarterback, Robert (Tex) Furse, had a passing average of 61.9 last fall. This was the best mark in the nation, including collegiate and professional circles.
