

Wildlife Pictures Shown in Chicago By James H. Bond

James H. Bond, former resident of Roseburg, who gave people of this community a preview of his Yukon Territory wildlife picture, "From Out of These Mountains," last December, is in Chicago, where he is presenting his picture daily at the Marshall Field and Co. store. The store also has arranged a display of Bond's trophies.

Bond made his picture while on a study for the Yukon Territory Fish and Game Commission. While visiting in Roseburg with his brother, Cleo Bond, and other relatives, he was persuaded to show his picture at a public program sponsored jointly by the Roseburg Rod and Gun Club and Junior High School Student Body. The capacity audience so enthused Bond that he took his picture on tour of Oregon in the interest of wildlife conservation and organization of sportsmen's clubs.

Oregon showings attracted so much interest that he was called into various other states and has been almost continuously on the road with his film since last December.

He also has written a book on his experiences. This book is soon to be released by the publishers.

Because of his interest in building stronger sportsmen's clubs in Oregon, Bond is giving clubs of the state the commission rights on sale of his book.

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choice Indian River citrus area and to vegetable crops along the southern and eastern rim of Lake Okechobee.

Key West alone estimated loss at one million dollars, principally to its waterfront and shipping. More than 100 pleasure and commercial boats were sunk. Many were smashed to pieces. A 200-foot dock was swept out to sea and the city's two principal commercial docks badly damaged.

Power and telephone lines were hard hit. The island's sponge and fishing fleet was practically wiped out. Damage to boats alone was estimated at more than \$300,000.

All schools on the island sustained some damage. About 1,000 trees were uprooted in Key West alone. Ten inches of rain fell there. Some Navy boats and installations were damaged but no official figures were available.

Extensive damage was reported along the Overseas Highway and fishing camps in the Keys were hard hit.

Miami Area Swept

The greater Miami area was buffeted by gale winds for more than 30 hours and eight inches of rain flooded the streets. Nearly 18,000 telephones in Miami were put out of order and electric service disrupted in many sections. Miami Beach reported only minor damage.

Grapefruit was stripped from trees in areas hit by the storm and some of that left on was scarred or thorned.

Agent C. B. Kimes of St. Lucie County estimated 10 per cent of the grapefruit there had been knocked to the ground. No estimate was received from Indian River County, where some of the state's choicest oranges are produced.

Fields of growing vegetables in the "salad bowl" section around Lake Okechobee were under water and pasture lands were flooded.

"It's going to be hard on cattle," one rancher said.

Up and down the lower East Coast the wind and tides battered beaches and brought damage to cottages and shrubbery.

Plane Crash Fatal To Police Sgt. E. A. Burtch

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McCullum and accompanied by L. L. Powers, to the crash scene, approximately 53 miles from Roseburg. The officers found Burtch's body still in the plane upon their arrival.

Upon receipt of word by telephone from Officer Byrd that the flyer was killed, Officer Thomas McKelvie and Deputy Coroner Marion Emmitt also departed for the scene.

Burtch was flying the plane alone. The low-winged red Blenda monoplane was owned by a Medford flying club, of which he was a member.

Crash Witnessed

Report of the plane crash was sent in to the State Police by Earl Lovely, Canyonville, who was one of the eyewitnesses to the crash. Lovely, along with Baxter Fairber, and Walter Ferber of Sweet Home, Hatten Lovely, Buster Benson, Henry Brown, Vince Lewis and James Evans, residents of the vicinity, reported hearing the plane as the pilot attempted to find his way through the clouds. They also reported seeing the plane crash and went immediately to the scene.

According to Sgt. Harrell, the plane came down on the top of a little knoll in second growth timber in a rugged mountainous area, about a mile off the county road. The scene was reached by ascending a steep sheep trail through Brown's pasture land. The body had to be brought back down the trail on a stretcher.

Formerly employed by Boeing Aircraft at Seattle in the radio department, Burtch had been making his home at Medford while with the State Police. He is survived by his widow and 5-year-old son. The body was brought to Roseburg, and services will be announced from the Roseburg Funeral Home upon arrival of the family today.

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replace self-help, nor can we move toward general cooperation without a maximum of mutual help among close neighbors.

The secretary obviously referred to the European reconstruction program and western Europe's efforts to federate.

He called for early peace settlements with Japan and Germany so that those nations "may exist as democratic and peaceful nations subject to safeguards against the revival of military or economic means of aggression and so they may, in due course, demonstrate their qualification for admission to membership in the United Nations."

Free Palestine Favored
Marshall advocated admission to the United Nations of Israel and Trans-Jordan, two combatants in the Palestine War.

The United States, he said, "favors" a Palestine free from strife and the threat of strife, with both Jews and Arabs assured of the peaceful development envisaged by the actions of the general assembly and the security council.

Two days ago Marshall endorsed Folke Bernadotte's report on Palestine. Today Marshall also advocated:

1. Early demobilization of troops in Palestine to permit a return to normal, peacetime conditions there.

2. The repatriation of refugees who wish to return and live in peace with their neighbors.

3. Economic aid to the Jews and Arabs to restore and strengthen their economic well-being.

Korea, Greece, Touched On
Then, turning to other sections of the world, Marshall demanded a unified, independent Korea, with membership in the United Nations, and that "Greece be made secure from aggressive and unlawful interference from without."

He asked "a negotiated settlement without further bloodshed in Indonesia," where the Indonesian Republic and The Netherlands East Indies government are at odds.

Marshall also called for adoption of an international system for the control of atomic energy and a progressive reduction of armaments "under an adequate and dependable guaranty against violation."

If these world problems are solved, he said, "new hope would arise among men and new confidence among the nations of the world."

He assured the Soviet bloc there was "no plot among members of this organization to keep any nation or group of nations in a minority. The minority is self-imposed."

"Nations consistently in the minority would be welcomed among the ranks of the majority, but not at the price of compromise of basic principle."

On the domestic front, Dewey said that "the most important single measure to meet the danger of inflation is to cut down on every avoidable dollar of spending by government."

He said the Republicans would introduce "good management" into government but added that "our purpose is to control inflation, not to bring on deflation."

The Republican nominee called for "a revision in taxes to encourage savings and stimulate production."

Safe Driving Being Taught to Students At Roseburg High

Today's high school students are being taught in the classroom how to drive safely on the highway. And to practice their driving skill in actual traffic, they have the use of dual control cars furnished through cooperation of the AAA.

In Roseburg, the dual control car supplied to the school system was furnished through the joint cooperation of the AAA and the Hansen Motor Co. It was received by school officials last week.

About 75 boys and girls are enrolled in the driving classes at Roseburg High School. Norman West, who is serving as instructor, in the summer attended a driver training instructors' course held at Portland under auspices of the Oregon Motor Association and State Department of Education.

Students must have learners' permits before they use the car. One student sits behind the wheel, while three others observe from the back seat. The instructor uses the dual controls, which consist of a duplicate set of clutch and brake pedals.

Actual instruction behind the wheel is limited to 30 minutes for each pupil, because of limitations on an individual's ability to learn and absorb, and to prevent fatigue, West explained. Classes meet five days a week. Classroom instruction includes study of the rules of the road, as well of mechanical functions of the automobile. Students are tested for their licenses by the state examiners.

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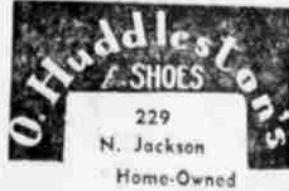


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
