

R.H.S. TROUNCES COQUILLE, 20-18; AMERICAN LEAGUE IN 3-WAY TIE

Victory Posted On Brilliant Rally In Fourth Quarter

With four minutes gone in the fourth quarter, a brilliant rally netted them the slim 20-18 lead that proved to be enough for a win over the Coquille Red Devils in their initial home game at Finlay Field Friday evening.

Actually the turning point came just before the end of the third quarter when Dale Black blocked an attempted Coquille punt on their 28 giving the ball to the Indians.

With Roseburg in possession on the Coquille 28 at the start of the fourth, a pass to Bob Scott gave the Indians another first down. At this point Roseburg was penalized five yards for back field in motion, making it third and 15 to go. A long pass from Bob Scott to Kenneth Payne, followed up by two running plays with Scott carrying the ball, put "Cec" Sherwood's boys into the promised land for the winning touchdown. Jack Mathis climaxed with a conversion that was good for an additional point.

Coquille lost a heartbreaker in the final seconds of the game, when Dean Wolgamott caught a pass and ran for paydirt. It looked like he was going to make it, but was stopped on the Roseburg five. Unfortunately the play was called back due to a Coquille offside.

Roseburg sparked the touchdown battle after nine minutes of the first quarter on a lateral to Bob Sanders. The second quarter saw most of the action in Roseburg territory, with the exception of a fourth down punt by the Indians from their 40 to Coquille's 20. The Red Devils started plunging down the field. Four first downs later they were in

paydirt, tying up the game 6-6.

Fumbles Costly
Early in the third quarter a Roseburg fumble on their 40 was recovered by Coquille and run all the way back to the Indian seven. The Red Devils ground through the Roseburg defense, and Jim Clark ran the ball in to the end zone making it 12-6 for Coquille.

Another Roseburg fumble was recovered by Coquille's Wolgamott who ran the ball to the Roseburg 15. Coquille advanced to Roseburg's nine, and the Indians called a time out. Clark again ran the ball to paydirt on the following play, giving the Red Devils a clear 18-6 edge.

Coquille kicked off to the Roseburg 30. A pass from Sanders to Black was good for a 45-yd. gain. Roseburg started to drive for the Coquille goal line, and four consecutive first downs later, Scott carried the ball over to narrow the score 18-12. This converted for another point.

A short time later Black blocked the kick that sparked a Roseburg victory.

Yankees, Indians, Bosox Knotted At Top Position

"Two's company and three's a crowd," the old saying goes and, brother, that's exactly how the Boston Red Sox, Cleveland Indians and New York Yankees feel today.

These American League teams are in a flatfooted tie for the circuit leadership but by nightfall there will be some elbow room.

The Yanks and Detroit Tigers are responsible for this thrilling situation. The Yanks dumped the Red Sox, 9-6, yesterday and the Tigers upset the Indians, 4-3.

Boston and Cleveland began the day's activities tied for the top but now all three of the contenders boast the same record—91 victories, 56 defeats. All have seven games to play.

The Red Sox and Yanks go at each other again today while the Indians take on the fifth place Tigers in Detroit. Thus, at the most only two teams can leave the lead come Sunday morning and should the Indians bow, only one will be in the catbird seat.

Billy Johnson got into the game as a pinch hitter in the fifth inning and belted a three-run homer. The blow, off relief and losing pitcher Earl Johnson, highlighted a four-run rally that enabled the Yanks to overcome a 5-3 deficit.

Fred Hutchinson Stars
The shining light in the Tiger triumph were pitcher Fred Hutchinson and outfielders Dick Wakefield and Vic Wertz.

Hutchinson, although rocked for homers by Larry Doby, Ken Keltner and Joe Gordon, stopped the Indians on seven hits in out-pitching Cleveland's 20-game winner, Bob Lemon. The round-trippers brought to 30 the number yielded by Hutch this year. A loop record.

Wakefield drove in the first Tiger run and scored the second while Wertz broke up the game with a two-run seventh inning double to snap a 2-2 stalemate. The defeat ended a seven-game Cleveland winning streak.

In the only other game played in the American League the Chicago White Sox shaded the St. Louis Browns, 4-3. Al Gettel halved the Browns on five hits.

In the National League, the second place St. Louis Cardinals, behind the brilliant five-hit pitching of Brecheen, stopped the Chicago Cubs, 4-1, to keep alive their mathematical chance of catching Boston's Braves.

In the other National League game the Cincinnati Reds edged the Pittsburgh Pirates, 4-3.

Oakland Victory Over Sacramento Faces Protest

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Oregon Staters Lose to Trojan Gridders, 21 to 6

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 25.—(AP)—Southern California's Trojans, safely by their first barrier in the Pacific Coast Conference grid campaign, head into rougher weather, effective next Saturday.

The Troys, looking a little less than magnificent, removed the pelt of the Oregon State Beavers last night, but the skinning was by a thin slice.

The final score was 21 to 6, but the out-manned Oregon Staters held the defending conference champions to a slim 14-6 margin until a long (44-yard) pass connected in the end zone in the last 40 seconds of the game.

Trojan Coach Jeff Cravath doubtless was holding back some of his fireworks for the next opponent on the schedule—Ohio State at Columbus.

Blessed with more than ample reserve strength, both in the line and the backfield, as compared to Oregon State, the Troys got off to a 14-0 lead after much fumbling around.

Oregon State, put on a 73-yard drive for six points before the half ended, thanks to the alternate passing of halfbacks Don Samuel and Ken Carpenter and that's the way it stood until quarterback Dean Dill found Jack Kirby with his last minute touchdown pass in the final quarter.

The first Trojan score was a 35-yard, nine play thrust, with Don Dill powering over from the three.

The next was the best play of an otherwise slow affair. Jimmy Powers lateraled to shifty Jay Roundy, who headed for the side lines cut back and traversed 35 yards for the tally. Dill kicked all three points after touchdowns.

USC had the statistical edge—356 yards to 239 running and passing—but its punting was poor and pass defense none too effective.

Six Wrestlers To Be Seen in Action On Tonight's Bill

Six top-ranking wrestlers are scheduled to vie in a three-star mat show here tonight that is expected to pack the Roseburg Armory to capacity. The weekly grappling program gets under way at 8:30 p. m.

A one-fall opener will match Billy Fox, ex-marine, against Glen Knox, the Tennessee villain who was downed in straight falls by Labelle here last week.

Fox was impressive in defeating Dano MacDonald here last week. Labelle, who also defeated Tiger Nenoff in straight falls here two weeks ago, will be the popular favorite to toss Ross into the discard as both strive for championship recognition.

Elton Owen will referee all three matches.

The underdog Indians were given a bare outside chance to challenge Coach Jim Aiken's big, veteran team by virtue of their 26-20 defeat last week of San Jose State. Stanford trailed without a point until late in the third.

Oregon won its opener from Santa Barbara College last week, 55-7.
