

Suits Ask Court To Fix Values Of Rights of Way

Umpqua Plywood Corporation has filed three separate suits in Circuit Court, asking determination of the value of rights-of-way for the construction of a logging road into its timbered area on the North Umpqua River in the Rock Creek area.

The suits are being brought against the Douglas County Lumber Company in one suit, Douglas County and the Douglas County Lumber Company in the second suit and Evans Products Company in the third suit.

Umpqua Plywood's property is located in townships 24 and 25, south range 1, and townships 24 and 25, south range 2, all in Douglas County. The area is described as rugged and mountainous, and a 100-foot right-of-way is sought across the property of the defendants. A previously agreed-upon survey has been made, but the value of the rights-of-way and damages cannot be agreed upon by the parties concerned.

The plaintiff offers what it considers a "reasonable cash market value" not to exceed \$500 for the property owned by the Douglas County Lumber Company for 3.47 acres to be acquired in the first suit.

The second suit states that Douglas County Lumber Company is purchasing on contract from Douglas County property that the road must cross. Umpqua Plywood offers as a "reasonable value" \$2800 for the 6.72 acres involved.

The largest right-of-way acreage is that across the property of Evans Products, involving 11.70 acres in one section and 9.49 acres in the second section, for which \$8,000 is offered as the reasonable value.

The court is asked to assess and determine the value of the lands sought and damages that might be incurred.

Pared Speech On Anti-Communism Subject of Probe

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—(AP)—John W. Studebaker told senators yesterday about the censorship he says the Federal Security Administration imposed on an anti-Communist speech he wrote when commissioner of education.

The reaction he got from Senator O'Connor (D-Md.) was: "They strengthened the speech." Studebaker was called before a Senate investigating committee because of the row he had earlier this year with Oscar R. Ewing, Federal Security administrator.

As commissioner of education, Studebaker served under Ewing. In July, Studebaker quit and accused Ewing of blocking the Office of Education from "exposing the tactics and dangers of Communism" in the schools. Ewing denied it.

Before the Senate committee, Studebaker testified that last spring the FSA Office of Information advised him to change a speech on Communism he was to make in St. Louis.

He said Harry Rosenfield, an assistant to Ewing, objected to certain parts of the speech in which Studebaker hit at the Russian government as a dictatorship.

Studebaker said Rosenfield suggested he change his phrasing from "Russian government" to "the Russian system." Rosenfield also suggested, he said, the deletion of a statement that the American people would be willing to cooperate with the Russian government if it dropped its "aggressive world intentions."

Speech Made Stronger

O'Connor said: "The censorship was very helpful there. They strengthened the speech for you by making it a stronger statement against Communism."

Studebaker said Rosenfield objected to the statement about what the Soviets might do if the Soviets dropped their "aggressive" policies. He added: "He said that was getting over into the province of the State Department."

O'Connor said: "You were not going out to pronounce foreign policy, were you?"

Studebaker said he was merely stating the government's policy as he recognized it.

Studebaker said he objected to centralization of administration in FSA and stripping the education office of its authority.

"I wish to make perfectly clear," Studebaker said, "that it was never my purpose and is not now my purpose to cast any doubt upon the loyalty of Administrator Ewing or any of his."

O'Connor said: "In other words, you object to the Office of Education being under the Federal Security Administration."

Studebaker replied: "The commissioners of education's authority should stem from a board of good citizens who determine the policies."

Bauxite Discovered In Clackamas County

PORTLAND, Sept. 28.—(AP)—The State Department of Geology and Mineral Industries yesterday reported a new discovery of bauxite in Clackamas County, Ore.

The department said samples indicate the ore cannot be used for the customary production of aluminum, but may be of value for other purposes.

The outcropping apparently stretched a mile on the southwest side of the Clackamas River. No tests have been made on the east side of the river.

Samples to a depth of eight feet indicated this composition: Alumina 43.5; silica 21.5 percent; iron ten percent; titania one percent; other materials 14.5 percent. The samples were too high in silica content for aluminum production by the Bayer process.

The discovery was six miles from Estacada, or about 35 miles southeast of Portland.

Longshore Strike, In 27th Day, Finds Both Sides Firm

SEATTLE, Sept. 28.—(AP)—President Frank P. Folsie of the Waterfront Employers' Association was en route to his San Francisco headquarters today after a brief visit here during which he repeated his group's determination to stand pat in the 27-day-old maritime strike.

He said the WEA will continue to refuse to negotiate with unions whose leaders have failed to sign non-Communist affidavits under the Taft-Hartley Act. Folsie met with some 50 Washington members of the WEA. The WEA and Pacific American Shipowners' Association are prepared for a long, tough fight, he declared.

William Gettings, regional representative of the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union, replied: "The Union officials are elected by the membership. Our Union, unlike the Employers' Association, is not controlled by a board of directors in an ivory tower in San Francisco."
