

Soviet Planes Again 'Buzz' U. S. Aircraft

Quincy, Mass., U. S. representative at the four-power Berlin air safety center, filed the protest against the air corridor incidents. He said the protest was based upon accounts by the pilots of two C-54 Skymasters.

The pilots reported they were buzzed (dived upon) by Soviet Yaks as they were carrying cargoes to Berlin through the Hamburg-Berlin corridor. They were in-bound from Fasselburg, coal base for the air lift.

Gookin said the pilots asserted the Yaks dived down at the supply transports and around them, going within 100 feet.

A dispatch of the American-licensed Dena News Agency, attributed to informed quarters in the Soviet Zone's administration, declared the Russians were illegally reviving armament industries in their occupation zone, especially aircraft parts production.

Such activity and Allied intelligence sources said they had received similar reports—would constitute violation of four-power agreements for the demilitarization of Germany which began with the Potsdam declaration.

German Prisoners Escape

Another potential point of tension developed around Berlin police said about 25 Germans allegedly consigned to forced labor in Russian-operated uranium mines in Saxony made a daring escape last night.

The prisoners made their dash for freedom while the train in which they were riding was passing through the British sector of Berlin, the police said.

Full details of the escape were not disclosed. A British spokesman said the Germans who fled

now are in the custody of West Berlin police and are being interrogated.

British authorities also are investigating the case, and it was indicated a statement may be released.

German police sources, confirmed by the British, said 52 Germans were bound for the uranium mines aboard a train which halted last night near the zoological garden in the British sector. About half succeeded in breaking away and fleeing through the station. Although railroad police closed off the area, none was reported recaptured.

The alleged conscripts were presumably en route from points west of Berlin in the Soviet zone to the mines near the Saxony-Czech border.

Missing Plane That Bore Mother and Son Sighted

EDMONTON, Alta., Sept. 29.—(CP)—R. C. A. F. headquarters announced two Dakota aircraft, part of a seven-plane air search, today sighted the wreck of a missing plane in which a mother and her son were flying from Watson Lake, Y. T., to Fort Nelson, B. C.

A report from Fort Nelson said the light plane was only a few hundred yards from the Alaska Highway which runs along the coast of Alaska. The plane had been following to Fort Nelson.

The two aircraft reported no signs of life around the overturned plane, but officials said Mrs. Linter and her son may have escaped uninjured and started to walk along the highway to Fort Nelson.

PAYS \$20 FINE

John W. Kornegay, Roseburg, paid a fine of \$20 after pleading guilty to a disorderly conduct charge in Municipal Court today, reported Judge Ira B. Riddle. He pleaded not guilty, however, to a further charge of being drunk. His hearing was set for Monday, and bail was set by Judge Riddle at \$30.

Ex-City Recorder Gets Embezzlement Penalty

PRINEVILLE, Ore., Sept. 29.—(AP)—Former City Recorder J. D. Seymour, 32, has been sentenced to 18 months in the state prison on a charge of embezzling city funds here.

He pleaded guilty before circuit Judge Ralph S. Hamilton. The court was told the money has been repaid.

Seymour resigned Sept. 13 after state auditors reported a possible shortage of \$2,039 from Prineville city sewer department accounts. He had been appointed to the job last November at a salary of \$250 a month.

Under questioning by Judge Hamilton, the defendant explained he had used \$1,000 for investment in a potato crop still to be harvested. The rest, he said, was used to pay personal debts.

Saturday Last Day For Voter Registration

Saturday will be the last day for registration to vote in the Nov. 2 general election, announced County Clerk Roy Agce. Agce said his office will remain open Friday and Saturday nights of this week until 8 p. m. to take care of persons unable to come in during regular office hours.

Registrations have been picking up somewhat this last week, as the deadline draws near, but there has been no great rush.

Tabulations are not complete so no figures on total registration are yet available, he said. There was a much heavier registration just prior to the primary election, when more than 17,000 registered voters were recorded.

AFL Egg-Poultry Union Workers Walk Off Jobs

PORTLAND, Sept. 29.—(AP)—AFL Egg and Poultry Union workers walked off their jobs at the city's largest poultry processing plant today. Two pickets were posted.

S. W. Barker, agent for the union, said the 100 employees at the Northwest Poultry and Dairy Company plant were striking because of a breakdown in wage negotiations. About 300 workers in 25 other plants here are expected to continue working.

The union originally had asked a 25-cent-an-hour boost, but Barker said this had been reduced to 18 cents. He said the top employer offer was 10 cents.

C. W. Norton, manager of the struck plant, said he would make the plant facilities available to producers who want to process their own poultry.

Explosion, Triple Crash Fail to Arouse Farmer

ST. CHARLES, Ill., Sept. 29.—(AP) Farmer Maurice Regnole is a sound sleeper.

While he took a hard-earned night's sleep, his silo exploded. The blast blew off the silo roof—sent it soaring 50 feet—and bulged its concrete walls.

The silo collapsed onto the barn. The barn folded onto the feed shed. The feed shed knocked over the windmill. The windmill dropped onto the implement shed.

Blaming silage gas, Regnole told reporters he had heard a slight noise during the night. But he didn't get out of bed to investigate.

Brown Bridge Repaired, Reopened to Traffic

Brown Bridge, which spans the North Umpqua River at the Garden Valley Road, was reopened to traffic this noon following repairs of damages caused by an overloaded truck. It was reported by Duwood Owen, assistant county roadmaster.

Owen said the cap of the second trestle bent from the east end of the bridge had been damaged. The damage was discovered yesterday morning, apparently having occurred the night before. Owen said that no logging truck was responsible.

MORE FUNDS FOR ITALY

Jackson County Facing Heavy Fruit Crop Loss

MEDFORD, Ore., Sept. 29.—(AP)—A million dollar fruit crop loss was forecast for Jackson County today unless unseasonal rains ease off.

C. B. Cordy, county horticultural agent, said \$250,000 worth of Bartlett pears already have been lost because of rain in the picking season.

He estimated that 1,250,000 boxes of pears remain to be harvested and that the work must be done before Oct. 23 if they are to be saved. He said 225 pear pickers are needed at once.

Cordy said 75,000 boxes of pears must be picked each day until then. Every day the rain interferes with the harvesting the loss may be as high as \$200,000, he said.

Mitchum to Stand Trial in 'Reefer' Case

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20 dancer Vicki Evans, 25, and Robin Ford, 31, real estate man, are charged with possessing a drug weed, popularly known as marijuana. Cigarettes made from it are referred to in slang as "reefers."

The four were arrested shortly after midnight last Sept. 1, at a secluded cottage in Laurel Canyon, north of Hollywood.

Mitchum spoke a clear "not guilty" after his lawyer's arguments failed. Ford and Miss Lewis also pleaded innocent. Trial for the three was set for Nov. 22.

Miss Evans did not enter a plea, as her attorney asked for time to argue for dismissal on grounds that evidence against her is insufficient. This will be heard Oct. 7.

Benefits Pointed Out

In the circulation of petitions, Bollman said he has been pointing out the following facts which must be considered by the signers:

The present city tax is 15.5 mills, but 2.1 mills paid by rural areas for the Rural Fire District would be eliminated, and in addition the fire insurance rate would be cut approximately another 2 mills, if the area is voted in. This would leave a net increase in taxation, based on this year's rate, of 11.5 mills. On \$1000 assessed valuation, this would mean \$11.50 per year. Bollman pointed out that assessed valuations should not be confused with sales value of the property, assessed values are a great deal lower.

Benefits to be derived from the city would include the city manager plan, police protection day and night, seven days a week, added fire protection, and maintenance of streets. Bollman also pointed out that the Sheriff's office is not set up to give the type of police protection outside the city as City Police protection can afford. Only one fire truck is available for rural fire protection now, whereas all trucks are available in case of a fire in the city limits.

Benefits would include street improvements, sewage system and street lighting.

Atomic Bomb Plants Barred to Bally Unions

ers and the CIO United Public Workers.

A Congressional Committee heard testimony only yesterday from a self-described former Communist that the U. E. is "the largest Communist-dominated organization in the United States."

The Public Workers Union, with a large membership of government employees, also has been under scrutiny in Congress. The Atomic Energy Commission rap at the union made no reference to the recent congressional charges of atomic spying.

Chairman David E. Lillenthal announced the Commission's action against both the U. E. and the Public Workers Union in separate letters to Charles E. Wilson, president of the General Electric Company, and William B. Harrell, business manager of the University of Chicago.

G. E. and the University of Chicago operate atomic plants under contract with the government.

In both letters as well as in a third to NLRB Chairman Paul M. Herzog, Lillenthal said all atomic energy facilities must be operated "in a manner best calculated to assure that those who participate in the program are

loyal to the United States."

This includes those, he declared, who, though themselves not employees of contractors, do exercise administrative, negotiating and disciplinary authority over such employees of contractors as are members of union bargaining units.

Lillenthal noted in his letter to Wilson that G. E. felt it might jeopardize its relations with U. E. in other, non-atomic plants if it refused on its own authority to recognize the union at the new Knolls II Atomic Power Laboratory being set up at Schenectady, N. Y.

Hence his letter was intended as a commission directive to the company.

In his letter to Herzog announcing the end of the union recognition ban, Lillenthal said the exemption made in the case of Oak Ridge has proved satisfactory from a security standpoint. But he added:

"It may be that many new problems will arise at other commission installations where novel conditions and new unions may be involved."

The CIO United Chemical Workers and several AFL unions have been recognized at the Oak Ridge Plants. All of them have complied with the non-Communist provision of the Taft-Hartley law.
