

Report on Hospital Fund Drive Slated Tomorrow Noon

The second official report luncheon of the Douglas Community Hospital building fund will be held in the Umpqua Hotel's Civic Room tomorrow at noon. H. O. Fargeter, general chairman of the campaign, announced today.

"At the first report meeting last Monday \$62,245 was reported bringing the campaign grand total to \$188,345. We are all counting on 100 percent attendance of salesmen, saleswomen, chairmen, majors and captains of the various divisions at tomorrow's luncheon," Fargeter said.

He added that, "We are in the closing stages of this great civic project to provide much needed hospital beds for this area. The campaign closes with our Victory Dinner on Oct. 6."

"Let's make it a real victory dinner with an outstanding report from all divisions tomorrow. We can easily go over the minimum \$300,000 goal at this second report meeting if everyone turns in their subscriptions and pledges," the chairman concluded.

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Sept. 30 (AP)—Delbert Jasper Hammer, 38, of Merrill, was crushed to death Wednesday evening when a tractor rolled over on him at the John Liske ranch near Midland.

Hammer, an employee of the Garrison Mitchell ranch of Merrill, was attempting to back the tractor up a ramp onto a truck. The heavy tractor slid up the ramp but turned upside down, killing Hammer instantly.

In an indirect reference to President Truman, Dewey said: "They mustn't assume that because a person in a position of high importance in the nation is going around preaching disunity, that we are in fact divided."

He added, "let me send this message from Great Falls to Paris and beyond through the iron curtain: The Republican party is engaged in this campaign for the express purpose of bringing our people closer together so that they can realize their great future and find peace with honor in the world."

The crowd thundered its approval as he declared:

"And let no dictator or trigger-happy militarist anywhere make any mistake about that purpose."
