Tigers Again In Way of Cleveland's Bid for Pennant

The Detroit Tigers once again stand in the way of Cleveland's bid for its first American League pennant since 1920.

The Indians can assure themselves of at least a tie by beating the Bengals today. It's the first game of Cleveland's three game series with Detroit.

The front-running tribe leads Boston and New York by a game and a half. Two Cleveland triumphs or one victory plus one defeat for the Yankees and Red Sox will enable the Indians to clinch the pennant.

Eight years ago the Tigers not only blocked a Cleveland flag drive, but went on to grab the pennant themselves.

The Yanks beat the Philadelphia Athletics, 9-7, and the Red Sox knocked off the Washington Senators, 7-3, yesterday to keep their faint flag hopes alive.

The Indians had the day off. Nitty relief pitching on the part of Raschi saved the day for the Yanks.

The Red Sox, led by Dom Di Maggio and Pesky, socked three Washington pitchers for 15 hits. Pesky and Di Maggio collected three safeties apiece and drove in five runs.

The Tigers turned back the St. Louis Browns, 7-2, in the other American League game. In the National League the St. Louis Cardinals took a double header from the Pittsburgh Pirates, 6-1 and 4-1, to tie the Brooklyn Dodgers for second place. Drain Warriors Post Win Over Reedsport J-Vs

Coach Bill Chatham proved that small schools can play effective 11-man ball, when his Drain Warriors soundly defeated the Reedsport J-Vs, 25-0, in Drain's first home game under the lights Thursday night. This is the Warrior outfit's first season at 11-man ball.

Drain started down the touchdown trail early in the first quarter on a pass from Bob Ballish to Ed Duncan, netting 30 yards on the play. Bob Cellers carried the ball over for Drain's first touchdown.

Drain continued to churn toward Reedsport territory, getting down to the three. The ball was called back to the 13 on an illegal use of hands penalty, but the Warriors packed it back to the five before the whistle ended the quarter.

With Drain on the Reedsport five at the start of the next frame, a pass three yards and zone was stopped by a Reedsport player. The ball bounced out of his hands and into the open arms of Cellers, who continued into paydirt, making it 12-0, Drain.

The fourth quarter proved to be a 64-dollar one for the Warriors. Cellers smashed through center for a long haul to the Reedsport three. A pass from Ballish to Marvin Swearingin, who was standing in the end zone, bounced out of his hands and into those of Don Skinner. Drain tackled. This freak play netted seven points, six on Swearingin's touchdown, and one on Skinner's conversion. That was one of Drain's favorable features last night—no wasted motion. Swearingin intercepted a Reedsport pass shortly thereafter, and ran it 35 yards for the fourth Drain touchdown.

Reedsport's only break, which eventually proved to be a bad one, came near the end of the game. A pass from Frank Jackson, back, to Bob Ecklund, end, from the 50, was good for 42 yards. The next play saw the ball on the Drain five. But a Drain man recovered on a bad Reedsport play, and it was first and ten for the Warriors on their own four. A pass play got the ball back to the 50. Another pass put the Drain offense on Reedsport's 31, and the game ended.

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Fans to See Two New Wrestlers On Saturday Bill

Billy Hunter of Vancouver, B. C., considered one of the new brilliant stars in Canadian wrestling, will make his debut at the Roseburg Armory Saturday night. Matchmaker Don Owen has given the youngster a formidable foe—Tex Hager, coast light-heavyweight champion who is unbeaten here since his return some weeks ago.

Hunter is a fast, scientific grappler who has lots on his ball, but his speed and agility is expected to be more than matched by Hager, a native Oregonian. While the one-hour bout is certain to attract lots of interest, the majority of the inevitable sellout crowd will be on hand to see Farmer Jones.

Jones, an Arkansas hillbilly who is also making his debut here, will be meeting Glen Knox, the head-shaven man from Tennessee who has vowed that he'll stomp Jones' toes until he cries "uncle!"

Wrestling is still scufflin' to Jones, ever since four years ago when he wandered into a mat arena while doing his shopping in town. He and his neighbors had scuffled for years, and when he saw some of the pros wrestling, he asked to take part. The boys laughed and invited him to the mat—and he promptly whipped the entire card.

The promoter was aware that he had a "natural," but after four matches he returned to the farm and would not return to town for another eight months. So, every year since, Farmer Jones has left

the farm for four months to scuffle—but not without a couple of runs as companions. He wrestles in overalls and without shoes and his main threat is a "mule kick." They say he can use his feet better than most people can their hands.

Farmer Jones is one of the most colorful and highly-publicized wrestlers in the business—and he is a terrific performer. A sellout crowd is almost a certainty, but that's nothing new to Jones. He always wrestles to a full house—and "wows" them.

The opener gets under way at 8:30 p.m., and Elton Owen will referee both bouts.
