

R.H.S. INDIANS VICTOR OVER MYRTLE POINT, 21-6

Lone Touchdown Of Bobcats Comes In Final Quarter

A doped up Indian juggernaut battered down the luckless Myrtle Point Bobcats 21-6 in an action-packed contest that provided thrills to the near-capacity crowd as they watched Roseburg carry the ball for touchdowns and near touchdowns at Finlay Field Friday night.

Both teams saw their chances for near-certain scores vanish inches from the goal line. Roseburg started piling driving on a near-costly Bobcat fumble seconds after the starting gun. Dale Bonebrake recovered and four first downs later, the Indians were fractions of inches away from the goal. The next play meant paydirt, but a penalty on Roseburg gave the ball to Myrtle Point. The Bobcats kicked out of the end zone and Dale Bonebrake ran it back from the Pointers' 35. Roseburg plowed toward scoring territory, and two first downs later, Dick Bonebrake carried it across the zero line. Jack Mathis converted, and it was 7-0 for the Indians.

The Myrtle Point passing department was clicking in the second frame, but Bob Sanders capped a long one intended for a Myrtle Pointer and ran it back for a first and 10 on the Bobcats 36. A long pass from Sanders to Kenny Payne netted the Indians their second touchdown. Mathis converted again, making it 14-0 for the redskins.

Frank Weber kicked a short blooper to the 'Cats 35 and their Rick Bingham to Carl Morris combination began to click. Three first downs later put them on the Indian 18. But the next pass attempt from Bingham to Morris was neatly intercepted by Sanders on the Roseburg two, and run back to the 15. Roseburg worked it out of the danger zone twice and the gun ended the half.

The clock choked off the third quarter with Roseburg calling the shots. At the start of the fourth quarter it was Roseburg on the Myrtle Point 22. The Bonebrake brothers alternately carried the ball toward the end zone, and it was brother Dick that carried it across for another Roseburg score. Mathis' educated toe lofted the ball between the uprights giving "Cec" Sherwood's boys their 21st point.

Roseburg's Weber kicked off, and then Myrtle Point opened up on their own 10. Quarterback Bingham let loose with everything in his passing repertoire, first to Morris, then to Bill Lewellen, until the Bobcats were sitting on the three-yard fence. Halfback Glen Compton smashed through the Indian defense and went over for the only Myrtle Point touchdown.

Cleveland's Lead Reduced To Single Game; Race for Flag May Finish in Three-Way Tie

For the third time in five years the American League pennant race won't be decided until the last day. For the first time in history it may end in a three-way tie come Sunday.

Cleveland holds the upper hand. The Indians lead New York and Boston by one full game. Each of the three teams has two games left—Cleveland against Detroit in Cleveland and the Yankees and Red Sox against each other in Boston.

These are the possibilities, providing rain doesn't interfere:
1. Cleveland can win the pennant by whipping the Tigers twice, regardless of what happens in Boston.
2. Cleveland can win by splitting with the Tigers, providing Boston and New York split.
3. Boston or New York can win the pennant if one team sweeps the Boston series while Cleveland loses twice to Detroit.
4. Boston or New York can tie Cleveland if one team sweeps the Boston series while the Indians split with Detroit.
5. All three teams can finish in a tie. This would happen if Cleveland and New York split and Cleveland loses twice.

The Angels hold a 2-1 edge in the best of seven series, which will be resumed tomorrow in Los Angeles with a doubleheader.

Conditions Of Higher Welfare Grants Explained

The State Public Welfare Commission has approved increases in standards of assistance for all Social Security programs effective Oct. 1, announced Lois V. Baker, Douglas County administrator. However, she stated, since all grants are in the process of re-investigation, it is possible that this increase will not apply in some cases. No increase is being made in the allowance for general assistance cases at the present time.

Public Law 642, enacted by the 80th Congress, provides that the Federal Government, which now shares on a matching basis the cost of each Social Security grant with the state and counties, will increase the proportion it contributes.

There has been widespread misunderstanding of this statute, said Mrs. Baker. It will not bring to the state the additional \$5 of federal money reported for all old age assistance or blind assistance recipients, but will range from \$5 down to \$2.50 additional. The full \$5 increase for each recipient could only be secured if additional state and county money were available to match the increased federal funds. Available state and county money was budgeted to meet the previous assistance standards for the fiscal year.

Although the Federal Government makes no contribution toward the support of persons other than the recipients who are included in grants, such as the wife of an old age assistance recipient who is not receiving a grant in her own name or the mother of dependent children, many such persons are included in Social Security grants paid in the state of Oregon.

These revised standards will apply to all persons included in Social Security grants and will distribute the increased funds to all such persons. Questions concerning these standards for resources should be referred to the Douglas County Public Welfare Commission in Roseburg, said Mrs. Baker.
