Labor Wins Election In Glasgow District

GLASGOW, Scotland, Oct. 2.—(AP)—Labor retained its seat today in a Parliamentary by-election in which Communists polled more than one-sixth of the votes. Mrs. Alice Cullen, labor, received 13,706; Willis Foxburgh, Conservative, 7,181; and Patrick Kerrigan, Communist, 4,233.

The Communists campaigned vigorously on a slogan of "Homes—Not Bombs," opposing the British rearmament program. The seat was for Glasgow's Gorbals Division, a working class district. The Communists have some strength in Scottish industrial areas. A Communist, Willie Gallacher, represents another Glasgow Division in the Commons.

California Milk Drawn To Oregon by Top Price

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Oct. 2.—(AP)—Oregonians are drawing milk away from Northern California by offering more money for it.

That observation was made today by the State Agriculture Department in setting a price hearing for Oct. 15 at Mount Shasta in Siskiyou County.

California farmers are finding the higher price for their milk in Klamath Falls, just across the border. Producers also have contended the minimum price set by the state does not return a sufficient profit.

Cold Symptoms Yield Quickly to Penicillin

CHICAGO, Oct. 2.—(AP)—Penicillin dust, inhaled directly into the nose, throat and lungs, has cured symptoms of the common cold in one to three days, three physicians reported today.

Their study, published in the Journal of the American Medical Association, showed: That a group of 169 common cold patients treated, 42 percent were considered cured and 38 percent showed marked improvement.

"Also, on occasion, the pain of an acute sore throat was ameliorated in one-half hour to one hour after treatment."

Pending further study, the researchers are assuming that the penicillin dust attacks not the virus that causes the cold, but the bacteria that prolong it. Treatment for "selected patients" whose common colds have a tendency to hang on and develop into pneumonia, sinus trouble or ear infections, will be recommended.
