New Devices Range
From Mousetrap
To Breath Tamer

HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 5.—(AP)—The work of the Crosby Research Foundation—backed by Bing Crosby and headed by his brother Larry—finally is moving out of the laboratory and onto the nation's counters.

Five Crosby-sponsored inventions will be on department and drug store shelves: the Christmas trade. They are:

1. A better mousetrap.
2. A new line of tricycles, made in sidcar, tandem or chariot models.
3. A junior juke box.
4. A breath nebulizer that deodorizes the breath before it is expelled from the lungs.
5. A motorized belt-driven filing cabinet that allows access to any one of 40,000 files in 10 seconds.

Larry Crosby disclosed for the first time what has been going on behind the doors of the Crosby Foundation since the end of the war.

The new mousetrap, made of aluminum and guaranteed to hold a mouse but not injure even a child's unwary fingers, will retail for 39 cents. A quarter of a million have already been sold to a Chicago drug firm.

A mail-order house has ordered \$100,000 worth of the new tricycles for two. They will retail for about \$22.50.

The Crosby "Breath-o-lator" is an inhaler. You breathe the vapor from a lipstick-size gadget into mouth and lungs thus combatting, says Crosby, bad breath at the source. It costs \$1.
