Boxers Should be Treated Like Human Beings, Lesson From Fatal K. O.

NEW YORK.—(AP)—The neat, middle-aged little man had sad, bloodshot eyes, and he rapped his heart with the force of a blow. "I don't know how you say it," he said to Ted Smits, Associated Press sports editor, "but I have things in here I want to say. It is on my conscience like . . ."

And the rest was hard to understand, because his Puerto Rican emotion filtered through a veil of broken English.

The little man said he was Tony Rojas, fight manager and Latin American sports promoter. Wordlessly he held out a letterhead.

It was printed in purple ink and it showed the picture of a clean-cut, tawny-skinned boy in boxing trunks, fists poised wide apart. That was Kid Dinamita, 147, and the purple sheet of stationery said he was "The Sensational Welterweight Champion of Central America, Autentic."

But Rojas doesn't manage him any more. The kid died last Wednesday night in Chicago after a fight.

Ring Lacked Padding
Rojas looked silently at the letterhead. Then slowly he began to find the words he had walked into the office to say:

"What I want to say is . . . boxers . . . they should be treated like human beings. There should be padding in the ring . . . more padding . . . not enough now. Not enough for the cushion when the fighter he fall over backward . . . that sometime do more than the punch."

That was what happened, said the little man, when the kid was fatally hurt in his fight with Bobby McQuillan of Port Huron, Mich. A Chicago coroner's jury found Dinamita's death was accidental and recommended two changes in the Illinois boxing code to keep physically unfit fighters from the ring.

"The kid was knock down in

the seventh," said the little man. "When he come to his corner . . . he was weak. We revive him, and I told him . . . keep away from the other fighter . . . to clinch."

"He was strong again when he went out for the eighth. The people, they start to boo him . . . so he does not clinch anymore . . . he start to—what you say?—mix it . . . yes, he mix it."

"When the round it is over we get him back to his corner . . . he is still conscious. But he say his shoulders—they are very tired. "So I tell him . . . take it easy . . . see his legs, they are trembling."

Planned Yule Visit
The kid never came out for the ninth, and lost on a technical knockout.

"The kid say he is all right," said the little man, his voice thickening. "But when he stand up . . . I see he cannot carry his weight . . . so we put him in the stretcher . . . and later the ambulance it comes."

"I am talking to him on the way to the hospital . . . the kid laughs . . . that afternoon—before the fight—he had talk only about his family . . . about going home for Christmas. But in the ambulance he talk only about fighting . . . about how he will win the next fight okay."

"But he talk natural . . . very natural . . . It look like nothing wrong . . . I didn't believe he going soon be deceased."

Kid Dinamita was to get \$217 for his last fight. He arrives by plane in his native Santo Domingo tomorrow—in a casket.

**Northwest Gets
Two Airlines For
Hawaiian Route**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—(AP)—Pacific Northwest businessmen, after months of effort, found themselves today with two airlines certified to fly between the Northwest and Hawaii.

The sudden aerial prosperity resulted from yesterday's Civil Aeronautics Board action approving, at President Truman's direction, Pan American World Airways Service.

The new authorization varies from that recently given Northwest Airlines in one regard. Pan American may operate between the Northwest and Hawaii only on flights that continue beyond the Island stop. It cannot operate a local service.

Northwest Airline is authorized to operate a local service. Pan American Company officials indicated in Seattle and San Francisco yesterday that the new service is prepared to get under way just as quickly as planes and crews can be made ready. They indicated that would be soon.

Various Northwest organizations carried out a lengthy campaign to secure the original authorization for a Seattle-Portland to Hawaii direct service.

TACOMA, Oct. 5.—(AP)—The final yowls of a dying cat led to the discovery here Saturday night of what may have been an attempt on the life of a Tacoma mother and her six-year-old daughter.

Mrs. E. A. Lindstrom told Pierce County sheriff's officers that she was awakened in her southeast Tacoma residence at about 9:30 p. m. by the anguished crying of the family cat. Going to the back door she found the cat and two kittens dead and she noted the odor of gas. She opened the door and called the sheriff.

Investigating officers found that someone had attempted to bore a hole into the window sill of the daughter's bedroom. Falling in this a second hole had been started below the window but the drill bit had broken off.

Finally, the hose had been forced through a crack below the rear door and the remainder of the door sill sealed with mud. Gas had apparently then been forced into the house from an unknown source. The hose was too short to reach the road, Chief Deputy Sig Kittleson said. It has been sent to a laboratory for possible analysis of the type of gas used.

Mrs. Lindstrom's husband was working at the Tacoma smelter at the time of the incident.

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**Truman, Dewey
Rest as Mates
Do Campaigning**

President Truman and Gov. Thomas E. Dewey let their running mates carry the campaign ball today as they prepared for the next go-round in the Presidential contest.

Mr. Truman stuck close by the White House and added new touches to the speech-making he is scheduled to resume tomorrow with a foray extending into his Republican opponents' home state.

Dewey arranged to spend most of the day in closed-door sessions at Albany with John Foster Dulles, his foreign affairs adviser, who made a special flight from Paris to report on United Nations deliberations of the Berlin crisis.

In advance of that huddle, the Republicans put Senator Arthur H. Vandenberg, their chief foreign policy spokesman in Congress, on a nationwide broadcast last night. Vandenberg said this country's bipartisan foreign policy leaves the voters free to switch administrations "without affecting the continuity" of that policy.

The Vice Presidential candidates meanwhile headed their cross-country caravans into sections trail-blazed earlier by Mr. Truman and the New York Governor.

Farm Record Stressed

Senator Alben W. Barkley, the Democratic nominee, planned to fly to Colorado for a speaking date at Greeley tonight. The Kentuckian toured the Iowa and Minnesota grain belt yesterday, stressing his party's agriculture record. He said the national farm income had been increased from \$5,000,000,000 in 1932 to a current figure of \$30,000,000,000.

Accusing the Republicans of trying to stir class division between agriculture and labor, he called this "reprehensible tactics."

Gov. Earl Warren, the No. 2 GOP contender, carried his "unity" campaign to Charleston, W. Va., for a major talk tonight. The Californian told a Pittsburgh rally last night this country could arm itself against inflation and

threats from abroad only through "all-out production equal to our every need."

Other Voices Heard

Henry Wallace, the Progressive Party's Presidential Candidate, who has been attacking the bi-partisan foreign policy last night switched to a new theme.

The former Secretary of Agriculture said the Democrats and Republicans are "sniping away" at the farm program developed during his tenure in the Roosevelt Administration.

Gov. J. Strom Thurmond, the States Rights Party standard bearer, continued his civil rights jousting with all three of his presidential rivals. The South Carolinian told an Asheville, N. C. audience last night.

"The so-called 'civil rights' program of Truman, Dewey and Wallace is full of the same kind of deception that prostrated Europe and that is spreading out of Russia today in every corner of the world."

**Youth's Anger Leads To
Boory in Hotel Room**

PORTLAND, Oct. 5.—(AP)—A youth's fit of temper led detectives yesterday to a hotel room filled with loot from two burglaries.

Ralph Alexander Graddy, 19, tossed a 50-cent piece through a cafe window last night in a burst of anger. Detectives noticed and arrested him.

In his hotel room, said Detectives L. E. Johnson and W. F. Beech, they found watches from a jewelry robbery and a radio taken from a tavern. They arrested in company of Graddy, Jack Del Monte, 19.

As for the coin tossed through a window, the detectives quoted Graddy as saying he couldn't remember what he was angry about.

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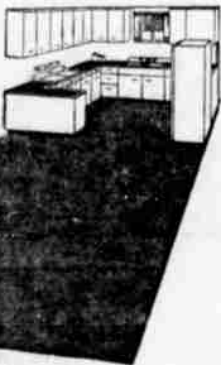
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
