

America Unit On Foreign Policy, Vandenberg Says

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—(AP)—Senator Arthur H. Vandenberg (R-Mich.) insisted last night that this country's bi-partisan foreign policy "does not mean that we cease to be Republicans or Democrats at home."

"It means that we attempt to hammer out the greatest possible measure of agreement so we can speak to the world, not as Republicans or Democrats but as undivided Americans."

Vandenberg called this unit on foreign affairs "our best available insurance for peace" and "as important as our atom bomb."

He said that one of the "vivid advantages" is that "it leaves us free to change our national administration, if such be the people's desire and advantage, without affecting the continuity of our foreign policy."

Vandenberg coupled his endorsement of the Dewey-Warren ticket with a sharp denunciation of the Soviet blockade of Berlin.

The Republicans, he said, oppose "surrender of our clear rights in Berlin to Soviet aggression," and:

"We condemn transparent Soviet duplicity in rejecting our peace efforts to lift the Berlin blockade and to restore four-power tranquility on a live-and-let-live basis. We indict this Soviet record as a threat to everybody's peace, our own emphatically included."

Vandenberg credited the Republicans with making possible the bi-partisan foreign policy by cooperating with the administration.

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United (?) Nations Would Benefit By Split Between Reds and Democracies

The United Nations faces its greatest crisis today as America, Britain and France throw the bitter Berlin conflict into the lap of the Security Council, charging that the Red blockade is a threat to international peace.

Indeed the situation is so grave that the three-year-old peace organization is in danger of splitting, with the Democracies and the Soviet Bloc going separate ways. British Foreign Secretary Bevin was voicing the thoughts of many statesmen when he warned the General Assembly in Paris that the U. N. might fall apart.

The Soviet press in Moscow told the Russian public yesterday that the two camps in the U. N. might go their separate ways—this despite the fact that Deputy Soviet Foreign Minister Vishinsky was quoted by a London paper as saying in an interview: "We shall not abandon the United Nations."

Well, suppose the U. N. does split, what follows? Bevin answered that in a horse-sense way by saying if it is impossible to work on a world-basis "we must proceed on a regional basis." That is, the Russian bloc would have its own organization and the Democracies would have theirs.

Never Has Been United

As a matter of cold fact there never has been a "United Nations." The organization has been split wide open since the start, with the Communists using it for purposes of obstruction and as a grand sounding-board for Red propaganda. Thus actually the U. N. has been used by the Bolsheviks as a weapon of aggression against the Democracies.

So if the Muscovites want to desert the U. N. there need be no tears shed, although there will be regrets that there couldn't be collaboration. It will be rather reminiscent of Japan's action in 1932 when she walked out of the League of Nations in anger over the Lytton report charging her with aggression against Manchuria.

Also, in passing, one might note that Russia was expelled from the League in 1939 for aggression against Finland.

But, says somebody, a split in the U. N. gets us further away from the ideal of "one world." I'm not so sure about that. We certainly are kidding ourselves if we think we are going to get one world through trying to make Democracy and Communism mix.

They can't be made to mix under any circumstances.

Plain Words Spoken

The all and water mixer might lend ear to Belgian Premier Spaak, former president of the U. N. Assembly, who told the Russians in a speech before that body:

"By your conduct you have prevented this organization from working. We fear you because in every country represented here you maintain a fifth column, the like of which even Hitler did not know."

A few hours earlier William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, declared in a broadcast: "There is no longer any doubt that a powerful Communist fifth column is operating in this country today."

Methodists Given More Money But Note Peril Ahead

COLUMBUS, O., Oct. 5.—(AP)—Methodist Church leaders here for a conference heard encouraging reports today on the rate funds are coming in for benevolent purposes.

Dr. Thomas B. Lugg of Chicago, treasurer of the Church Commission on World Service and Finance, announced gifts to the Church for such purposes amounted to \$1,355,533 for the first four months of the fiscal year, an increase of 7.7 per cent over a similar period last year.

During today's meeting Church leaders were told cities expanding without spiritual leadership face paganism and disaster.

Dr. Leonard Oechsli of South Pasadena, Calif., declared that the "vast migration of people into new urban centers" in recent years had created grave dangers as well as opportunities for the Nation and the Church.

"The real problem," he said in a speech prepared for a meeting of the Methodist Church's 571 district superintendents, "is what is happening to the social, moral, and spiritual atmosphere in these rapidly expanding areas."

Bishop Gerald Kennedy, Portland, Ore., warned that unless laymen worked for the church as well as ministers, it would suffer.

"If there is anything that will close the church," he said, "it will be the loss of understanding that each layman is a minister."

An announcement said 825 of the prisoners are sailors and 247 are civilians.

Love Hunger Held One Of World's Chief Troubles

PHILADELPHIA.—(AP)—One of the chief troubles with the world, according to a Temple University psychiatrist, is that it "regards love as nearly a luxury if not a sin."

That was what Dr. O. Spurgeon English told the 100th anniversary meeting of the Pennsylvania Medical Society.

As a matter of fact, Dr. English observed, "nearly everybody is starved for love."

"This is due in part," he said, "to the fact that few people understand love very well" and because too many persons look upon love as something that must be kept strongly in check.

Because of this love starvation, Dr. English declared, there is a swing toward "perverted physiological activity" as men and women take "to drugs and alcohol, try new love adventures, get divorces and remarry, trying to find the cure for their love hunger."
