## Cleveland Wins Second Game, 4-1

BRAVES FIELD, Boston, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Bob Lemon squared the World Series for Cleveland today by setting down the Boston Braves with eight hits for a 4-1 victory in the second game of the best of seven classic before 39,633 fans.

Manager Lou Boudreau, who went hitless in Johnny Sain's opening victory, led the Indians with a sparkling day afield and at bat. His double started a two-run surge in the fourth and he drove home the third run off southpaw Warren Spahn in the fifth. He started on double play, was in the middle of another, made a fine catch of a pop fly in short center and picked a man off second.

Lemon, accomplishing what his more famous pitching mate, Bobby Feller, failed to do, came through with a series win in his 20th because the Indians were able to handle Spahn. Lemon, a 20-game winner in the regular season, struck out five men and walked three.

The converted infielder who failed the Indians twice in the final weeks of the season, missed tying the series record for chances by a pitcher. He handled 10 chances—3 putouts and 7 assists—only one less than Niek Altobelli did for the Chicago White Sox back in 1906.

Gordon's Error Costly  
Time after time the hustling Braves nudged Lemon into a corner, but he always escaped with a whole skin after allowing a first-inning run.

Even then it wasn't entirely his fault. Joe Gordon messed up.

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Lewis Birthday  
Holiday, Pay Hike  
Plans of Miners

CINCINNATI, Oct. 7.—(AP)—The United Mine Workers' convention today unanimously adopted a resolution to make John L. Lewis' birthday Feb. 12 a national holiday in the coal industry.

The resolution climaxed a movement started several years ago within the union to make Lewis' birthday a memorial holiday.

The anthracite agreement, covering about 80,000 Pennsylvania hard coal miners, already has provision for that observance.

The miners' leader also appears due to get a boost in pay.

Several resolutions have been introduced to increase his salary from \$25,000 to as much as \$75,000. The resolution which seems to be favored would fix the constitutional pay of the president at \$50,000.

The convention also went to work today on "fourth round" wage and welfare demands to be handed coal operators next summer.

The miners, like workers in other basic industries, have had three yearly wage-rate boosts since war ended three years ago.

Roseburg Community Chest  
Campaign Opens October 20;  
Allocation of Goals Awaited

Kick-off of the 10-day Roseburg Community Chest drive has been set for Oct. 20, it was announced today by David J. McCarroll, secretary of the Community Chest board.

Preliminaries to the drive were discussed last night at an organizational meeting. Date for a budget meeting, when requests of participating agencies will be reviewed, was set for 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, Oct. 13.

Three members appointed to the budget committee by W. J. Adair, Community Chest president, include J. V. Long, chairman, and Frank Ashley and Harrison Winston, McCarroll said. The committee is expected to meet jointly with the Douglas County Community Chest budget committee, to allocate the financial goals of agencies serving the entire county, including the Boy Scouts, Salvation Army, Camp Fire Girls, and the Cancer Fund. Representatives of all participating agencies are invited to be present, as well as members of the Chamber of Commerce. The meeting will be in the Chamber of Commerce offices.

Preceding the opening date of the Roseburg Community Chest drive, H. C. Johnson of the Oregon Chest will address the regular Chamber of Commerce luncheon Oct. 18, to tell of the aims of Chest agencies.

Coalition Asks  
Powers' Backing  
To Evict Franco

LONDON, Oct. 7.—(AP)—The British foreign office announced today Spanish Republicans and Monarchists, both foes of Generalissimo Francisco Franco, have patched up their differences in a formal agreement.

Official sources in Paris said the two factions agreed on formation of a coalition exile government which will ask Western Powers backing to throw out the Franco Regime.

A copy of the agreement has been received at the British Embassy in Paris, and it was also to be presented to American and French representatives. American sources said the U. S. State Department will give it "fullest consideration."

Britain, with the support of the other two Western Powers, was reported to have demanded such a coalition as a condition for recognition.

The Western Powers have not recognized the present exile Republican regime. The United States, Britain and France pledged themselves in March, 1946, to aid any satisfactory caretaker government which might be installed to replace Franco, pending free elections.

Rock Slide Wrecks Train;  
Engineer, Fireman Killed

PITTSBURGH, Oct. 7.—(AP)—One hundred workmen and four wreck trains today cleared away wreckage in suburban Bellevue where a huge rock slide yesterday caused the wreck of a fast Chicago-bound Pennsylvania Railroad train.

Two trainmen were killed. They were engineer J. G. Lightburn and fireman R. G. Rombert, both of Crestline, O.

The two were members of the crew of the second of two locomotives pulling the Port Pitt Express westbound to Chicago. The engineers of the first engine, E. W. Shenk, 54, of Beaver, Pa., said "we had no chance to avoid crashing that rock. We had just rounded a curve and there was that huge boulder on the track."

The collision jackknifed five of the nine cars, overturned both locomotives and ripped up about 200 feet of track. The last four coaches of the nine-car train remained on the rails.

Reported Strike Of  
Hotel Maids Unfounded

Representatives of the Hotel Grand, 206 W. Cass St., laughed at a report today of a "strike" of maids employed by the hotel. An unsigned letter brought in to the News-Tribune Wednesday read as follows: "Maids walked off the job today at Hotel Grand asking for higher wages. They state they cannot live on their wages of 65 cents an hour with living conditions continually rising higher."

The hotel management said three maids quit their jobs yesterday and three more have been hired to take their places. Six other maids also employed remained on the job. The maids are not members of a union.

O. J. Monger Will Head  
School at Canyonville

Otto J. Monger, briefly employed in the County School Superintendent's office, has accepted the principalship of the Canyonville school, Mrs. Lulu C. Gorrell reports.

Monger was called to Canyonville in September to assist with the registration and opening of school in that town when no other principal was available. Temporarily assisting in the office of Mrs. Gorrell are Mrs. Dora Chism and Mrs. Adelaide L. Kimball.

Bail Fixed for Three Men  
On Various Charges

John Brumley, Canyonville, arrested at the Grand Hotel by Deputy Sheriff Ed Dahl is being held in the county jail on a charge of possession of an illegal weapon. Brumley was arrested on a warrant issued by Justice of Peace Nina W. Pietzold at Canyonville Oct. 4, and was arraigned in her court Tuesday. His bail was set at \$2,500.

Elihu David Hummel, 73, of Sutherland, arrested on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor, was arraigned in the court of Justice of Peace Ward C. Watson at Sutherland Wednesday. His bail was set at \$1,000 and he is being held in the county jail.

Mervin Lawrence Boss, wanted in Coos County on an NSF check charge, was arrested in Roseburg by Douglas County authorities, but released upon his posting a \$1,000 bail bond.

Japanese Cabinet Falls  
Amid Bribery Scandal

TOKYO, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Prime Minister Hiroshi Ashida, assuming "moral responsibility" in a growing government scandal, resigned today and his entire cabinet fell with him.

The Tokyo procurator's office is investigating charges of bribery in connection with a \$2,800,000 yen (\$10,300,000) government loan to Showa Denko, a fertilizer company.

Former Deputy Prime Minister Nishio and Takeo Kurosu, president of the Economic Stabilization Board and member of Ashida's outgoing cabinet, are among those arrested on suspicion of bribery.

Moslem Homesick In  
U. S. Commits Suicide

EUREKA, Calif., Oct. 7.—(AP)—Adnan Howari, 23, left a note of prayer for his native Saudi Arabia and his Moslem religion, then killed himself by cutting his throat with safety razor blades, the county coroner reported today.

The youth was a student at Humboldt State College and was brought to the United States and housed at the American Arabians Oil Company. College officials said he had been homesick.

Retail Prices  
Of Hogs, Other  
Meat DeclineSlump Ascribed To  
Seasonal Factors, Not  
Consumer Resistance

CHICAGO, Oct. 7.—(AP)—The drop in hog and meat prices was getting down today to where it counts for most people—at the retail butcher shop.

Many stores throughout the country slashed pork prices for the coming week-end, a direct result of the sudden outpouring of hogs from the country. The oft-mentioned but never very apparent "consumer resistance" was pooh-poohed in some quarters as a cause for the decline.

And it was in pork, much more than in beef or lamb, that butchers were posting the lower figures.

While retail outlets were cutting prices, the hog market's steady slump came to at least a temporary halt. Prices firmed a bit at most markets yesterday. However, wholesale pork quotations continued to ease at Chicago.

Today, however, the Chicago hog market bounced a full dollar a hundred pounds higher at Chicago Union stockyards.

This followed yesterday's climb of 25 to 75 cents and recovered a good share of the \$4.00 to \$5.00

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Boss Crump Goes  
In Dixiecrat Camp

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Oct. 7.—(AP)—E. H. Crump, Tennessee Democratic political leader, has thrown his support to the States' Rights presidential ticket.

The head of the potent Shelby County Democratic organization endorsed J. Strom Thurmond and Fielding L. Wright in an announcement last night that included an appraisal of other presidential aspirants.

President Truman, said Crump, "has sold the South down the river for Negro votes in large northern cities."

Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York, the Republican candidate, was described as no friend of the South.

His argument against fair railroad rates for the South, and his other ideas on things dear to the South are too much," Crump declared, adding: "Therefore, Thurmond of South Carolina and Wright of Mississippi are the men for us to vote for."

Henry A. Wallace, Progressive Party nominee, "is completely out" in Crump's estimation.

Crump has long been an outspoken critic of President Truman's civil rights program.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Senator Kenneth McKellar (D-Tenn.) split today with his long time political associate, Ed Crump of Memphis. McKellar said he will support the Truman-Barkley ticket.

McKellar, 78, is dean of the Senate from a standpoint of seniority. He has served continuously since March 4, 1917. He was the Senate's president pro tempore when the Democrats had control.

Lone Bid for Alterations At  
Veterans Hospital Rejected  
Because Far Above Estimate

Only one bid was received for construction work and alterations at the Roseburg Veterans Hospital at the opening of bids this week, the Seattle office of the Veterans Administration reported Wednesday. The bid was nearly double the estimate and was referred to the central office in Washington, D. C., for final action.

Deer Season Toll  
Reaches 8 Lives;  
Drain Man Injured

(By The Associated Press)

Collapse of an elderly hunter while carrying a deer from the woods in Southern Deschutes County has raised the Oregon hunting season fatalities to eight.

The latest victim is Harvey Knopsnyder, 72, Bend. He was helping a son and daughter-in-law carry a deer, shot by the son, when he was stricken by a heart attack.

L. H. Brooks, Drain, was struck by a bullet fragment yesterday while hunting in the same area. The shot was discharged accidentally from a gun held by his wife. He is in a Bend hospital.

Earlier two men died of heart attacks; three of gun shots and two in a highway accident en route to the woods.

Search continues in Klamath County for Earl Kent, 75, Klamath Falls businessman missing for six days.

44 Whales Swim To  
Land in Suicide Effort

CRESCENT BEACH, Fla., Oct. 7.—(AP)—Forty-four whales swam out of a rough ocean and deliberately beached themselves today in an apparent mass suicide.

Most of the mammals, which ranged in size from seven to 14 feet, died quickly as they were rolled over the sands by the rough surf.

A few remained alive and efforts were made to drag them back into the water.

Curators said that several times in the past, whales have beached themselves along the Florida coast in unexplained "hari-kari" fashion. When they were towed back into the water, they swam heading into shore again.

Gunman Quietly Steals  
\$7,500 From N. Y. Hotel

NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—(AP)—A suspected gunman quietly stole \$7,500 in cash from the front office of the fashionable Sherry-Netherland Hotel on Fifth Avenue late last night and escaped in a taxi before guests in the lobby were alerted.

The bandit held up the cashier, Miss Margaret Saralande, and the assistant manager, Philip Landau.

Pocketing the cash, the robber stroled out of the lobby, but broke into a run and hopped into a taxi when an alarm was sounded.

Bomber Crash Kills 8;  
Four Others Bail Out

WAYCROSS, Ga., Oct. 7.—(AP)—A B-29 bomber crashed yesterday and eight of its occupants were killed.

Four of the plane's occupants, including Capt. W. H. Moore of Wilkesburg, Pa., bailed out and landed safely.

Eyewitnesses said the huge craft exploded in the air as it passed over Waycross and fell in flames on the outskirts, near the edge of a swamp.

Work planned includes a new two-story 127-foot wing extension to the present kitchen and dining room, remodeling and modernization of sections of the building, and replacement of the present ammonia gas refrigeration system with a freon gas system.

The J. G. Watts Construction Co., Seattle was the lone bidder with an offer of \$349,350. For refrigeration installations, the Western Engineering Co., Portland, bid \$59,223 and Trowbridge and Flynn Electric Co., Medford, bid \$65,866. This would bring the total cost to more than \$400,000. It was estimated that the cost would be in excess of \$200,000.

Blame Tossed Around  
No bids for general construction were submitted from the Portland area, the Daily Journal of Commerce reported. Contractors there said that sub-contracts could not be obtained at a figure which would enable them to submit bids within or near the estimate.

It was added that "high labor costs in the (Roseburg) area" would make it necessary to provide workers from the Portland area, with resulting increased costs. In turn, sub-contractors blamed the Veterans Administration, saying that "specifications

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Bids for Alcohol  
Plant Rejected  
By Government

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Two bids for the war-built wood waste alcohol plant at Springfield, Ore., have been rejected by the War Assets Administration.

The WAA said the offers were from the Waste Wood Chemical Company, Milwaukee, Wis., and Leach Brothers Company, Chicago. The Milwaukee firm sought a five-year lease with an option to buy the plant for \$1,200,000. The WAA said this was rejected because the company added too many conditions to the offer.

The Chicago firm offered \$51,000 for outright purchase of the plant, a figure the WAA said was too low.

Agency officials did not indicate what they may do next to dispose of the plant. They could advertise for new bids or negotiate with interested parties.

The plant cost an estimated \$300,000 to construct and WAA and the Forest Service have estimated that some \$500,000 in new capital is needed to make necessary revisions and get the plant into operation.

Constructed during the latter part of the war, it never operated commercially although alcohol was produced from wood waste in some test runs by a process developed by the Forest Service.

Wayne Mosher Named  
Assistant County Agent

Wayne Mosher has assumed the position of assistant county extension agent (agriculture) in Roseburg, it was announced by J. Roland Parker, agricultural extension agent.

A graduate of Oregon State College, where he majored in animal husbandry, Mosher will assist Parker in Douglas County in livestock and poultry improvement work.

He is a former resident of Newberg. During the recent war he served as a pilot in the Naval aviation service and was largely in Texas and other parts of the South.

Fighter Plane Crashes,  
Pilot Seriously Injured

HAMILTON FIELD, Calif., Oct. 7.—(AP)—An Air Force F-82 Mustang all weather fighter plane crashed a mile east of the landing field yesterday, seriously injuring the pilot.

The pilot, 2nd. Lieut. Howard L. La Beau Jr., of Bremerton, Wash., was rescued suffering from multiple injuries, burns and shock. The base said his condition was "fair."

Air Force spokesmen said the pilot, on a routine flight was approaching the field for a landing when something apparently went wrong.

Immediate  
One-Third Cut  
Urged at U. N.Ban on Atom Bombs Also  
Asked; Allies Accused  
Of Disarmament Block

PARIS, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Russia accused the western powers today of blocking world disarmament for the past 20 years and demanded that the Big Four immediately cut their armies by a third.

Soviet Delegate Vishinsky led off debate in the United Nations Political Committee on a Russian resolution calling for a ban on atom bombs and a one-third cut in armed forces and armaments within a year.

A few minutes before, the political committee had shunted to an 11-nation subcommittee the east-west dispute over atomic energy controls. The Russians had urged in the political committee that the Atomic Energy Commission scrap its work of two and a half years, and "let in a breath of fresh air."

The political committee, made up of all 58 U. N. members, adopted an Ecuadorian resolution establishing the atomic study subcommittee. This group will draft a resolution directing the Atomic Energy Commission to resume its attempts to achieve an atomic controls treaty. The Russian bloc supported the resolution.

Six members of the United Nations Security Council not involved in the Berlin crisis were reported today solidly in favor of raising the Soviet blockade.

An authoritative source said that was the first reaction of the six countries at a caucus yesterday after the United States, Britain and France presented their charges against Russia to the full council. The western powers charged that the Berlin blockade threatens world peace.

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Three Accused Of  
Shooting Reuther,  
Auto Union Chief

PONTIAC, Mich., Oct. 7.—(AP)—Wayne County Prosecutor James N. McNally said today he would ask a warrant charging Carl Bolton, 39, and two unidentified persons with the attempt on the life of Walter P. Reuther last April 20.

Reuther, president of the CIO United Auto Workers, was shot down in his home by an assailant with a shotgun. The motive for the attack was never established.

Bolton, a former vice president of the H. H. Park, Mich., Local 400, UAW-CIO, was questioned a few days after Reuther was shot. He was released at that time, however.

McNally credited two State Police officers with digging up leads that led to today's conference. They are Lt. Joseph Sheridan of East Lansing and Det. James Van Landegard of Redford, Mich.

The prosecutor declined to reveal any more details.

Rewards offered for the attacker of Reuther total \$117,800 State Police, however, are not eligible for such awards.

Ground-Breaking Set For  
Salvation Army Chapel

The first spadeful of earth will be dug at the site of the new Salvation Army chapel building on Winchester Friday morning, it was announced by Capt. Claude Bowden, local corps officer.

On hand for the occasion tomorrow will be Brigadier H. B. Collier of Portland regional commander of the Salvation Army. Also taking part will be Mayor Albert G. Fiegel, Jack Pariss, chairman of the local advisory board, and Charles Poirat, who will direct the construction.

After Brigadier Collier turns over the first spadeful of earth, work will get underway on the building. Plans for the project call for construction of the chapel building first and later construction of a recreational building.

Albany Motorist Killed,  
Wife and Passenger Hurt

THE DALLES, Ore., Oct. 7.—(AP)—An Albany, Ore., motorist was killed and his wife and a passenger seriously injured yesterday when an automobile plunged down a 150-foot embankment from Highway 30.

State Police said Harry J. McFeron, 31, apparently had suffered a skull fracture. His wife and a passenger, listed as Mr. Lupatka, are in a hospital.

The car apparently skidded on wet pavement five miles west of here, went onto the shoulder of the road and then swerved to the opposite side and down the bank.

Court Postpones  
Action on Airport  
Zoning Proposal

County Judge D. N. Busenbark said today the county court would defer action on the proposal of the City of Roseburg to create an airport zoning board until the return from vacation of Commissioner Lynn V. Beckley, possibly not before the first of next week.

Judge Busenbark stated he could see no apparent objection to the plan but that he was seeking further information and legal opinion before making his own decision.

The proposal of the city is that a board be composed of five members—two to be appointed by the mayor, one of whom would be a City Council member; two by the County Court and a fifth to be chosen as chairman by the other four members.

The board would control the construction of possible hazards near the Roseburg Airport, which is outside the city. The city council, acting upon the City Planning Commission's recommendation, has authorized the preparation of an ordinance creating the board.
