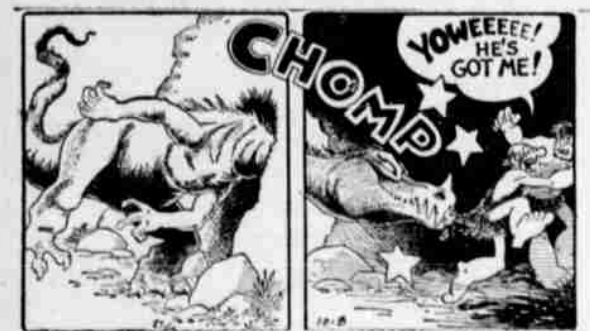

Old New England Yankee Being Dunked in His Own Melting Pot

FALL RIVER, Mass.—(AP)—Here is where the old New England Yankee is being dunked in his own melting pot.

Along the mill-lined banks of the Quechequan River a new pattern is emerging—a pattern typical of the new New England. It could be called the second revolution in New England—a long, slow, quiet revolution resulting in the mixing of the blood of many nationalities instead of the violent shedding of a few.

It is the change that has taken place in the stern and rocky New England character as a result of successive heavy waves of immigration for over a century.

This tidal flood of new faces and new languages has washed over the old Yankees irresistibly. Those who haven't mingled and been absorbed are, in some ways, almost strangers in their own land—that is the land they took from the Indians.

The story goes back a century. Shrewd Yankee traders put their shipping and farm wealth into cotton mills. Then they brought over Englishmen from Lancashire to work in the mills.

Then the Irish came over, the French came down from Canada, the Portuguese from the Azores. A generation ago large-scale immigration dropped off.

Old, New Blood Mix
For a long time the lines between the old Yankees and the newcomers were sharply drawn. The immigrants complained they put out all the sweat and the Yankees—the grandsons of the men who whipped the British—took in all the money.

But in three generations the melting pot did a lot of melting, and it's melting faster every day. The old lines have crumbled, and the new child in America's old cradle of liberty is a vigorous offspring of both the old and new.

"We used to be regarded as just another ragged cotton mill town," said one Yankee descendant. "But we like to think we have created here a new culture, where people of varying backgrounds mix and bring forth new talent."

"Our nationalities mingle and get along with no friction. They are intermarrying steadily," Politics Major Factor.

A big factor in breaking down the wall between the old-line Yankees and the immigrants was the numerical strength of the newcomers, which gave them an avenue to political office. And the thrifty immigrants, here as else-

PORTLAND, Oct. 7.—(AP)—The dollar dinner at the thriftiest level costs \$1.47, but it's enough for a family of four.

Margaret Walker, 16, 4-H club member from Eugene won a rating of 98 out of a possible 100 points in the Pacific International Livestock exposition competition for Oregon 4-H cooks.

The menu: Pear and grape salad, wheat biscuits, relish plate, curried lamb, rice, peas and carrots, cloverleaf rolls, currant jelly, hot apple pie, cheese and coffee.

Washington state 4-H competition is by a team of two and their dinner serves six. Winners were Shirley Reynolds and Joanne Anderson, Tenino, who welcomed guests with bouillabaisse and corsages and for \$2.49 or 41 cents a plate turned out this dinner: Meat loaf, buttered carrots, stuffed potatoes, tossed green salad, whole wheat muffins, butter, melon balls, coffee and milk.

In another food competition, Joyce Merrick, 19, Monmouth, Wash. was named home economics demonstration champion for demonstrating two ways of preserving tomatoes.

In the agricultural demonstration contest, David Edwards, Centralia, won by showing a cold soak method of preserving fence posts.

The Idaho team of Joan and Marilyn Hopper, Caldwell, on home economics and Pauline Yost and Jean Kulac, Castle Ford, on rapid milking, was second to Washington state in a six-state competition.
