Russia Demands Army Reduction by Big Four

resolution has been prepared, but the six "neutral" members feel the first requirement in easing the crisis is for the Russians to lift the blockade.

The neutrals on the council are China, Syria, Belgium, Colombia, Argentina and Canada. The Soviet Ukraine is siding with Russia against hearing the case in the security council.

Lifting of the blockade is the price the western powers will accept for agreeing to a four-power foreign minister's council meeting on the Berlin and general German questions. The Russians consistently have maintained that the Berlin case is one for the Big Four to discuss, and not for the United Nations.

Meanwhile, a Moscow radio commentator accused the western powers of pursuing a "policy of deliberately ignoring the foreign ministers' council in solving various international problems."

Russian Planes Drop Live Bombs in Occupation Zone

BERLIN, Oct. 7.—(AP)—British flyers engaged in the Berlin air lift said today they had seen Russian planes drop live bombs in the Soviet occupation zone about 12 miles northwest of Berlin.

There is a possibility the reported incident might have been part of large-scale Russian air war maneuvers announced for today over the Soviet zone, Berlin and allied air corridors, including bomber flights.

The British quoted an RAF pilot in their report to the air safety center as saying he saw actual bursts on the ground from bombs dropped by Russian pilots. The pilot said he saw the explosions from a height of 4,000 feet.

The Russians announced extensive war maneuvers near and over Berlin. Some of their activity drew western protests.

American and British authorities accused the Russians of not giving prior notice of 18 Soviet flights in the control zone during the morning. The U. S. said also gunnery practice the Russians scheduled in the air lift corridors was dangerous and told the Russians if they planned to fly bombers in formation over Berlin, this would break four-power rules.

An American flyer reported at 6 a.m. he almost collided with one of three Russian planes, flying at 1,200 feet at the northwest edge of Berlin.

U. S. representatives at the four-power Berlin air safety center said the air activities announced by the Russians appeared to be the largest since the U. S. and Britain began using the air corridors to supply Soviet-blockaded Berlin.

effort to "beat the break."

2. The meat packers are moving pork quickly. A leading packer spokesman said the industry was going into the "accumulative season" when supplies are built up. But, he said, "nobody wants to hold now and they are pushing pork right out into wholesale channels."

3. Many packing plants are short of help, which makes them less aggressive buyers of live animals than they otherwise would be.

4. The whole thing may just be a temporary flurry. James Elliott, president of the National Association of Retail Meat Dealers, said, "The chances are that after the usual heavy runs at this time of year meat prices will go back to where they were two weeks ago."

5. Consumer resistance was a doubtful factor. Elliott said there was none "to speak of." But an Agriculture Department official at Indianapolis said the housewife had heard so much about bumper crops lowering prices that she was reducing her buying.

Truman Accuses GOP Of 'Lullabies' Offer

ABOARD TRUMAN CAMPAIGN TRAIN, Oct. 7.—(AP)—President Truman renewed today his bid for the prized electoral votes of the industrial east against Republican opponents he had offered only "sweet lullabies" to the people.

He appealed for the votes of Pennsylvania workers last night. To a cheering crowd in Philadelphia he said the Republican candidates were handling the people "company union" promises and practicing political "quackery."

He said the Republican party wants to roll all the "plain people" together "in one big company union" and run it "for the benefit of the National Association of Manufacturers."

Mexican Workers Must Pay Withholding Tax

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 7.—(AP)—Mexican agricultural workers have to pay the Oregon withholding tax on income, Attorney General George Neuner ruled today.

An agreement between the United States and Mexico says that no deductions shall be taken from the Mexican workers' salaries unless provided by law. Neuner said this agreement does not apply to Oregon's income tax law.

The withholding tax law applies to all workers in the state, including seasonal farm workers.

Fairbanks Sends Sharp Reply to Unions' Offer

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Oct. 7.—(AP)—A group of businessmen today told leaders of the five striking West Coast Maritime Unions to "go fly a kite" after learning of the Unions' offer to operate Alaska vessels on uninterrupted "relief ship" basis despite the general walkout in Pacific ports.

In a telegram to Seattle's Mayor William F. Devin, the Fairbanks business men said:

"... we emphatically recommend no conciliatory negotiations with Communist-dominated unions. Now that Alaska railroad is hauling foodstuffs and clothing to Alaska we suggest telling (Harry) Bridges and associates to go fly a kite. We must have uninterrupted flow of freight to survive."

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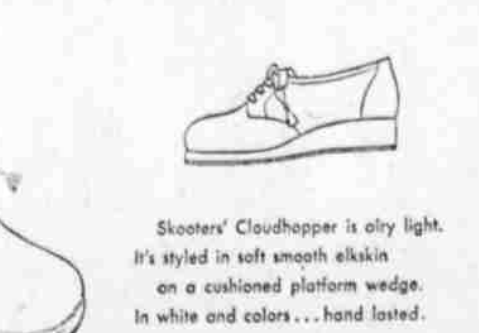
