P.T.A. CONGRESS MEETING IS HELD

The Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers voted to actively support the efforts of the Oregon State Pharmaceutical Association and of wholesale magazine distributors to curtail the distribution and sale of objectionable comic books at its quarterly meeting in Portland last week.

According to the congress every possible assistance in this campaign to assure better reading material for children. Its action, she explained, is in line with a decision of the board of managers of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers at its meeting in Chicago to wage open warfare this year on the objectionable comics which are rapidly increasing in number.

At the same meeting the parent-teacher board voted approval of the proposed teaching hospital in conjunction with the University of Oregon Medical School and will urge the 1949 legislature to appropriate funds to establish it. It also approved the Library associations bill urging state aid to libraries. The two bills that the State PTA are sponsoring this fall in conjunction with other organizations are the Right to Vote measure number 308, and the Constitutional Six Per Cent Tax Limitation Amendment number 300.

Trumpeting Swans Win Battle for Survival

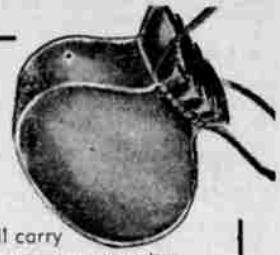
WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—(AP)—The trumpeting swans are believed winning a fight against extinction in the reserve areas set aside in the western states. The Fish and Wildlife Service reports 418 of the majestic, white-plumaged swans, threatened with

extinction 13 years ago, were counted by air observers this summer.

Albert M. Day, service director, said the number has increased from a low of 73 in 1935 in the United States. Canadian trumpeting swans are believed to number 900 birds.

The Malheur county refuge in Oregon has 13 of the swans and cygnets.
