### Most Headaches Due To Emotions, Medico Says

PORTLAND, Oct. 8.—(AP)—A Cornell University Medical School psychiatrist reports 90 per cent of headaches are due to emotional problems. Dr. Harold G. Wolff said half of hospital patients are ill because these emotion distresses have multiplied. "Headache is the most common complaint with which the physician has to deal, and 90 per cent of headaches are the end result of an accumulation of stresses, fatigue, disappointment, frustration and tension," he said. Dr. Wolff said these stresses can "stampede and get out of hand." He said they bring on bodily changes which can prove fatal.

## If you can buy it by-the-bottle... why can't you buy it by-the-glass?

A bottle is a container for liquids. In the old days, jars or jugs were used for the same purpose. When thrown from a speeding car, a bottle is a menace to traffic. Even when placed against a building along a city street, a bottle is far from ornamental. A bottle has no magic power to change human nature, for better or worse. Of itself, a bottle cannot make a man righteous or dissolute. Why then do so many well-meaning folks in Oregon place so much stock in the virtues of the bottle? To some, the bottle has become a symbol of temperance, to be defended at all cost and against all comers. In the name of temperance we force a man to buy more than he needs or wants. In our state today a man can buy an unlimited quantity of liquor as long as he buys it by the bottle! To some of the older folks, mention of liquor-by-the-glass brings up visions of old-time saloons, complete with swinging doors, brass rails, and cuspidors. Sorry, but we can't offer you that! In those "good old days" of free enterprise and open competition there was no supervision, no restriction of any kind. The Oregon Liquor Dispensing Licensing Act—upon which the people of the state will vote November 2—provides for licensing hotels, restaurants, clubs and common carriers (railroads, etc.), to "permit mixing, serving and selling of alcoholic liquor with or without food or meals on such conditions as prescribed by the commission". All dispensing licensees would buy exclusively through state liquor stores and would pay an annual license fee of \$500, post a performance bond of \$5,000, and, in addition to the purchase price of the liquor, a tax of 25 cents per container of 32 ounces and 1 cent per ounce for each ounce over 32. The proposed system would give the public the choice of purchasing liquor by-the-bottle in state liquor stores, as at present, or liquor by-the-glass in state licensed and supervised establishments. In granting licenses, the State Liquor Commission is specifically instructed to "take into consideration all members of the public".
