plonship for 4-H boys in the Northwest.

The poultry judging team was composed of Dennis Johnston and Elton Swift, both of Olalla, and Warren Nicklason, Tennille. The livestock judging team was comprised of three boys from Myrtle Creek, Edgar Hollinger, Calvin Clack and Carl Wallen.

In addition to the judging contest, three of the boys were entered in the calf scramble contests which were held at every rodeo performance. In the scrambles, in which 12 boys competed for six calves at each show, the three 4-H's each came out with a Hereford calf.

These calves, which were donated by prominent breeders for calf scramble purposes, are to be fed by the 4-H boys for the year and exhibited at the 1949 Pacific International. The three boys who "scrambled and won" were Dennis Johnston, Olalla; Calvin Clack, Myrtle Creek; and Carl Wallen, Myrtle Creek.

Canning selected from State Fair exhibits for Interstate competition at the Pacific International was shown by five Douglas County 4-H girls. The girls and the awards received are as follows: Carol Ann Burgin, Days Creek, blue and green awards; Ann Roth, Brockway, two red awards; Mary Roberts, Reedsport, red award; Judy Conner, Days Creek, green award; and Marjorie Zeller, Brockway, two green awards.

Also exhibited in the 4-H division was a fleece from one of Frank Buell's sheep at Lookingglass. This entry received a fifth place.

### Czech Premier Says War Over Berlin Not Coming

PRAGUE, Oct. 8.—(AP)—Premier Zapsotky told the Czechoslovak parliament yesterday "this country will not be dragged into war over Berlin, because there will be no war over Berlin." The Communist premier's statement was broadcast to the country as he presented the outline of a five-year economic plan scheduled to begin next Jan. 1. It will succeed a two-year plan. Zapsotky said "the Czechoslovak republic will remain independent." He scoffed at rumors this country would be annexed to Soviet Russia.

The premier said the current two-year plan had not been fulfilled in some sectors.

## Chinese Reds Use Soviet Type Shells In Chihnsien Siege

NANKING, Oct. 8.—(AP)—Lt. Gen. Teng Wen-Yi, government military spokesman, said today Chinese Communists have been firing "Russian model" shells into besieged Chihnsien.

Teng said the Chihnsien garrison had recovered several 76.2 millimeter unexploded shells which "appeared to be of a Russian type" inside the city. The defense ministry, he said, had asked the commander of the South Manchurian city to rush a report.

Teng said the fighting around Chihnsien had abated except for artillery duels.

Teng claimed two important Communist leaders, Gen. Ting Sheng and Gen. Chu Jui, had been killed in the Chihnsien battle.

Reversing his earlier confirmation of the government's evacuation of Changchun, Manchurian capital, General Teng described the movement of the garrison there as "an offensive drive southward."

He declined to affirm or deny that the government actually had abandoned the old Manchurian capital although his own newspaper published under a Peiping dateline a dispatch that the Changchun garrison was already more than 65 miles south of the city.
