The Roseburg Senior High mentor is highly pleased with the team's performance during practice session the past week, and if it doesn't rain the results of the game should be highly satisfactory to the fans at home. Sherwood voiced apprehension of Reedsport's dirt gridiron. A muddy field may work against the Indians as they have had no experience on that type of field, according to the Indian coach.

Yesterday the lads worked hard at pass offense and defensive blocking techniques. Several members of the squad were pretty well bruised up before the drill ended, but not seriously enough to keep them from making the road trip.

Dale Bonebrake is tentatively scheduled to spark Roseburg kick off returns, and make those yard-gaining end runs. Bob Scott has been limbering his arm for an anticipated aerial attack against the coast city opposition.

Ends Kenny Payne and Joe Schuchert have been drilling hard at catching passes, while members of the line have been punishing themselves crashing against tackling dummies and live targets.

Coch Sherwood thinks the boys have gotten over their partiality to fumble-fits, which has proven somewhat costly, in past games.

The boys are keyed up for the weekend game, but are not over-confident. They are trying hard not to look too far ahead, but win them as they come.

Bill Salkeld, Catcher of Braves, Once Regarded as Hopeless Cripple

SANTA BARBARA, Calif., Oct. 8.—(AP)—Most of the players on the Cleveland and Boston Clubs are realizing lifetime ambitions in taking part in this World Series, but the Braves' first-string catcher, Bill Salkeld, is living a part in baseball that anyone—12 years ago—would have called impossible.

Boudreau Explains 'Death Trap' Play That Stuns Fans

CLEVELAND, Oct. 8.—(AP)—"The Boudreau pickoff play," a death trap for ambitious players, has become the most talked-about single feature of the World Series thus far.

It promises to go down in World Series history alongside such famous highlights as the Rawlings-Kelly-Frisch double play of 1921; the Pepper-Martin base-stealing show of 1933; and the unassisted triple play by Billy Wambach in 1920.

The extraordinary play, a precision-like combination of a lightning break and perfect timing between Shortstop Lou Boudreau, Cleveland's playing pilot, and his pitcher, has been the key play of both games.

Boudreau has worked it twice against the Boston Braves, once in each game. Each time it left the onlookers stunned by its results.

In the first game, it failed and caused one of the most intriguing phases of "second-guessing" the umpire in the world of sport. Associated Press pictures of the play in question further ignited heated discussion.

In the second game yesterday, it succeeded admirably and figured largely in the Indians' 4-1 triumph over the Braves which evened the series at one victory apiece.

"Well," grinned Lou, "it works this way. Just before the pitcher is ready to pitch, I flash the sign to Catcher Jim Hegan from my normal position. I wait for Hegan to relay the signal to the pitcher. As soon as he does that, I take three strides toward my bag. The pitcher counts three to himself to match my strides. Then he whirls and fires, not to me, but to the bag. I get there just in time to grab the ball, block the bag and make the tag."

Prep School Grid Teams Face Minor Weekend Games

Another football weekend begins today and—if the upset gremlins stay home—all it ought to mean to most of Oregon's unbeaten prep teams is another chalk mark on the right side of the ledger.

Not one of the major unbeaten, untied squads will run into really stiff competition this weekend. The toughest, probably, will be in Portland, where Jefferson pits its perfect record against Grant. The other unbeaten Portland squad, Roosevelt, should be able to stand up against Franklin.

University High of Eugene, which hasn't been beaten yet but isn't ranked as a major threat for the state championship, is likely to run into its first defeat at the hands of Cottage Grove. The Groves not only have won their first three starts, but are undefeated on the year.

Across the state, four other major schools which boast an unmarred record all face weak opponents.

Bend, Central Oregon's lone powerhouse, will entertain the Salem Vikings who haven't managed a victory yet. The Albany Bulldogs take on a weak Ashland squad that lost to Klamath Falls a week ago by the embarrassing score of 59-6.

Roseburg, Grants Pass Tied Hillsboro, striving to better its 1947 record of championship runnerup, is favored to hurdle West Linn. Grants Pass, the only perfect record squad in Southern Oregon, is a favorite over Coquille.

The weekend probably will leave Roseburg and Grants Pass still tied atop District 3 standings. Roseburg, which trails the Cavemen by virtue of a non-district opening loss, will play weaker Reedsport.

Over the Cascades, defending champion The Dalles will meet Pendleton in a try for a second straight League victory. The strong Klamath Pelicans are favored in a non-district game with Springfield.

In other weekend encounters Baker plays at Vale; Nyssa at La Grande; Madras at Prineville; Redmond at Burns; Altus at Eureka, Calif.; Marshfield at North Bend; Myrtle Creek at Myrtle Point; Elmira at Junction City; Central Catholic at Eugene; Milwaukie at Corvallis; Toledo at Lebanon; Estacada at Dallas; Sandy at Woodburn; Amity at Salem Academy; Dayton at Independence; Tillamook at Newport; Sweet Home at Taft; Beaverton at Forest Grove; Hillsboro at West Linn; Newberg at McMinnville; Oregon City at Tigard.

Golden Bears Will Face Wisconsin In Major Coast Tilt

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 8.—(AP)—The Golden Bears of California are on the spot this weekend as the standard bearer of what may be loosely termed the football prestige of the Pacific Coast Conference.

California plays Wisconsin at Berkeley in a game that has two distinctions:

1. It will doubtless determine if the Bears are as good as their boosters said before the 1948 season began;

2. It marks the last crack by a Coast Conference team at a Big Nine representative until the Rose Bowl battle roll around New Year's Day.

The rest of the weekend PCC schedule lists several interesting games, notably UCLA in a conference encounter with Washington at Seattle, and Southern California entertaining the Rice Owls of the Southwest Conference.

Oregon and Idaho meet in a conference affair at Moscow, ditto for Washington State and Montana at Missoula, Mont. Stanford renews its old rivalry with Santa Clara and Oregon State draws a brother in the University of Portland at Corvallis.

Best of the small college tilts will be the University of Hawaii against the University of Redlands at San Bernardino, Calif., in a renewal of the islanders' 33-32 thriller over the Bulldogs in the Pineapple Bowl last Jan. 1.

UCLA learned much from Northwestern, tried it out last week against Idaho, but faces a real game against the Huskies in their Seattle stronghold.

Oregon, Oregon State and Washington State figure to win but the Stanford-Santa Clara affair shapes up as much closer.

But all the coasters will be tuned in at Berkeley—and hoping.

Contract Signed For Erb Memorial Union

PORTLAND, Oct. 8.—(AP)—Contracts for construction of the Erb Memorial Union, a student center building for the University of Oregon, were signed at a special meeting of the State Board of Higher Education here yesterday.

It completes the final link in a campaign which began in 1923. Ross B. Hammond of the Ross B. Hammond company, who signed for the general contractors said construction of the building would begin immediately with plans calling for its completion in approximately a year and a half.

Prior to the signing, the board awarded a contract for bonds to finance the structure to Blythe and Company, Inc., Portland. Blythe's bid was the lowest of three received and considerably lower than had been expected. The bid, on an issue of \$1,900,000, average an interest rate of 3.4076 per cent with a premium of \$80.
