

Roseburg Indians In Top Shape For Reedsport Game

The Roseburg Indians left for Reedsport this morning with hopes of winning their third consecutive conference game. The lads have been working hard all week, and are confident they have the stuff to set Coach Harry Rose's eleven on its collective ear.

Cecil Sherwood has been drilling the boys on Reedsport offensive plays until there was little doubt in his mind that they will be prepared for anything the Braves might offer in the way of pass or running plays. The Reedsport tribe boasts a fast backfield capable of sending the ball through the air at will. They have a decided advantage in the experience department, with 20 men returning from last year, eighteen of whom are seniors.

The Reedsport clan has an added advantage of a gridiron surface that is new to the Roseburg boys. The Indians are used to fighting it out on a grass field while the Braves boast a true "turf." But if it doesn't rain, Sherwood is confident his tribe will have an even chance of being victorious after four quarters of play.

Indians In Good Shape
No new casualties have been reported on the Indian team, aside from the usual bumps and bruises. Bob Sanders will call the signals immediately after the kickoff and will be backed by Dale and Dick Bonebrake and Bob Scott. The line will be powered by center King Moore and guards Dale Blank and Hugh Fretwell. Jerry Anderson and Jack Mathis will perform tackle duties while end Kenny Payne and Joe Rauscher will give Reedsport plenty of worries when they sneak out for tosses from Scott and Sanders.

Sherwood's big worry during the past week was that the lads might get overconfident, and drop their first league game as a result. So far there have been no indications from the boys that they're "headed for the Rosebowl," as some colleges are inclined to start thinking just after winning a couple—just before dropping one or two. Three teams maintain the lead so far in the league, with Roseburg, Grants Pass and Reedsport tied for the number one spot.

The Braves' record to date is one win over North Bend, 13-12, and a tie with Marshfield, 13-13. Roseburg's record is two wins

Home Run Power Of Cleveland Not Working in Series

CLEVELAND, Oct. 9.—(AP)—Although they were rolling behind a winning margin in the world series today, the Cleveland Indians' vaunted home run power has been reduced to walks and singles.

The American League champions hit 155 homers during the regular season—tops for the league—but have only 15 singles and two doubles during three series games.

Manager Billy Southworth and ace relief pitcher Bill Vosselle said they knew why the "gopher" had been removed from drives hit by the Indians. "The Indians are not accustomed to our National League type of slow, breaking pitches," said Southworth after his Braves dropped a 2-0 decision yesterday. "They are fast ball hitters—and they haven't seen many fast balls this week."

Cleveland pilot Lou Boudreau was unimpressed about the Indians' shacked home run power, however.

Lou was happy to talk about the neat shutout hurling of his freshman star, Gene Bearden. "He is a greatly improved pitcher. I know he will be ready in the bullpen for the rest of the series if I need his help to win the 'big' one," Lou declared. "In fact, I can't find words to say how much he has improved."

In the losers' dressing room across the hall, there were a couple dozen subdued Boston players who sadly agreed with Boudreau.

Coast Conference Football Activity

MOSCOW, Ida., Oct. 9.—(AP)—The University of Idaho will be seeking its first win of the season when it meets the highly rated University of Oregon football team today in a Pacific Coast conference game.

Coach Dixie Howell is expected to give his sophomore back plenty of work against the Oregon team which has won two—Stanford and Santa Barbara—and lost only to the University of Michigan. Idaho has lost successively to Oregon State, the University of Utah and UCLA.

SEATTLE, Oct. 9.—(AP)—The University of Washington Huskies meet the UCLA Bruins at 2 p. m. today with the Huskies expected to put a mixed aerial and ground attack against the Bruins' speed and power.

The two teams meet on about even terms as far as backfield weight goes—the players averaging about 180 pounds. But the Bruins' take the edge on line height—209 to 202. And they have a speedy backfield.

The Bruins will start without their top backfield man, right halfback Skip Rowland, suffering from a wrenched knee. But coach Bert Labrucker said he will see action in the game.

MISSOULA, Mont., Oct. 9.—(AP)—Montana University Coach Doug Fessenden appeared a little on the gloomy side today as his Grizzlies prepared to meet Washington State College in their homecoming game at 2 p. m.

"Considering the number of severe injuries which we have suffered it does not appear to be in the cards for us to win," he said last night.

Washington State Coach Phil Sarboe was a little more vague, but he said, "we have not forgotten last year's one-point defeat by Montana."

U. S. Chamber To Seek 'Remedy' For Overtime Ruling

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—(AP)—The United States Chamber of Commerce announced yesterday it will seek a "remedy" in the next Congress for what it called the Supreme Court's "overtime on overtime" decision.

The case, involving Port of New York longshoremen, has been the subject of bitter controversy before and since the court's ruling last June.

The tribunal held then that an employer must include premium pay for night and other odd hour work in figuring a worker's average pay to determine overtime rates.

The chamber announcement said the court's ruling "has served to disrupt a number of collective agreements and to upset pay practices extending, in some cases, as far back as 1916."

The Justice Department has asked the court for a rehearing on the original 5 to 3 decision. It contends the government, as wartime operator of all ships, faces a big liability if "overtime on overtime" back pay claims are upheld.

The court majority denied that the effect of the ruling was to order overtime on overtime.

Sutherlin High Tips Glendale In B League Tussle

The Sutherlin High School B League gridders were hosts to Glendale Friday afternoon, but not very good ones, as they trounced the visitors 40-18, after coming from behind a 12-6 score at the end of the half.

Three touchdowns by Sutherlin in the third quarter and two more in the final frame put the game on ice for them. Quarterback Bill West played an outstanding game, according to Coach Warren Hills, throwing seven passes with each one connecting. Halfback Haskett accounted for four touchdowns for the Sutherliners, while fullback Pleuard and left end Sharpe each carried the ball across the zero line for two more scores.

Sharpe took a pass from Willis for a touchdown and Haskett intercepted a pass, running it back 40 yards for another score.

Willis crossed the goal line on a pass from Sharpe, and a pass from Pleuard to Haskett was good for one more tally. Haskett intercepted a Glendale pass and ran it across for an additional six points.

Glendale started out in fine style, giving the Sutherlin team a lot to worry about in the first half. A pass play from their own 25 netted them their initial touchdown. Another pass play, combined with fast running, gave them their second six points, and a kickoff return to the goal line was good for the third and final touchdown.

Sutherlin and Glendale are two of seven Douglas County B League six-man football teams. Sutherlin will go to Coos Bay next Friday, while Glendale will play host to Elkton High.

Just what it was that wrecked the scalpers' business wasn't entirely determined, but most persons attributed it to the threat of rain and the report the game's start would be delayed.

The "smart money boys" apparently waited too late to begin their final sales and wound up with the tickets and little money.

HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 9.—(AP)—"Farmer" Joe Kahut, Woodburn, Ore., heavyweight, scored a seventh round technical knockout over Jerry McSwain, Los Angeles, in their scheduled 10-round main event at the Hollywood Legion Stadium last night.

McSwain, 188½, appeared baffled by Kahut's crouching style. In the seventh he caught an overhand right to the chin and took the count of eight. Kahut, 183½, clipped him again and Ref. Reg Gilmore stopped the fight.

Hunter Mistakes Boy In Tree for Bear, Kills Him

COQUILLE, Ore., Oct. 8.—(AP)—Inquest into the death of Arthur Cotter, 17-year-old Coquille youth shot from an apple tree when mistaken for a bear, will be held here Saturday.

State Police reported Lawrence Simmon, 59, Broadbent, was hunting Wednesday on the old Carter place there and saw a movement in an apple tree. He called out, he said, but got no answer. Thinking a bear was in the tree he fired, and Cotter fell dead from the tree.

Cotter and two other youths, Byron Cotter and Carl Marney, both of Coquille, had been knocking apples from trees and the victim had climbed into one.

First Ruling in Teacher Suit Opposes Catholics

SANTA FE, N. M., Oct. 9.—(AP)—A group of New Mexico residents has won the first round in a suit to bar Catholic nuns, priests and brothers from teaching in tax-supported schools of the state.

In an oral decision, District Judge E. Turner Hensley held that Catholicism is taught in some of the state's public schools contrary to state and federal constitutions.

He has withheld ruling on specific points of the case, giving attorneys for both sides 30 days in which to submit findings as a basis for final judgment.

Grant, who died here September 2. The will, filed for probate yesterday, gives relatives about \$8,000, and the hospital gets the rest.



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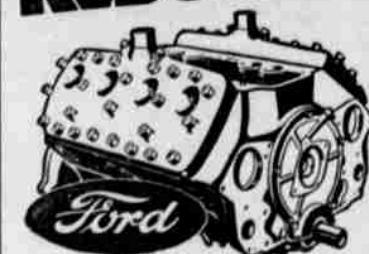
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
