

5th Column Busy, Hoover Declares

NEW YORK, Oct. 13—(AP)—Former President Herbert Hoover said last night that Communist "fifth columns" are working constantly for ill-will between this country and our South American neighbor nations.

Mr. Hoover spoke at a dinner of the America's Foundation, where he received the America's award for his "contribution to hemispheric amity and understanding."

The foundation promotes exchange scholarships between

North and South America.

"Nowadays," Mr. Hoover said, "Communist fifth columns in every country systematically and incessantly, by conspiracy and by subsidized press and radio, excite fear and ill will against us."

"Nor have we been without fault," he added.

"In two periods we have interfered with the internal affairs in these independent sovereignties.

"Thirty years ago we undertook, in two countries, to restore order by the use of troops. Unfortunately, in the past five years some officials from our State Department have regrettably interfered in internal elections."

Jobless Compensation Tax at All-Time Low

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 13—(AP)—The average unemployment compensation tax levy upon Oregon employers is at an all-time low of 1.68 per cent, the Unemployment Commission said today.

The tax ranges from .5 to 2.7 per cent of payroll. Employers with the more stable employment get the lower tax rates.

The commission said the experience rating system, under which the rates are reduced as a reward for stable employment, will save employers more than \$8,000,000 in taxes this year.

Warren Blasts Demo Handling Of Reclamation Unit

EN ROUTE WITH WARREN TO SPOKANE, Wash., Oct. 13—(AP)—Gov. Earl Warren invokes the Pacific Northwest today, keying his campaign to a denunciation of Democratic administration of the reclamation service.

Before heading toward the State of Washington and the Columbia River Valley, with its great Bonneville and Grand Coulee power and irrigation projects, the GOP vice presidential candidate used some of the sharpest language of his campaign before an audience in Butte, Mont., last night to charge:

1—Western reclamation projects have been "subordinated to political propaganda."

2—"False and misleading testimony" has been given committees of Congress.

3—"The bureau's activities have been geared to Democratic campaign activity rather than to engineering requirements."

A Republican administration, if assuming power next January, will restore the Reclamation Bureau.

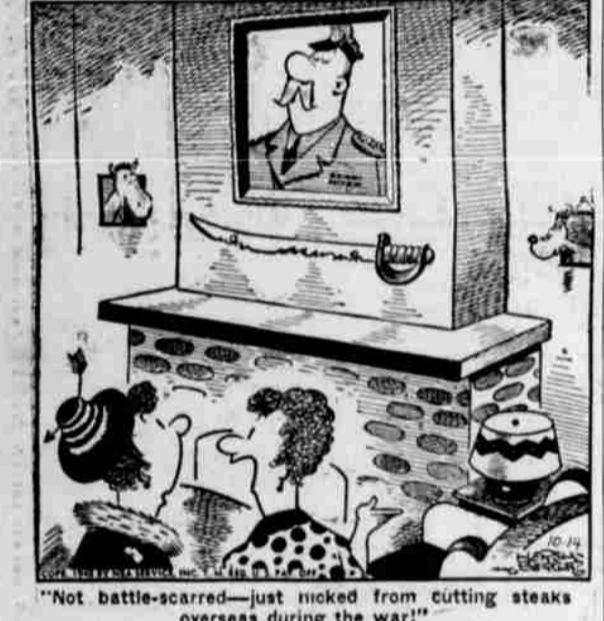
Dulles gave the Latin American delegates an informal dinner honoring Argentine foreign minister Bramuglia and others.

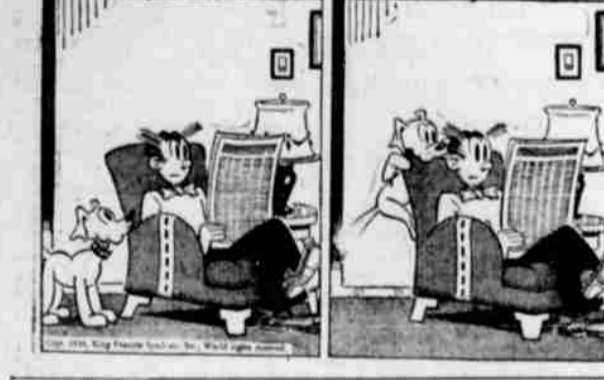
