Fading Blasts Revolt in I. W. A.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 12 (AP)—The CIO International Woodworkers of America got down to convention business routine today after hearing President James Fading blast away at leaders of a revolt in British Columbia.

In opening the convention yesterday, Fading accused leaders of Union's District Council No. 1 there of "betraying the organization they helped to build."

He was referring to Harold Pritchett, a former IWA International president, and Ernie Dalskog, one time executive board member. They sought to bolt the parent organization because of a U. S. immigration ban against some British Columbia delegates to the convention.

Seventeen delegates from British Columbia registered along with more than 400 here from 45 states, Alaska and Canada. A union spokesman said 26 others had been refused entry at the U. S.-Canadian border.

Fading said "we must have a Democratic organization, but we cannot have anarchy." In warning the Canadian revolt leaders they must answer for what they seek to do. He added that "local after local" in Canada has repudiated Pritchett and Dalskog.

Chinese Red Armies Open New Offensives

NANKING, Oct. 12 (AP)—Three Red columns have opened an offensive against the outer defenses of Suchow, 150 miles northeast of Nanking in Kiangsu province, dispatches said today. Evacuation of the families of government officials from the important rail and highway center already has started, the reports said.

The Communist troops, reportedly Gen. Chen Yi's second, seventh and 12th columns, were reported converging on the Southern Shantung towns of Fenghsien

and Peihsein, which are less than 40 miles north of Suchow. Government spokesmen said no developments were reported from the Taiyuan or Sian areas, both of which have been under heavy Red attacks.

Mystery Man Hunted In Chicago Murder

CHICAGO, Oct. 12 (AP)—Police began a hunt for a mysterious "Mr. X" today in their investigation of the brutal slaying of William John Granata, Republican politician.

Granata, candidate for circuit court clerk, was found hacked to death outside his loop skyscraper home early Friday.

"Mr. X" was injected into the inquiry last night. Miss Mary Germain, police headquarters operator, reported an unidentified caller, speaking excitedly, told her:

"If you check the Workers' Party books in the 27th Ward in that Granata case, go down the line of names until you find one beginning with X. He's a Greek."

In-Laws Blamed For Brisk Hospital Trade

LONDON, Oct. 12 (AP)—Kings College hospital's annual report said today one in every 100 of its out-patients is suffering from "in-laws."

The victims live with their in-laws and quarrel with them so much that they make themselves sick.

"Doctors send them to the hospital for treatment although organically there is nothing wrong with them," the report said, commenting that there'll be no real remedy until the housing shortage is eased.

42 Nabbed for Smuggling Jamaicans Into America

NEW YORK, Oct. 12 (AP)—The arrest of 42 aliens in a drive against smuggling of Jamaicans into this country through the

use of fraudulent birth certificates was announced today by the Immigration Service.

A spokesman said 30 were taken into custody in New York and 12 in Miami, Fla. Most were natives of the British West Indies.
