

Casey Stengel To Boss Yankees For Next Two Years

NEW YORK, Oct. 13.—(AP)—Charles (Casey) Stengel was named manager of the New York Yankees for 1949 and 1950 yesterday. He succeeds Stanley (Bucky) Harris, who withdrew from the job last week.

Stengel, who managed clubs in the National League for nine years, has been boss of the Oakland Oaks of the Pacific Coast League for the past three years. His club this year won both the league pennant and the league playoffs.

The announcement came just exactly 25 years to the day Stengel, then a New York Giant, hit a home run that gave his club a 1 to 0 triumph over the Yankees in the 1923 world series.

His salary under the two year pact was not disclosed. The new manager of the Yankees—the fifth for the club in less than three seasons—is 37 years old and was born in Kansas City.

He managed Brooklyn for three years, 1934 to 1936, but received greater fame for not managing the club in 1937 although drawing his full salary. Both New York clubs now are headed by former Brooklyn pilots, Leo Durocher coming across the bridge to guide the New York Giants this summer.

During his playing career Stengel was an outfielder and his batting average for the 14 years was .284.

Also Known As Clown

In addition to his ability as a teacher of young players, Stengel also is known as a clown. It was he who once lifted his cap to an umpire at home plate and a captive sparrow flew out. Another time, when umpires refused to call a game because of darkness, he wigwagged for a relief pitcher with a flash light.

After managing the Dodgers he was boss of the Boston Braves from 1938 through 1943. He was manager at Milwaukee in 1944, at Kansas City 1945 and at Oakland the past three years.

When coaching at first base, Stengel often whistled "Yankee Doodle." This is the story behind that tune by Casey.

When he broke in with the New York Giants many years ago he couldn't hit a lick. He was so tight at bat you could almost hear him squeak. The late John J. McGraw, a master of psychology, ordered Casey to whistle Yankee Doodle every time he stepped to the plate.

Stengel did and was soon relaxed. He began hitting the ball regularly. Casey has used this simple method since he began managing clubs and with success. Whistle while you work was a ball field remedy before it became the title of a song.

Indians Expect Tough Tilt With Marshfield Team

Norm West's Junior Varsity is working alongside Sherwood's girls getting ready for its second of the season against a reserve-packed Grants Pass JV squad. The Indian J-Vs will take to the road Saturday morning.

Meanwhile, the Senior High students are getting things under way for the annual homecoming dance that will be held in the girls gym immediately following the Marshfield-Roseburg game.

Announcement of the homecoming queen and her court will be the feature attraction during intermission.

Van Brocklin boosted his passing record to 29 completions in 56 throws for 391 yards and a percentage of .518. Nagel has completed three less but has gained 484 yards for a .531 percentage.

Jensen increased his rushing gain to 398 yards in 37 carries for an average of 10.7 yards per try.

However, southpaw Don Samuel of Oregon State has made the most yards in total offense—309 yards passing, 182 rushing, for 491.

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Railroads Seek Permit to Boost Freight Charges

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13.—(AP)—The railroad industry today asked authority to increase freight charges 13 per cent, and estimated the increase would bring in \$1,000,000,000 a year.

The carriers filed an amended petition with the Interstate Commerce Commission, asking the 13 per cent increase. The new application supplants an October 1 petition for an eight per cent rate increase.

Vice-President Jacob Aronson, of the New York Central System, said the additional five per cent advance now being asked is necessary because of the 10 cents an hour wage increase granted railway conductors and trainmen, effective October 16.

The new petition asked that the ICC grant an eight per cent increase immediately while the commission is considering the proposed 13 per cent advance as a permanent part of the rate structure.

As in the case of most of the freight rate increases since the war, the railroads listed certain named commodities for specific dollars and cents increases averaging less than the 13 per cent asked generally.

They proposed that advances on coal, coke, iron ore, fresh fruits, vegetables, lumber and sugar be held below the 13 per cent figure.

NEAHKAHNE, Oct. 12.—(AP)—C. G. Morrill, Portland, won the sweepstakes trophy at the Nehalem Bay Salmon Derby with a 42-pound, 4-ounce fish.

He picked up \$100 weekly prize money for his catch in the second week of the four-week competition and possession of the Neahkahnie challenge trophy for the next year.
