

No Winter Boost In Deep Sea Fish Prices Expected

ASTORIA, Ore., Oct. 14.—(AP)—The price of fillet of sole and other deep sea fish is unlikely to advance this winter.

Jesse Wright, spokesman for the Offshore Fishing Vessel Owners Association, said current decline in the country's livestock markets prompted fishermen to approve present fish prices. He said the Association voted unanimously not to ask increases.

Fishermen now get 10 cents a pound for large black cod, 7 cents for petrale and sand sole and down to 3 cents for lesser used bottom fish.

Meanwhile the state's seafood laboratory here reported experimental canning of the Pacific decapod, a fish similar to the East Coast horse mackerel. Dr. E. W. Harvey, research superintendent, said if the pack is satisfactory the recapture — being caught in increasing numbers off the Oregon-Washington coast — might be useful as food for Europe under the Marshall plan and possibly be promoted for the domestic market.

Health Exam Law For Pupils to be Discussed

PORTLAND, Oct. 14.—(AP)—Enforcement of a new Oregon state law requiring schools to be responsible for health examinations of all pupils will be discussed at a conference here Saturday.

Dr. Ralph Purvine, Salem, will preside at the session. Representatives of the State Health Association, the Oregon Board of Health, Board of Education, State Dental Society and health teachers from schools throughout the state will attend.

Americans Share Austerity With Germans During Soviet Attempt to Strangle Berlin

BERLIN, Oct. 14.—(AP)—Imagine living in a city where, if you step outside certain boundaries, you will be arrested.

Imagine living in a city where all your food and other supplies are dependent on an airlift. Where you have lights a few hours in the morning and a few hours at night. Where simple, everyday items such as candles are rationed. Where winter is coming on and the prospect for sufficient coal is dim. Where war is not out of the realm of possibility.

Blockade nerves are beginning to show in Berlin.

Irritability is perhaps the most frequent indication.

How will the Germans come through the winter?

All right, say the Western Allies.

This view is given by American military government officials who parcel out the food and coal brought in by air since the Russians began the blockade squeeze last June.

The average German gets a basic daily ration of 1,608 calories. Heavy workers get a top ration of 2,885 and housewives, 1,680.

(The average American receives about 3,000 calories daily. The food of heavy workers, such as lumberjacks, may total up to 6,000. The average Briton received 2,800 calories daily in the first six months of 1948.)

Will the Berlin ration level be maintained throughout the winter?

W. T. Babcock, deputy U. S. commandant in Berlin thinks so. Coal Major Problem.

The biggest problem is coal. Germans are going to have a mighty cold winter unless more planes can be added to the airlift. The old warming halls—public places where one came to get the chill out of his bones—probably will be revived.

This is the way the western sectors rationed coal last winter: A single individual got 500 pounds. There were five distributions of 100 pounds each. A family of three got 600, and those with families of five or more got 1,100.

At present airlift planes are bringing in about 4,500 tons of coal daily and altogether have delivered 144,000 tons. This is not enough to duplicate the 1947 ration.

It may not be hopeless, though. New airlifts at Tempelhof and Steglitz should be ready in December. More planes are being sought.

Under blockade conditions the health of the German has remained surprisingly good. A British report said flatly that there has been "no apparent effect."

One helpful factor is the abundance of drugs.

One of the major concerns is what to do about German business and industry. It has been

Gambling Loser Sues to Recover Twice Sum Lost

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Oct. 14.—(AP)—A lawsuit to collect double the amount of an alleged gambling debt was instituted in circuit court here today by Jack McAuliffe, rancher of Malin, against Darrell C. King, operator of the Merrill Billiards in Merrill.

McAuliffe's complaint claims he lost \$600 in a blackjack game illegally operated at King's place of business and asks recovery of \$1,200 under an Oregon law which permits double recovery from gambling losses.

The plaintiff stated that he lost \$160 in cash during the course of a game and wrote eight personal checks on a Tulalake, Calif., bank totaling \$6750, losing the amount of the checks also.

Dayton E. Van Vactor, McAuliffe's attorney, said he looked over the Malin rancher's bank statement and noted withdrawals corresponding to the allegations.

Mail Order Catalogs Reaching Troops Abroad

CHICAGO, Oct. 14.—(AP)—American troops and civilians in Germany will get copies of Sears, Roebuck and Company's Christmas catalog this week—just as soon as it is available to the home folks.

The first batch of 7,000,000 copies was in the mail today for customers in the nation's towns and on the farms. But distribution of the gift book, largest ever issued by Sears, has already begun in the American zone in Germany.

A shipment of catalogs was sent to Frankfurt by plane several days ago.

The 1948 Christmas catalog contains 319 pages—24 more than last year.

A Sears spokesman said no price study has been made of the new catalog, but assuredly very few items cost less than last year.

Tojo Gets Fat, Younger While Awaiting Fate

TOKYO, Oct. 14.—(AP)—Hideki Tojo expects to hear his fate read off by the International Tribunal late this month, but he doesn't seem to be worrying.

His attorney, George Blewett of Philadelphia, reports that Tojo, in Sugamo Prison, "has become fatter and younger than before." Tojo told Blewett he has "a surplus of food and time."
