Ousted Deputies At Portland File Appeal

PORTLAND, Oct. 14 (AP)—Three deputies fired by Sheriff Martin T. Pratt last week filed an appeal with the Civil Service Commission yesterday for an investigation and reinstatement.

The three—Leonard A. Klawa, Robert J. Kelly, and James Meacham—contended they were dismissed for political reasons. Meacham is a brother-in-law of Martin T. Pratt's opponent in the November election.

The Sheriff said Meacham and Kelly were discharged for "conduct prejudicial to the best interests of the Sheriff's office," and Klawa for "disrespect to the public."

U. S. Broadcasts Are Penetrating Reds' 'Iron Curtain'

HARTFORD, Conn., Oct. 14 (AP)—Erwin D. Canham, editor of the Christian Science Monitor, said yesterday that American ideas are penetrating Russia's "iron curtain" on a large scale. "There are between three and four million shortwave receiving sets in the Soviet Union," the Boston editor said, "and most of them are tuned in regularly to the Voice of America broadcasts. Many of them have a good many listeners to each set."

Canham, in a speech before the annual meeting of the Manufacturers Association of Connecticut, said it was difficult to tell whether the broadcasts are changing any Russian minds. "But the fact is that the Russians are hearing our side of the case on a large scale," he said. "That alone is important. It means that the effort to build up an impenetrable barrier to ideas has proved as impossible this time as it has been on most other occasions when dictatorial governments have sought to seal off their people."

Famous Danseuse Of Ziegfeld Follies Dies

HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 14 (AP)—Mary Eaton, who danced her way to stardom in the Ziegfeld Follies 30 years ago, is dead. The 47-year-old former stage and screen star died Sunday of a heart attack after a long illness.

The actress began her career at the age of three and achieved fame when at the age of 17 she became the Follies' youngest featured dancer. Later she co-starred with Eddie Cantor in "Kid Boots" and played the feminine lead in the first Marx Brothers film, "The Cocoanuts," filmed in 1929.

Car Theft Occurs Same Day as Prison Release

ONTARIO, Ore., Oct. 14 (AP)—James V. Neault of Baker was held here today as driver of a car stolen in Portland the same day Neault was released from the penitentiary at Salem. Sgt. Walter Walker of the

State Police said Neault was arrested for failure to yield right-of-way and when the car he was driving was identified as stolen, he was held for Portland police.

Walker said Neault was released from Salem at 9:30 a. m. one day last week and that night the car was reported stolen at Portland.

Alaskans Favor Democrats, Vote To Oust Fish Traps

JUNEAU, Alaska, Oct. 14 (AP)—Democrats were leading for all territorial offices on fragmentary returns from Tuesday's Alaska election.

With inconclusive totals, Democrats also were leading in the race for seats in the territorial legislature. The early returns indicated the Democrats might win back control of the lower house from the Republicans.

The advisory vote was running more than seven to one in favor of abolishing fish traps. The proposal in the measure is for liquidation of the traps over a 10-year period. Any decisive action on outlawing traps, however, would have to be taken by Congress, which holds full authority over the territory.

The traps were a major issue in one of the hottest election campaigns Alaska has had in a couple of decades. Voters went to the polls in record numbers, with the vote at Anchorage doubling the 1946 total.

E. L. Bartlett, the non-voting Democratic delegate to Congress, was running up a three to one edge over R. H. Stock, his Republican opponent.

In the races for the lower house of the legislature, 14 Democrats and six Republicans were leading in the three divisions. The same seats were evenly divided between Republicans and Democrats in the 1947 legislature. In the territorial senate races, four Democrats and two Republicans were leading.
