Navy Designates Local Unit For Training Tasks

Roseburg's Volunteer Composite Unit 131 has been designated as one of eight Volunteer Training Staging Units, according to information contained in the 13th Naval Reserve Bulletin for September. The other units recognized are at Klamath Falls and Astoria in Oregon, at Bremerton, Walla Walla and Port Townsend, Wash., Pocatello, Ida., and Helena, Mont.

Further recognition of the V-6er's importance in the Naval Reserve program was recently manifested by the Navy Department's authorization of Volunteer Training Staging Units, the bulletin states.

"The commandant may now designate certain qualified Volunteer Naval Reserve groups as Volunteer Training Staging Units, thus eliminating much—or all—of the travel that the V-6er has had to accomplish at his own expense while going to and from a Naval Reserve Training Center."

It is planned that, as additional units qualify, they will also be designated. Administrative limitations, however, will restrict such designations to one in each large area.

"The establishment of Volunteer Training Staging Units is an encouraging development that should enable a greater number of V-6ers to take advantage of the many profitable and interesting 14-day training cruises offered to reservists of this district."

Unions Constitute Bar to Red Threat, AFL Chief Says

CHICAGO, Oct. 16 — (AP) — America's labor movement is the nation's "first line of defense against the threat of a Communist fifth-column," AFL President William Green said yesterday.

Declaring free enterprise system, the veteran union leader told the Chicago Executive Club: "If our free enterprise system operates for the benefit of all the American people, it will be unconquerable."

"If it becomes unbalanced and begins to function for the benefit of a few at the expense of the rest, it is doomed to failure," Green said. His American Federation of Labor not only is "immovably and uncompromisingly" opposed to Communism here but also is battling Red-controlled labor organizations in Europe and South America.

Business-labor battles in this country are "playing directly into the hands of the Communists, whose favorite strategy is to foment class warfare," he said, adding:

"Instead of receiving help and encouragement from industry and from our government, which would strengthen our hand in defense of the free enterprise system, the ground has been cut out from under us by drastic and crippling legislation."

Claiming that the Taft-Hartley law is designed "to make strong unions weak and weak unions weaker," Green said this opens the way for the Communists "to move right in and take over."

American Killed By Commies, Greece Claims

ATHENS, Oct. 15 — (AP) — Athens newspapers said today the government will announce in Salonika Sunday that Greek Communists killed CBS Correspondent George Polk.

For nearly two months Greek police have held for questioning, without charges, an avowed leftist newsmen, Gregory Stakopoulos, and his mother.

Polk's body, with a bullet hole in the head, was found floating in Salonika Bay last May 16. The 34-year-old Port Worth, Tex., correspondent had been missing from his hotel room for a week. He was reported to have told his colleagues he intended to try

Vets Hospital Sets Training Days For Volunteer Workers

An orientation and indoctrination course for volunteer workers at the Veterans Administration Hospital has been announced by Robert P. Kidder, chairman of the Volunteer Services Advisory committee.

The course will be given in the recreation building at the Veterans Hospital Oct. 19, 20 and 21 for all volunteer workers who have not had the course previous to this time and for any others who would be interested in giving some of their time and efforts to the welfare of veterans in the hospital. The classes will be held in the afternoons from 1 to 4 p.m.

The purpose of the course is to provide the volunteer hospital worker with an understanding of

the nature and significance of the volunteer program, an elementary knowledge of the types of patients being assisted by this program, and the principles and methods by which the program will be carried out.

The classes will be under the supervision of Mr. Kidder, but will be conducted by various members of the hospital staff. Subjects covered will be organization of the hospital, mental and emotional aspects of neuropsychiatric patients, hospital etiquette and ethics, rehabilitation and entertainment and recreation. Instructional films will be shown, and lectures or short talks given by about 20 members of the hospital staff.

Anyone interested in assisting in this volunteer services program is requested to contact Mr. Kidder at the Veterans Hospital.

Dutch Family of 8 Arrives to Reside At Grants Pass

PORTLAND, Oct. 16 — (AP) — A Dutch farmer, his wife and six children arrived in Grants Pass yesterday bound for Grants Pass, where they will make their new home.

George Kuitert, speaking through an interpreter at the Union depot, said he was impressed by the wealth of the United States, with its abundance of food and clothing.

The Kuiterts, dressed in English-made clothes and looking much like an American family, flew from Amsterdam to New York, then came on by air to Chicago. From there they made the remainder of the trip by train. They had been waiting for passports for more than a year.

Kuitert's brother, Thys, farms near Grants Pass, and the newly-arrived family will make their home with him until they can get their own dairy farm.

En route west, the Dutch family stopped in Wisconsin where they saw thousands of the same Holstein-Friesian cattle that grazed on land by the Zyder Zee near their native village of Under Kollum.

The Kuiterts speak Friesian, a Dutch dialect which has a good many Highland Scotch words, and so have a knowledge of some English.

The interpreter, Mrs. Tryntje Josthumus, Portland, explained, for example, that the phrase "good milk and good cheese" is the same in English and in Friesian.

Food and clothing are rationed in Holland, Mrs. Kuitert said.

and the Dutch are able to buy only a pound of meat and a pound of butter a month.

During the war, the Nazis broke dikes near the Kuitert farm, but it was not flooded. They had a herd of 15 cows. The family decided to come to America after Thys Kuitert made a visit to Holland at the end of the war.

The children's ages range from 1 to 19 years.
