Camel Mascot of Air Force Going To Berlin to Fill Role of Santa

FRANKFURT, Germany, Oct. 16.—(AP)—Clarence, the goofy camel, mascot of the U. S. Air Force's 86th Wing, is flying to Berlin Monday with goodies for the blockaded city's kids.

The derby-wearing camel has been taking donations of food and money at the Wing's football games. So now Col. C. T. Edwison, of Topeka, Kan., the Wing's commander, and Lt. Donald R. Butterfield will escort him to Berlin in a B-26 to pass out fruit, canned food and candy.

"Clarence will supervise the passing out of the gifts," says Lt. Butterfield. "He's in charge of the whole thing."

Lt. Butterfield spotted Clarence several weeks ago near Wheelus Field in Tripoli. A sharp Arab sold him for \$45. Butterfield, whose home is at Montgomery, W. Va., hoisted Clarence into his plane along with Sam, a jackass, and flew them to Neuberg Field, Germany. It's the Wing's present base.

Now he's the Wing's official mascot and Sam is the assistant mascot. Clarence drinks condensed milk, and soon he'll have a

special blanket tailored to his irregular contour and inscribed by "Clarence, 86th Fighter Wing football team mascot."

"Clarence is a goofy camel," says Lt. Butterfield. "Why, on his first flight he went to sleep. That is, until Sam bit a hunk out of his leg. Then he let out a roar which drowned out the sound of my engines."

Butterfield adds: "Clarence likes everybody except Sam. And everybody likes Clarence except my wife, who objects to being called the wife of the U. S. Air Force's camel trainer."

Sam's bite sent Clarence to the hospital for eight days. But since his release he's attended all of the Wing's football games against teams from other military bases in Germany. Says Butterfield: "That camel brings us luck. We haven't lost a single game since he started watching us from the sidelines. What a camel!"

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Anti-Trust Suits Hit Ten Plumbing Supply Concerns

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—(AP)—The Justice Department yesterday announced the filing of three separate civil anti-trust suits against 10 plumbing supply manufacturers.

The suits, filed in the Federal District Court at Philadelphia, charge the firms with restraining competition in the sale of brass fittings and plumbing fixtures.

Attorney General Clark said the actions were taken as part of an investigation "into the high cost of housing."

One suit, the department said, was filed against Kohler Company of Kohler, Wis.

The second, it was announced, names the Briggs Manufacturing Co. of Detroit, Mich., and three of its manufacturing subsidiaries: Abington Pottery Inc., Abington, Ill.; John Douglas Company, Cincinnati, and Republic Brass Co., Cleveland.

The department said the third complaint is directed against Max Gerber, operating as Gerber Enterprises of Chicago, Ill., and four affiliated corporations: Globe Valve Corp., Delphi, Ind.; Kokomo Sanitary Pottery Corp., Kokomo, Ind.; Woodbridge Sanitary Pottery Corp., Woodbridge, N. J.; and Gerber Industries Inc., Delphi, Ind.

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
