with asphalt and placing of curbs was approved with an emergency clause, and sealed bids are to be advertised for as soon as they can be prepared. The work has been approved by the Planning Commission.

Together with the widening of Military Street, for which the low bid of Rouse and Bell has been accepted by the council, this work will complete the widening of this highway to the city limits, where it will connect with a 35-foot width county road. The council discussed a .55-foot width for Harvard, but decided upon the broader road to conform with the established policy of 40-foot width streets within the city. The estimated cost for Harvard widening will be \$8,952, while that for Corey will be \$3,232.

An ordinance also for the improving of East Washington St. from Chadwick Street to the east line of Donation Land Claim 39 with cement paving was passed. No remonstrances were registered at the hearing held prior to passing of the ordinance.

Action on Improvement of East Third Street was deferred until the next Council meeting, as the plans and specifications are not yet prepared. The City Engineer Arthur Boyer reported that because of work being done by the state, on East Second Ave. South, an exact grade cannot be established at this time.

**Split Vote on New Building**  
Construction of a public block building alongside the south side of the City Hall to house Police Department cars and motorcycles was approved after considerable discussion by a 4 to 2 vote. Councilmen William Adair, Frank Ashley, Jack Hart and Henry Carstens approved the construction, while Harrison Winston and Hal Ayyotte voted against the motion.

The principal objections were not against the need for such a building to house the equipment, but to constructing too many additions to the present City Hall, which, it is considered, cannot serve the city for many more years.

Since only \$1,500 is budgeted for construction of the building, and the lowest estimate was \$1,800, the council voted to meet the balance from the street sinking fund, with provision that a portion of the building be set aside for use by the Street Department.

Final action on the matter was made contingent upon whether the additional money from the street sinking fund could be legally used. The matter will be given further study by the city attorney before the work will proceed. A 12 x 47-ft. building is contemplated.

**Bus Stops Protested**  
Protest registered in a letter by Bob Doty, J. H. Taylor and Jack West to the bus stop in front of their places of business on Jackson at Washington Street, was referred to Councilman Ashley, chairman of the committee pertaining to the bus route, to investigate and make a recommendation at the next meeting.

The protest stated that some persons waiting for the bus at this location have assumed the privilege of waiting inside the stores to the point where they have become a nuisance, the complainants pointed out.

A letter from the Retail Trades Association of the Chamber of Commerce protesting overtime parking in metered zones was referred also to Councilman Ashley, Police Committee chairman.

**Poles To Be Removed**  
Robert J. Keeffe, 304 E. Roberts Street, appeared in behalf of a recent petition asking that city-owned property on Thompson Street near Roberts be made into a park. The council had previously disapproved the proposal, inasmuch as a park is planned on the swimming pool property.

Keeffe pointed out the principal problem is that the designated property is being used by the Telephone Company for storage of poles. The residents of the district object to this both from the standpoint that it is "unsightly," and "unsafe" for children who play around the poles. The Telephone Company has been using the property under verbal lease. The Council, acknowledging the property owner's request, voted to terminate the company's lease by the first of the year.

City Engineer Boyer reported the sewer extension work in Kinney's Addition has been successfully completed by the contractors, Rouse and Bell. Hearing of objections to the work was set for the next council meeting, Nov. 1, following acceptance of the engineer's report by the council.

**Building Removal Deferred**  
Another 69 days was granted Fred Hunter in which to dispose of his building on Woodard St.

member of the Roseburg Community Chest board, who was program chairman. The meeting was presided over by John D. Todd, vice-president of the Chamber of Commerce.

**Items Explained**  
David J. McCarroll, secretary of the Roseburg Community Chest, explained how the Community Chest money will be spent locally. The total goal for the city will be \$24,975, of which \$2,000 will go to the Oregon Chest.

The Salvation Army has been allowed \$4,500, of which the Douglas County Community Chest will raise 15 per cent. The Boy Scouts will receive \$4,500 from the Roseburg Chest, with other arrangements to be made for fund raising elsewhere in the county. Camp Fire Girls are to have \$3,975, with one-third to be raised by the county. The new Y.M.C.A. will get \$7,000. Administrative expenses of the drive have been estimated at \$1,000.

"This is the final campaign of the year. Let's get behind and push it over," the luncheon guests were urged.

Also introduced at the luncheon were Benton O. Wilson, campaign chairman of both the Roseburg and Douglas County Community Chests, and W. J. Adair, president of the Roseburg Community Chest board of trustees. Representatives of each of the member agencies were introduced.

**Lumber Company Sued On Log Furnishing Claim**
