

FM Radio Sets Put on Towboats

The Umpqua River Navigation Company of Reedsport has installed FM radio sending and receiving sets on its five towboats.

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gravel digger and dredge. Sets have also been installed in the automobiles of Ernest Zinkler and Carlos Rebagliati, company officials, with the main broadcasting set located in the company's office on the Reedsport waterfront.

A radio tower has been constructed on top of the company's boat shop near the county dock. The necessary permit has been secured from the Federal Communications Commission, and af-

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fidavits filed showing the location of various sets.

Purpose of the installation is to secure continuous contact with the company's mobile units from the main office. The sets are supposed to have a maximum range of fifty miles, but the hilly country near Reedsport cuts this range down to some extent.

The sets are installed on the gravel digger maintained in the Umpqua River near Mill Creek; the steel digger, which is used on both the Smith and Umpqua Rivers, and the following tugboats: Westport, Juno, Cathlamet, Tiger and Adel.

Besides the general transmission of orders and ordinary information, the new installation is expected to be especially valuable in case one boat operator has motor trouble or difficulty with a tow, and needs quick assistance from another boat.

Tomato Hits Dewey's Car in New York State

Items in Foreign Aid Ridiculed

FRENCH LICK, Ind., Oct. 18.—(P)—Rep. John Taber (R-N.Y.), said today the House Appropriations Committee, had found "such ridiculous items" in the European Recovery Program as \$288,000,000 more for coca-cola, pi-pi off debts which they owe the U. S.

Taber, chairman of the committee, added they found \$200,000,000 more for coca-cola, picture books and such things.

"This, so we were advised, was for the reconstruction of Europe," Taber told the annual meeting of the National Association of State Chambers of Commerce.

White Mice Wanted For Seafood Toxic Tests

JUNEAU, Alaska.—(P)—Do you happen to have any spare white mice running around in your attic?

The U. S. Fish and Wildlife service is soon to advertise in Seattle and California newspapers, it was learned here, for bids for providing 300 to 400 of the little critters monthly for

the Service's Laboratory in Ketchikan. They will be used in experiments with toxic content of clams and other seafoods.

Wright Brothers' Plane Coming Back to America

LONDON, Oct. 19.—(P)—The Wright Brothers' biplane "Kittyhawk," first power-driven airplane to accomplish flight, came down from the ceiling of the Kensington Science Museum yesterday for dismantling and shipment to the Smithsonian Institute in Washington.

The "Kittyhawk" has been on display here since 1928 when it was lent by the late Orville Wright for an initial period of five years.

Varmints in Clackamas Increase Livestock Loss

OREGON CITY, Ore.—(P)—A wild animal increase is blamed in Clackamas County for mounting livestock loss.

Farmers reported foxes, coyotes, wildcats and bears more numerous in the foothills than usual. One government trapper caught 11 foxes, two coyotes and a bobcat last month.

Students Pick Nuts To Aid Building Project

FOREST GROVE, Ore.—(P)—Students are taking to the filbert fields to help Pacific University to get an optometry building. Their \$1 an hour average pay is donated to the school for construction of the \$250,000 building. Already \$27,000 has been raised, mostly through donations.

Lillebo Out For Reedsport Mayor

The nominating petition of Tom Lillebo, long-time Reedsport resident and general contractor, for mayor of Reedsport was filed Friday. To date, no other filing has been made for that office, with John Skauluren, incumbent, steadfastly refusing to run for re-election.

Earl Baltazar, councilman filling out an unexpired term to which he had been appointed, remains on the council until the expiration of the term, it has been found, instead of only until the general election next month.

Other hold-over councilmen are John Unger and S. S. Smiley. Petitions have been filed nominating the following for the three vacancies that will exist at the end of the year: C. R. Simpson, Melvin Jensen, Irving Johnson, Tom H. Richmond, Allen Swafford and Alton Elwood.

Catholic Editor, Farm Family Receive Awards

LA CROSSE, Wis., Oct. 19.—(P)—A New York Catholic editor and a Wisconsin farm family received awards here at the National Ca-

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tholic Rural Life Conference. The Rev. John La Follette, S. J., editor of the publication "America," was presented a bronze plaque and a scroll for "the most outstanding contribution to the rural life cause."

Mr. and Mrs. Mathias Kaiser and their 11 children, ranging in age from four to 24, were named the prize Catholic rural family of 1948. Three of the children are in a convent, two are married and another is studying for the priesthood in La Crosse. The Kaisers operate a 160-acre dairy farm at Stratford, Wis.

Endorses Tom Dewey

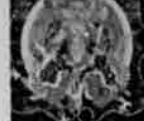
