

Mexico Snaps Off Recruiting of Farm Workers for U. S.

EL PASO, Tex., Oct. 19 — (AP) — Mexico snapped off recruiting of Mexican farm workers (braceros) for the U. S. yesterday and an immigration officer promised the border here "will be closed tight" to Mexican laborers without proper papers.

Mexico recalled its chief of contracting and the foreign office said it considered the U. S.-Mexico bracero agreement of Feb. 17, 1948, "tacitly broken."

The foreign office said it considered the pact no longer exists.

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tent because border officials here allowed "wetbacks"—those who cross the border illegally—to go to work without contracts.

District Immigration Director Grover C. Wilmoth yesterday said the border here "will be closed tight" against Mexican laborers without papers.

Under his orders, the illegal entrants were paroled to the Texas Employment Commission. Fred C. Wendt, local TEC representative, said 8,000 had been placed in the last few days with farmers of Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado and West Texas.

Henry Le Blanc of Austin, chief of farm procurement for the TEC told the Fort Worth, Tex., Star-Telegram yesterday that "the immigration service is not paroling them to us."

Wilmoth said the border was quiet yesterday, with almost no entries.

Election Sure To Cut Average Age Of U. S. Senators

WASHINGTON — One thing the voters are certain to do this fall is to cut the average age of United States senators down a notch or two. It is now between 57 and 58.

Only 33 Senate seats are at stake this year. The remaining 63 senators will be a year older during the next session, but normal replacements usually are by younger persons.

Voluntary retirement and primary defeats already have assured 10 new senators. Total age of the retired 10 is 646 years, an average of between 64 and 65 years.

Those who will replace them are certain to be younger. Voters and the grim reaper pare the average down a year or two every two years. It generally runs just under 60.

Senator Capper (R-Kan.) at 83 is the eldest present senator and he has decided against seeking another term. He is more than twice the age of the present Senate "baby," Senator McCarthy (R-Wis.), who will be 39 on Nov. 14 and is the only present senator in the 30s.

McCarthy probably will lose that title to Russell Long, Democratic nominee in Louisiana. Long will be just 30, minimum age set for a senator. He is scheduled to succeed Senator Feazel (D-La.), who is 83 and one of the youngest retiring senators. That will cut 23 years off the aggregate of Senate ages.

Mrs. Margaret Chase Smith (R-Me.), now 50, already has been elected to succeed Senator White (R-Me.), 71. That will be another 21 years off.

The same pattern follows through most of the other Senate replacements, although 81-year-old Senator Green (D-R.I.) is a candidate for re-election. He is the second eldest senator but still walks to his office briskly and bareheaded most days when in Washington.

Only 14 of the present senators were born since 1900, although 19 senators still are in the 40s.

Thirty-nine of the lawmakers are in their 50s. Twenty are in their 60s and 15 in their 70s.

Washington state has the youngest pair of senators: Cain (R), 42, and Magnuson (D), 43.

Kansas has the eldest brace in Casper, 83, and Reed (R), 77.

Some senators are as touchy about their ages as a middle-aged spinster. Thirteen of them do not even list their birthdays in the official biographies they prepare for the Congressional Directory.

The youngest senator who does not list his birthday is Magnuson. He merely lists the year of his birth, 1905. He was 43 last April 12.

Ages of other senators who do not list this in the Directory: Brooks (R-Ill.) 51, Butler (R-Neb.) 70, Byrd (D-Va.) 61, Connally (D-Tex.) 71, Langer (R-Ind.) 71, Malone (R-Nev.) 58, McKellar (D-Tenn.) 79, Murray (D-Mont.) 72, Robertson (D-Va.) 61, Thomas (D-Okl.) 72, Tobey (R-N.H.) 68.

Fugitive Teller Nabbed With \$15,000 in Cash

SPOKANE, Oct. 19 — (AP) — A 25-year-old teller was held on \$5,000 bail here today pending transfer to Chicago to face trial on charges of embezzling \$27,261 from a Chicago bank.

He was arrested at the small town of Addy Sunday, and yesterday FBI agents went with his 19-year-old bride to the teller's room in Addy and found \$15,000 cash under the mattress.

Special Agent J. B. Wilcox, in charge of the Seattle FBI office, identified the man as Donald G. Glenn.

The Chicago office of the FBI said it had sought Glenn since Sept. 23 when he disappeared after working at the Chicago Central National Bank for about two months. Bank officials said the money was taken from an individual teller's safe.

Oregon Leads U. S. In Adult Population Gain

PORTLAND — (AP) — A Bureau of Census report lists Oregon as the nation's leader in increase of adult population.

An increase of 361,000 adults since 1940 lifted the state to a total of 1,109,000, an increase of 48.3 per cent. Washington, up 40.1 per cent, was the No. 2 state.

For those under 21, Oregon ranked second, increasing 175,000 since 1940 to a total of 516,000. The percentage increase was 51.2. California was high with a 59.7 per cent increase.

U. S. Doles More Recovery Funds

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20 — (AP) — The Economic Cooperation Administration yesterday approved \$17,684,112 in recovery grants to five European countries and China.

The actions brought the total of ECA assistance to date to \$2,242,779,944.

Shipments of machinery and industrial equipment and materials to Denmark, France, Greece, and the Netherlands swelled the total.

China was authorized to obtain \$1,030,000 worth of wheat flour from this country. The United States also will pay \$187,509 in ocean freight costs.

The other authorizations included:

France — Lumber products, \$270,000.

PAY HIKE GRANTED
PORTLAND, Oct. 20 — (AP) — Some 300 AFL dairy workers here have been granted a 5-cent-an-hour wage increase by Portland milk distributors.

The employees, mostly truck drivers, had asked a 10-cent-an-hour wage increase. John Mellem, president of the distributors' group, said there would be no immediate increase in the price of milk.
