Kahut Decisions Maxim on 2-1 Nod

PORTLAND, Oct. 20.—(AP)—

Joe Maxim still pondered in unbelief today a split decision given Joe Kahut of Woodburn, Ore., in their 15-round heavyweight bout last night.

Manager Joe Kearns said he was protesting the decision with the Oregon Boxing Commission.

Referee Ralph Gruman gave Maxim the nod, but judges Al Lix and Pack McFarland voted for Kahut. The Cleveland hit the Oregon boy often but gently.

Kahut connected seldom but well.

In a scheduled 10-round preliminary, Jack Snapp of Klamath Falls, knocked out Billy Arnold, Washington, D. C., in the seventh.

Snapp, weighing 161, knocked his 155-pound opponent down for a short count in the second, and in the seventh put a right flush to the button and Arnold was all through for the night.

His handlers carried him to his corner where he was revived.

In another semifinal feature, Roscoe Toles, 197, Detroit, Mich., decided Billy Petersen, 201, Portland, in 10 rounds. Toles, a fast but light puncher, hit the Portlander at will. There were no knockdowns.

Earlier, Joe Clemo, 127, Portland, decided Rolando Del Gallo, Cuba, in six rounds and Bob Sherrard, 197, Seattle, knocked out Gordon McKay, 197, Klamath Falls, in the third of a four round go.

\$500,000 Prize Money Up for Bowling Congress

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Oct. 20

—(AP)—An all-time high in prize money—\$500,000—will be offered for the 1949 American Bowling Congress tournament here Feb. 12.

The Congress said yesterday it will use 52 alleys in huge Convention Hall, the largest number in the history of the event.

The tournament is expected to run for 60 days and 6,864 teams can be accommodated.

Entry fees must be filled by Nov. 20 for teams with reservations, with final closing of entries Dec. 15, the Congress said.

Two of the Jones Boys, "Jones the Farmer" and Rufus Jones, the "Puddin' Head," have been signed to battle each other at the Roseburg Armory Saturday night — feature attraction of Matchmaker Don Owen's weekly wrestling show.

Both men are rugged characters, but Rufus is a Negro and "The Farmer" is from Arkansas which means only one thing, and that's rough going.

Farmer Jones has been a sensation in his first two appearances here, chalked up two of his amazing string of triumphs registered in the Pacific Northwest during the past few months.

He defeated Alce Kasaboski and then downed Glen Knox in straight falls.

Rufus Jones, the hard-skinned Detroit villain, has been just as impressive here, although disqualified in a match against Herb Parks last Saturday—when he floored Referee Elton Owen and attacked the bleeding Parks after he couldn't continue. Previous to that he had head-butted such men as Knox and Bruno Angelo into submission.

NEW YORK, Oct. 20.—(AP)—Joe

Louis definitely will fight next June at the Yankee Stadium against one of three opponents—Lee Savold, Ezzard Charles or Joe Baksi.

The champ said so himself yesterday when he announced he was giving up his four-month "retirement."

It was no coincidence that Louis made his speech after a conference with Mike Jacobs and Harry Markson, the new managing director of the Twentieth Century Sporting Club.

Here's what Louis said:

"I'm going to give the Baksi-Charles fight Dec. 10 (at Madison Square Garden) the once-over and if it looks good I will fight the winner. If nothing comes of that I might take on Lee Savold who's pulling a good comeback."

Glendale High Six Tips Canyonville

The game went scoreless until three minutes before the end of the first half, when Jim Cobey, Canyonville back, threw a pass to Dick Cloud, who was standing in the end zone. Center Jack Anderson ran over the extra point.

With one minute left to play in the first half, halfback Dick Williams of Glendale ran 59 yards, scoring a touchdown. Williams also ran across the extra point, making it 7-7 at the half.

Glendale took a 50-yard punt to the Canyonville three-yard line just three minutes before the end of the third quarter. Canyonville got the ball on downs, but fumbled with Glendale recovering on the Canyonville one.

Two plays later Glendale was pushed back to the five, but a third down pass to Bill Chandler, Glendale halfback, who was standing in the end zone, put Glendale ahead.

Canyonville Coach Ronald C.

Krasky reports the game was well played and well fought all the way. He said Canyonville made the most first downs. This was Canyonville's first season of six-man football after several years' absence from the sport.
