Prepare Cars For Winter Hazards, Motorists Urged

With earlier hours of darkness signalling approach of winter, motorists are reminded by Secretary of State Newberry to put their vehicles in readiness for the dangerous weather months.

"All of us who drive are noticing the heavier demands being made on our electrical equipment," he pointed out. "We should have our lights, battery and heater inspected now to be sure they're in good condition for winter driving."

State accident records, he said, show that the principal causes of higher winter accident rates are visibility and inadequate traction.

"To maintain visibility," Newberry emphasized, "the motorist must, in addition to having good lights, be certain that windshield wipers and defrosters are working properly. You must see a hazard to avoid it."

As aids to good traction on wet and slippery pavements, he advised that tires be well-mated, with good treads, and that brakes be equalized to prevent unnecessary skidding.

"To insure safety, add a liberal use of common sense, constantly keeping in mind that speed must be adjusted to changing weather, road and traffic conditions," he concluded.

Ballot Splitting In November May Set New Record

ALBANY, N. Y., Oct. 19.—(AP)—The possibility that ballot splitting may reach an all-time high in the Nov. 2 election was studied today by the followers of Gov. Thomas E. Dewey.

The Republican presidential nominee worked here today on his next major campaign speech, to be delivered tomorrow night in New York City before the Herald-Tribune Forum. He is expected to discuss plans for development of the nation's resources.

Dewey will make a non-political speech at an Al Smith memorial dinner in New York Thursday night. Plans for the weekend are not definite.

With his second campaign trip behind him, Dewey and his strategists were said to be convinced that there is going to be a lot of ticket splitting this year—in fact, possibly more than ever before.

This apparently is due to interest that has developed in Senate and House races and, in some instances, in close contests for governorships.

Landslide Expected
The Dewey camp's feeling is that its candidate will win by what might amount almost to a landslide in electoral votes.

Some of his more optimistic supporters are counting close to 400 of the 531 electoral votes in his column. Others scale this down to nearer 325.

But even with a top-heavy result in electoral votes, most of Dewey strategists don't think their candidate will have a landslide in the popular vote.

Because of this they are frankly afraid that Dewey's margin in some states will not be large enough to pull through some Republican senators who are under no fire.

The indications are, they say, that straight ticket voting may not be up to par for presidential elections.

While this will hurt Republican candidates in states which Dewey may carry with slim mar-

gins, ballot splitting also is expected to help some GOP entries in states that may give President Truman a narrow majority.

Scolded Youth Invites Another to Slay Him

CLEVELAND, Ore., Oct. 19.—(AP)—Thoughts of suicide came to Hugh Mellon, 16, when his family scolded him for taking a girl to see a football game at Ann Arbor, Mich., police said today.

So he invited a 16-year-old friend to his home last night to see his new .22 caliber rifle. Then he urged the boy to point it at him and pull the trigger, detectives said.

At first the boy refused, saying he had been told never to point a gun, the detectives added. But Hugh assured him it was empty so he complied.

The bullet entered Hugh's head and killed him.

Police reported a note was found that said: "One half hour after I write this I will die."

Tot Missing Ten Hours Discovered With Dog

ROSEVILLE, Calif., Oct. 19.—(AP)—Sobbing heavily as he toddled along a country road in the darkness, 21-year-old Jackie Tuft was found early today after having been lost 10 hours.
