Undaunted by two losses in a row, the Roseburg Indians are putting in long hours on the local practice field getting ready for their rip north this weekend, where they will play against the Cottage Grove Lions Friday at 8 p.m.

The Lions are leading contenders for the Tri-County League championship. During the past three weeks they have racked up two wins and a tie. The Lions beat Junction City, 40-1, tied University High (Eugene), 7-7, and last week beat Elmira, 24-7.

With a record like that starting the Indians in the face, it is little wonder that most of the fans are taking this week's scrimmage seriously.

The Senior High mentor is concentrating on heavy tackling drills, with special emphasis on stopping the opposition's attempts at returning kickoffs and punts. In the Marshfield game, two unnecessary scores were hauled up against the Indians due to this particular weak spot in the Roseburg defensive machinery.

In addition to tackling practice, the backfield and ends have been working closely on passing offense. The first string line is trying it out with the B team in an attempt to perfect its defensive blocking.

Norm West's J-Vs had a good scrimmage with Hod Turner's Paposes today. Both teams are putting in lots of practice time on their week-end frays against Myrtle Creek and Medford, respectively.

Last week West's J-Vs lost 14-0 to Grants Pass Junior Varsity at the Cavemen's stomping grounds. Grants Pass scored on the first offensive play of the game when he ball was taken near the 50 and run all the way from a touch-down. Reports indicate both teams played rugged ball in the second half, but Grants Pass got within 10 yards of the goal before he gun ended the game.

The Paposes were headed the wrong direction, according to previous news reports. The Junior High travelling squad will go out to play Medford this coming Saturday, rather than north to Cottage Grove. The Paposes will play at Cottage Grove on Saturday, Oct. 30, according to rumor.

NEW YORK, Oct. 21 — (AP) — By holding Auburn to a net gain of 83 yards last Saturday, unbeaten Georgia Tech became the defensive standout among the nation's collegiate gridiron powers, the National Collegiate Athletic Bureau announced today.

The Yellowjackets, who yielded 89 yards through the air but threw Auburn for a loss of four yards on the ground, moved up from third place in the bureau's defensive ranking as North Carolina state dropped from first to fourth while losing to North Carolina.

With four victories in as many starts, Georgia Tech leads the country in defense against rushing as well as in total defense, against both ground and air attack.

The Bear star, out of rough practices in previous weeks because of minor injuries, worked hard in yesterday's scrimmage and among other things flipped two touchdown passes to halfback Billy Mann.

Coach Lynn Waldorf said halfback Paul Hieckley and center Bob Hileman should be recovered by Saturday from hurts suffered last week against Oregon State.

Waldorf schooled his Rose-Bowl prospects on defense against the Huskies. The Bears are 20-point favorites locally.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 21 — (AP) — Two new faces will start at the tackle positions for UCLA Saturday when the Bruins take on Oregon State in Memorial Coliseum.

Breck Stroscheim and Roy Jensen are the newcomers, replacing injured West Matthews and George Pastre, the latter demoted for the time being.

Bill Clement shifts from right to left end, and Don Hunt moves in to the right side of the line.

PULLMAN, Wash., Oct. 21 — (AP) — The "lineman of the week" wants to be a fullback.

### Bedridden Grid Star Highest Paid, Based on Past Job

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21 — (AP) — If you consider it on the basis of the work he has done, Harry Gilmer probably is the highest salaried player in the history of football.

The former Alabama star is the bedridden property of the Washington Redskins.

His exact salary has never been announced, but since he was one of the best of last year's college crop, Gilmer may have signed at around \$12,500 to \$15,000 a year.

Yet, because of an injured leg, he has been in only one National League football game, and is certain to miss at least four more.

And his one appearance was brief. Against Pittsburgh, Gilmer went in, called six plays. On five of the plays, quarterback Gilmer called on passer Gilmer, which was a good idea, since he completed two for 69 yards.

This means he's getting paid at the rate of better than \$6,000 per completion, a figure that practically any passer would be willing to settle for.

Today, the Redskins got Gilmer because they wanted a replacement for the aging Sammy Baugh, but he convinced them he can be a tricky runner as well. Baugh still can throw the ball, of course, but the Redskins haven't been able to score up a frisky ball carrier.

Hugh Taylor, beanpole end from Oklahoma City University, gave the best description of Gilmer the runner.

"He runs," said Taylor admiringly, "like a scalded dog."

### 'Copter Used In Seeding Operation

The Crown-Zellerbach Corporation used a helicopter from Yakima Saturday to seed some of its logged off land in the Malard Arm section of Tahkenitch Lake.

The machine was set down at the old log dump along U.S. highway 101 Saturday when it arrived, and was later moved to the company's camp ground a half mile farther south.

The seeding operation took only about 2 1/2 hours Sunday forenoon, and is said to have covered about 1,200 acres with a mixture of cedar, spruce, hemlock and fir.

This is the first time this novel method of re-seeding logged off land has been used in this area, but it is supposed to have proven effective in other districts, and may be used here later on other tracts.

### Auto Registration In Oregon to Set New High in 1948

Oregon, with one passenger car for every 3.4 persons in the state, will have approximately 447,000 passenger automobiles registered by the end of 1948, Oregon State Motor Association officials estimate.

This figure will represent an increase of more than 10 per cent above the 1947 registration of 405,015 passenger cars. There are now 431,670 automobiles registered in the state and estimates for the total at year's end were based on national trends reported by the American Automobile Association.

For the nation as a whole, it is estimated there will be 33,225,000 passenger cars registered at the end of 1948. This will represent an increase of about eight per cent.

Total motor vehicle registration in Oregon, including passenger cars, trucks and buses, now amounts to 572,261 units, the Motor Association said.

While Oregon is one of the highest states in per capita ownership of passenger cars, it is 25th in registration among the 48 states and the District of Columbia. First three are California with 3,250,000 estimated for 1948; New York with an estimated 2,690,000 in 1948; and Pennsylvania with an estimated 2,125,000 in 1948.

### Annual Cranberry Festival Plans Made at Bandon

BANDON, Ore., Oct. 21 — (Special) — With the nation now observing its first National Cranberry Week, plans were announced today for the second annual Bandon Cranberry Festival to be held here November 5 and 6.

Folks from all over Southwestern Oregon are invited to attend the harvest festivities by the Bandon Cranberry Festival association which is readying a program to include:

- 1) Selection of a queen and colorful coronation ceremonies;
- 2) A Cranberry Fair, with prizes for best exhibits of fresh cranberries, cooked cranberries in pies, sauces, relishes, marmalades, canned cranberries, and others;
- 3) Tours of local bogs conducted by cranberry growers who will explain highlights of planting, growing and harvesting the tummy fruit;
- 4) Exhibits of cranberry picking machinery, wood burners, cultivators and other commercial displays;
- 5) A Friday night Coronation veteran color guard, the Festival queen and her seven princesses, with the Bandon high school band and everything from decorated bicycles to six-wheeler trucks participating;
- 6) A Friday night Coronation Ball following selection of the queen and two Harvest Dances the next evening;
- 7) The second annual Cran-

berry Bowl football game, between Bandon and Gold Hill high schools.

Eight queen contestants, representing various parts of the Bandon area between Riverport and Port Orford, have swung into the ticket-selling phase of the contest. Tickets to the coronation and ball, and to the harvest dances are \$1.50 per couple; Cranberry Bowl game tickets are 50 cents per adult and 40 cents per student. Admission is free to all other events of the Festival.

Through the two-day event the Festival association hopes to "better acquaint Southwestern Oregon residents with the relatively new industry that has made Bandon the 'Cranberry Capital of Oregon' and one of the two major cranberry-producing centers on the Pacific coast."
