

Adventists Plan Annual Famine Relief Offering

The Roseburg Seventh-Day Adventist Church will participate in the fourth annual famine relief offering to be taken in all of the denominations in North America on Oct. 23, Elder Robertson, local pastor, said today.

Approximately \$600,000 is being sought in the one-day drive for funds to feed Europe's hungry people, he said.

Famine funds given by the 2,733 churches in North America in the previous three offerings have totaled \$2,138,945, according to a report received from W. E. Nelson of Washington, D. C., Adventist world treasurer.

In addition, the churches have shipped 1,974 tons of clothes into Europe, sent several thousand pounds of garden seeds, and thou-

Nelson, just returned from a tour of Europe, declared that Europe's need continues very great. Although her harvest was good this year, the margin between supply and need is still wide. Germany, for example, had always had to import 35 to 40 percent of her food. Now her problem is increased by the presence of about 18,000,000 refugees.

Welfare officials estimated that the lives of 200,000 persons have been saved by the food which Seventh-Day Adventists have distributed in Europe since the war, Elder Robertson said.

Rev. Edward Griva, Early Western Missioner, Dies

SPOKANE, Oct. 22.—(P)—The Rev. Edward M. Griva, 84, one of the last missionaries, died yesterday.

He spent 41 years among the Flathead, Colville, Yakima, Indian, Kallispell and Assiniboine Indian tribes.

He collected material for a dictionary of Western Indian languages, but never completed his work. Only a month ago he made his last missionary trip—a hundred mile journey at night to see a dying Indian woman.

A native of Turin, Italy, Father Griva came to Spokane in 1894. He built 16 churches during his career.

Prehistoric Cave Holds Fortune in Guano Deposit

LAS VEGAS, Nev., Oct. 22.—(P)—Discovery of a rich deposit of guano in a prehistoric cave 12 miles from the western end of the north rim of the Grand Canyon of the Colorado is reported by Muri Emery, veteran Colorado river pilot.

The bat cave, thousands of years old, is yielding guano as much as 16 per cent pure nitrogen. Emery said, and is worth \$150,000 for fertilizer on the basis of deposits already surveyed.

"We have explored the cave for only 1,000 feet," he said. "We have dug out accumulations 22 feet deep without striking bottom."

A company has been formed to mine the guano and the first shipment of 2,000 tons went to the Randall Mills Corp. of Paramount, Calif.

Former Mayor McCain Of Ketchikan Passes

KETCHIKAN, Alaska, Oct. 22.—(P)—Harry G. McCain, 62, served eight years on the city council and was mayor three terms, died Wednesday after a brief illness.

He came here in 1926 from Cordova, where he had been an assistant district attorney five years.

Born in Brownsville, Ore., he graduated from Willamette and

Northwestern Universities. Before coming to Alaska in 1916, he was a national vice president of the Intercollegiate Prohibition Association and later was associated with Dr. Clarence True Willson in the campaign for prohibition.

The funeral today was under auspices of the Eagles Lodge, of which he was a past worthy president.

RATES HIKE PROTESTED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—(P)—The Chicago Board of Trade has protested the railroad's proposal for an immediate new increase in freight rates.

The board told the Interstate Commerce Commission in a brief that neither emergency or long term increases should be granted without a full hearing.
