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Enrollment Campaign of Junior Red Cross In Douglas County Will Take Place Nov. 1 to 15

They will distribute supplies to the schools and enlist the cooperation of teachers in the drive.

The annual Junior Red Cross enrollment campaign will take place Nov. 1 to 15 according to an announcement from the local Red Cross headquarters. Miss Ruth Swinney, newly appointed chairman of the Douglas County Chapter, Junior Red Cross, will visit almost all of the schools in the county taking supplies and enlisting the cooperation of a teacher from each school who will be a sponsor for the Junior Red Cross members.

Miss Swinney, a former Fullerton School principal, who retired from teaching last year, is enthusiastic about the possibilities of Junior Red Cross service and is well qualified by her experience in the schools for this work, the announcement states.

Mrs. Frank V. Johnson, driving for the Motor Service, has been taking Miss Swinney throughout

the county. The tour will cover 60 schools in all, from Upper Orest School in the southeast to Gardner and Reedsport, and from Gunter School on Smith River Route to Camas Valley.

All materials for enrollment are being distributed, together with gift boxes to be filled and sent overseas. These must be ready by Nov. 15.

Cheer For Overseas

Junior Red Cross members join together to serve others according to Miss Swinney. To children overseas they yearly send Christmas boxes, correspondence and picture albums, which form a link of understanding between countries, she said. In Douglas County, the Junior Red Cross will also make many attractive and useful things for patients at the Roseburg Veterans Hospital.

Mrs. Lulu C. Gorrell, County School Superintendent, who has

reportedly fully endorsed this campaign, expressed the hope that all schools, both elementary and high school, will have 100 per cent membership.

Miss Swinney said, "If every room in every school in the county fills just one box—and many will fill more—just think what it will mean to children like those in England last year where 20 children had to share one pencil! Each child should have a gift box but instead each child did not even receive one gift."

Miss Swinney expressed the hopes that Douglas County Junior Red Cross will have a strong membership this year and an active program so that our Junior citizens may have the joy of doing something for their neighbors over the world. The opportunity to help, she said, is invaluable training for later participation in civic cooperation.
